Captain Paul Yep's Message

Suspect in Custody for Gunfire on Broadway

On Sunday, May 27, 2018 at 01:34 AM, Officer Colleen Fitzpatrick and Officer Alexander Anton were on-duty patrolling the area of Broadway and Columbus Avenue. Both officers heard what they recognized to be several shots of gunfire from the 400 block of Broadway. They immediately located a witness who pointed to the suspect who was attempting to flee the scene by getting to his parked car. Officer Anton pursued the suspect and with the assistance of Officer Fitzpatrick, Officer Joshua Cabillo, Officer Jonathan Sylvester, Officer Kevin Stucki, and Officer Patrick Backman he was taken into custody.

The incident began as a physical altercation between several parties in the area.

Three firearms were located by the arresting officers and retained as evidence. The suspect, an adult male from Hayward, was booked on multiple charges. Luckily, no one was injured as a result of this incident.

The Central Investigations Team is still actively investigating this case. Thanks to the officers named above for taking a dangerous and armed Suspect in custody.

Crimes of Note

Burglary (Commercial and Residential)

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

5/14	12:00pm	Burglary, Commercial Embarcadero Center 4	An unknown suspect entered the employee area and stole the victim's property. The victim saw a suspect walking with his distinctive jacket on and detained the suspect. Officers arrived and took the suspect into custody. Arrest made.

The employee refused to give the suspect any food. The suspect asked for coffee and the employee gave him a cup of coffee. The suspect then threw the coffee at the employee and fled the scene.
5/17	1:35pm	Assault, With Caustic Chemical Unit BLK of Powell	Two unknown suspects set off the security alarm as they exited the store. An employee asked the suspects to step back into the store and one of the suspects sprayed her in the face with an unknown substance. The suspects then fled the scene. It is unknown if the suspects had stolen any merchandise.
5/22	9:15am	Aggravated Assault, With Force 200 BLK of Jefferson	The victim was awoken by an unknown suspect punching him in the face. The suspect stated that the victim had stolen his bicycle. The victim was able to run away and the suspect fled the scene.

The victim went to check on the female suspect to see if he should call police. The male suspect pulled out brass knuckles and punched the victim in the face multiple times. The victim was able to throw the male suspect on the ground in self-defense. The female suspect got behind the victim and attacked him. An officer arrived and stopped the attack. Arrests made.

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

5/17	11:35am	Robbery, Commercial, With Force 800 BLK of Hyde	An unknown suspect entered the café and asked for spare change. The suspect then reached into the tip jar. An employee struggled with the suspect over the tip jar. The suspect attempted to bite the employee, but she let go of the tip jar to prevent being bit. The suspect then fled the scene with the tip jar.
5/18	3:10pm	Robbery, With Force 100 BLK of Powell	An unknown suspect approached the victