Captain's Message

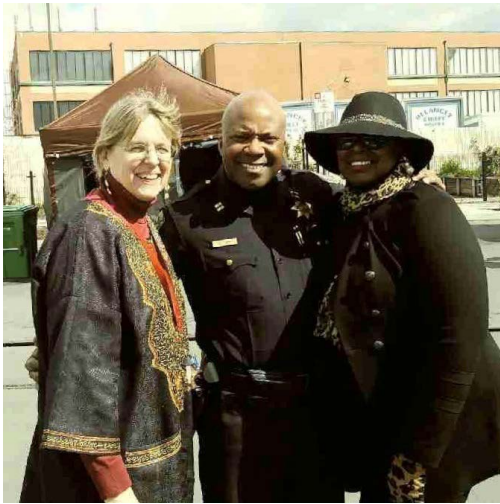
Hello to the Bayview District,

Barbara Ockel

Executive Director, Bayview Opera House

Barbara grew up in Germany and came to the United States at age 20 to attend U.C. Berkeley, where she earned a B.A. degree in physics. She started a business making sails for Windsurfers, which she later moved to the Hunters Point Shipyard in SF and became part of a burgeoning artist colony. There she started working with African American artist Joe Sam, and together they installed over 40 public sculptures across the country. After creating a website for the artist, she started working in the website department of a Silicon Valley start-up, and put up art in their worldwide offices for over 10 years while the start-up grew into an international company.

Barbara has worked in Bayview since 1984 and lived here since 1993. She joined Bayview Opera House (BVOH) as a Board member in 2008 and in July 2009 as Director. During her tenure at BVOH, she founded Dare 2 Dream ARTS Youth Enrichment, now a flagship program. Under her supervision, the former South San Francisco Opera House's historic wood floor and proscenium have been restored to their former glory, earning the Bayview Opera House Ruth Williams Memorial Theatre a place on the 2011 National Register of Historic Places and a 2011 Governor's Award for Historic Preservation. She continues to steward the organization to provide more relevant arts and culture to the Bayview and larger Bay Area community. She ensures, that the struggle and contributions of the African American community of Bayview Hunters Point are recognized and preserved for future generations, while providing programming for all who live here now, bringing

people together and maintaining community cohesion.

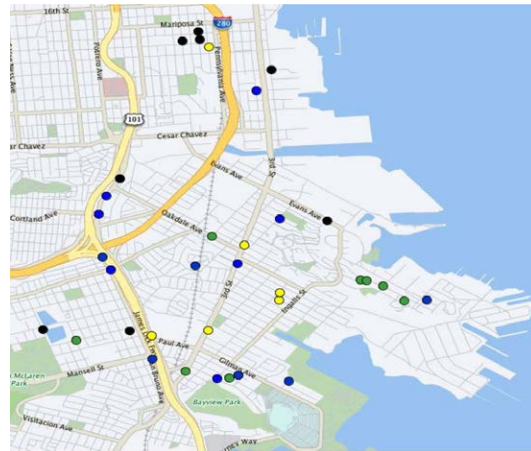

Auto Theft Arrest – 600 block Rhode Island – 2/28/18, 10:20 pm

Officers responded to a report of a suspicious subject sitting in a vehicle. The officers arrived located the car and recognized it from a crime bulletin as having been stolen in a hot prowl burglary on February 21st. The same vehicle had led police on a pursuit since then on two separate occasions since then. The officers found the suspect, who appeared to be asleep, inside the car. He woke up and became startled at their presence, yelling and screaming wildly and refusing to obey the officers' commands to get out of the car. After a tussle, the suspect was arrested. The officers found that the suspect had removed the original license plate of the stolen car and replaced it with a fraudulent plate. The suspect also had narcotics in his possession. The suspect, already on court probation, was booked on numerous charges including auto theft, possession of stolen property, and narcotics. (SFPD Case No. 180140251)

Robbery – 3rd / Quesada – 2/28/18, 10:30 pm

A 45 year old victim left a corner market on the 500 block of 3rd and was jumped as he walked on Quesada by two suspects. They demanded money from the victim and when he stated that he had none, one of the suspects began to swing a knife at him. The victim grabbed the knife to avoid getting stabbed and punched the suspect who then ran off with his associate. The victim sustained a slash to his palm where he had grabbed the knife. He reported the incident at Bayview Station on March 1st. It is under investigation. (SFPD Case No. 180160635)

Carjacking – 500 block Bayshore – 3/1/18, 1:45 am

Officers responded to a call of a carjacking and met with the victim. He told them that he had parked his car in front of the liquor store and left it unlocked as he ran in to make a

quick purchase. On his way out, two subjects who were also in the store began to argue with him. One of them then ran to his car and got in the driver's seat. The victim ran after him and got into his own car from the passenger seat. The push to start car was started by the suspect as the victim had the key fob in his pocket. The suspect produced a gun and threatened the victim with it. The victim got out of the car as the suspect drove off. This incident is under investigation. (SFPD Case No. 180159779)

Firearm Arrest– unit block Whitfield – 3/3/18, 2:20 pm

Officers patrolling in the area spotted a suspect who they were familiar with and knew to be an active local gang member. On seeing the officers, the suspect grabbed onto his waistband and took off running into a nearby residence. Another unit responded of the scene and advised that they had developed information that the suspect was indeed in possession of a firearm. The officers made contact with the residents of the unit who allowed them entry and agreed to let them search the home for the weapon. The suspect as located inside and was detained. The officers searched the room he had been in and located a **loaded .45 handgun** hidden under the shavings inside of a terrarium. The suspect was arrested and booked on weapons violations. (SFPD Case No. 180166417)

Robbery – Jamestown / Ingalls – 3/3/18, 10:00 pm

A 34 year old victim was driving east on Jamestown and became involved in a collision with a sedan at Ingalls. The driver of the sedan parked and got out. The two began arguing when the suspect demanded money from the victim to repair the damage to his sedan. The victim told the suspect he was calling the police and began taking photos of the damaged vehicles. The suspect then struck the victim in the head, knocking him out. When he regained consciousness, the suspect was gone and the victim realized that the suspect had robbed him of his wallet. This incident is under investigation. (SFPD Case No. 180168435)

Robbery– 23rd / Tennessee– 3/4/18, 2:45 am

A 65 year old cab driver was dispatched to pick up a fare on the **1700 block of Market**. He picked up the two subjects and drove them to **23rd and Tennessee**. The total for the ride was \$20 but one of the suspects told him that he only had a \$50 bill. The victim stated that he would give him \$30 in change and gathered it in anticipation of exchanging it with the suspect when the \$50 bill was handed over. The suspect, instead of paying the victim, punched him in the face and stole the \$30 that he was holding. The suspect and his female accomplice then fled on foot. The victim reported the incident at Mission Station who notified Bayview. This incident is under investigation. (SFPD Case No. 180167926)

Auto Theft Arrest– 3rd / Newcomb– 2/27/18, 5:03 pm

Officers were flagged down by a 32 year old victim who told them that her car had been stolen. She told the officers that she had double parked and left the vehicle running as she stepped out to collect some recyclables. She then saw a suspect run into the driver's door and take off in her car northbound on 3rd. The victim's cell phone was still in the vehicle when it was stolen. The officers had the victim track her phone and determined that it was in the area of **Jennings and Wallace**. Officers responded to the area and located the vehicle, along with the suspect still inside. She resisted the officers' efforts to take her into custody but was eventually subdued and arrested. She was booked on multiple charges that included auto theft and narcotics violations. (SFPD Case No. 180155567)

Attempted Homicide Arrest– 1100 block Revere– 3/4/18, 1:03 pm

On January 16th, a 35 year old victim was assaulted by three suspects at 3rd and Revere with a shovel. The main suspect was a friend of the victim with whom he had fallen out recently. The suspect and his two accomplices had waited for the victim to walk past and once he did, they attacked him. The suspects punched and kicked the victim and struck him with dumbbells and a shovel multiple times until he lost consciousness. The victim suffered life threatening injuries that included multiple broken ribs and facial fractures. A search warrant was obtained for the suspect and his home on the **1100 block of Revere**. He was arrested and evidence was collected from the residence. The suspect was booked on attempted homicide, robbery and conspiracy charges. An investigation into the identities of his accomplices is ongoing. (SFPD Case No. 180046671)

Trespassing Arrest– 2200 block 3rd– 3/5/18, 12:45 pm

On February 20th, officers responded to a call of a possible burglary of a business on the **2200 block of Rhode Island**. The manager reported that a suspect had covered up the surveillance camera at the front of the building before entering. The officers searched the building but the suspect had already fled. The officers reviewed the footage and through their investigation, were able to identify the suspect. A crime bulletin was issued with this information and another officer noticed the suspect walking along 3rd St on March 5th. He was arrested without incident and booked on trespassing charges. (SFPD Case No. 180138795)

Auto Theft Arrest – unit block Bowman – 3/6/18, 12:42 pm

An officer patrolling in the area in a radio car equipped with an automatic license plate reader was alerted to a parked vehicle that had been reported as stolen. The officer approached the car at which point the suspect, who was inside, got out and attempted

to walk away. He was taken into custody without incident and booked on auto theft charges. (SFPD Case No. 180172414)

Armed Robbery – 5000 block 3rd – 3/6/18, 10:05 pm

A 22 year old victim noticed a car pull up in front of the corner store he walked into and observed two suspects get out of the vehicle and follow him inside. They followed him out as well and when out on the street, the two suspects attacked him and snatched the gold chain from his neck. One of the suspects was armed with a handgun which he brandished at the victim when he tried to resist. The victim, scared for his life, handed over his wallet and cell phone. The suspects fled the scene. This incident is under investigation. (SFPD Case No. 180175195)

Suspicious Activity Defined

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident had been committed, or about to be committed.

Examples:

- An individual peering into vehicles or trying door handles, appearing to trying to locate any valuables

Community Policing Defined

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the community.

- **Homeless Outreach and outreach to Drug Users:** Bayview Station officers coordinate with city

- An individual checking front doors of residences, or attempting to locate unattended packages, or following delivery trucks to see where packages are being dropped off.

Crime Defined

Robbery- The taking of property from another by use of force or fear.

Assault- The unlawful attempt, coupled with present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person. *Assault* is when a person swings their arm and *Battery* is when that arm makes contact with another.

Misdemeanor Battery- Any willful and unlawful touching of another

Felony Battery- The use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

Aggravated Assault- Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary- The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft- Theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950

Petty Theft- Theft where the value of property taken is less than \$950

agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support

- **Foot Patrols:** Bayview Station has beat officers assigned to the 3rd St. corridor, 18th St., and San Bruno Avenue.

- **Monthly Community Relations Meetings:** Community Meetings are held continuously on the first Tuesday of each month. Officers also attend meetings with merchant groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving

- **Email Updates:** Bayview Station sends out weekly newsletter updates to district residents that outline crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and contact information.

Types of Crime Reports That Can Be Filed Online:

- **Harassing Phone Calls:** When you are experiencing annoying calls - with no known suspects; for example, hang-ups or heavy breathing.
- **Lost Property:** When property has disappeared and not stolen. If you think it could have been taken but you have no idea by who, you may enter the report online.
- **Theft:** When property is stolen but there has been no illegal entry or contact by the thief.
- **Vandalism/Graffiti:** The act of changing, modifying or defacing public or private property, including graffiti.
- **Vehicle Burglary:** When property was stolen from a vehicle.
- **Vehicle Tampering:** Tampering with a motor vehicle, including vandalism/graffiti of the vehicle.

Calling the Police:

Dispatchers ask questions in a particular order for a reason. It is best to stay calm and answer all questions to the best of your ability.

Complaint: **Location, Hazards (ie. weapons at scene), Victim info (sex, age, condition)**

Suspect Description: **Gender, Race, Age, Clothing, distinguishing features**

Vehicle Description: **Color, Make, Model, License Plate, distinguishing features**



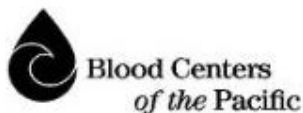

Each San Francisco neighborhood (*defined by zip code*) can **visit the California Academy of Sciences for free over a three-day weekend** (*Friday, Saturday, or Sunday*) in the spring and fall of each year. *So that means as long as you have a driver's license or other **proof of residency**, you can save yourself \$34.95 and visit the museum for free. Read the full rules.*

The Rules: Each visiting adult must show a valid photo ID with proof of residency (*you may not bring out of town guests for free; they still have to pay*). Visiting adults are limited to six children for free entry.

The following items or combinations are acceptable:

- A driver's license or state ID card
- Photo ID plus postmarked envelope, postcard, or magazine label with name and date
- Photo ID plus utility bill (*gas/electric/cable*) or bank statement
- Letter from a government agency with name and home address (*not a P.O. box*)
- *Only residents from the zip codes invited on the **designated dates** will be admitted free of charge*

SFPD Releases 2017 Year-End Crime Statistics

Thursday, March 01, 2018

Data shows decrease in homicides, shooting incidents, burglaries and auto thefts

The San Francisco Police Department today released its 2017 crime data as reported to the FBI through the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program. The data indicates that while Part I crimes increased 11.8 percent in 2017.

- Homicides decreased 3.4 percent
- Homicides by firearms decreased 5 percent
- Non-fatal shooting incidents decreased 15.8 percent
- Human trafficking decreased 32.6 percent
- Assaults against SFPD police officers decreased 4 percent compared to 2016

Through enforcement efforts, the SFPD seized 1,023 firearms in 2017 and collected 275 guns during buyback events, a 29.7 percent increase over 2016.

“Reducing violent crime is and will always be our top priority,” said Police Chief William Scott. “We’re working closely with community members and our City partners to reduce gun related violence. Protecting lives and providing safety for the public- particularly our youth- is key to ensuring a vibrant future for everyone.”

UCR data shows San Francisco and neighboring Bay Area cities experienced a rise in property crimes during the first six months of 2017. San Francisco saw a 24 percent increase in thefts from vehicles last year.

To address these types of crimes, SFPD in 2017 doubled its citywide uniformed foot patrols to deter street crime and focus on neighborhood quality of life issues. Last November, the department created a General Crimes Unit to address serial residential and commercial burglaries, auto break-ins, bicycle thefts and other neighborhood property crimes. In January, 2018, SFPD command staff assigned district station officers to work directly with community members on crime trends, education and prevention strategies.

Last year, San Francisco police officers booked or cited 790 people for thefts from vehicles. The 2017-2018 data shows a downward trend in auto burglaries, auto thefts and burglaries:

- Auto burglaries decreased 11 percent citywide between November 1, 2017 and December 31, 2017
- Auto burglaries decreased 5 percent citywide between December 1, 2017 and January 31, 2018
- Auto thefts decreased 11 percent in 2017
- Burglaries decreased .8 percent in 2017

“We take these crimes seriously and are allocating our resources toward deterrence and investigations,” said Chief Scott. “By collaborating with community members, San Francisco businesses and law enforcement partner agencies, we can address crime through education, prevention and the effective investigation and prosecution of criminals.”

The UCR program counts crimes when they become known to the police. A series of 13 reports are submitted to the California Department of Justice each month; CA DOJ in turn reports this data to the FBI. Crime incidents, values of stolen and recovered property values, homicide information, crimes against seniors, hate crimes and domestic violence incidents are some of the summary reports submitted each month to CA DOJ. The submittal deadline is the 10th of the month following the close of the month.

The UCR program is considered a "snapshot of crime" reported in one month. Crime is counted based upon a hierarchical rule following FBI definitions and guidelines, so that all jurisdictions participating in the UCR program follow the same rules. Figures are only updated twice annually.

The San Francisco Police Department also produces a monthly CompStat profile, which often includes additional crimes which have been reported after the UCR submittal deadline. CompStat focuses on crimes which have occurred during the month, an important distinction from the UCR standard. These profiles provide a more up-to-date picture of crime in San Francisco, and are used to better evaluate crime fighting strategies and deployment efforts. CompStat reports are posted on our website at sanfranciscopolice.org/compstatreports.

Dispose of Unwanted and Expired Medication at Bayview Station

There is a new secured bin at Bayview Station where you can dispose of unwanted and expired medication at any time of the day or night. The bin will accept any type of prescription and off the shelf medication except for:

- *Herbal Remedies*
- *Vitamins*
- *Supplements*
- *Cosmetics*
- *Other personal care products*
- *Compressed Cylinders*
- *Aerosols*
- *Inhalers*
- *Medical Devices*
- *Sharps*
- *Illicit drugs*
- *L odine containing medication.*

When disposing the medication, please leave it in the original container with your personal information crossed out or removed. You can also place the medication into a clear plastic zip top baggies. Contact the front desk officer and inform them that you want your medication dispose of. The officer will assist you.

Please note that once an item that had been disposed of inside the bin, we cannot retrieve it. So make sure your ring, cell phone or anything of value is not accidentally disposed of.

With over 2,300 different telephone numbers listed to access local government services, many people did not know what number to dial to reach the appropriate department. Now you can connect to city services with only two numbers to remember: **911** for emergencies and **3-1-1** for everything else.

Before 311, over 50% of calls to the 911 center were not emergency related. **311** relieves 911 operators from these non-emergency calls. If a catastrophic emergency such as an earthquake occurs, **311** operators will be able to provide accurate information to assist during the recovery. In the unlikely event the 911 facilities becomes inoperative, the **311** call center will function as a back up.
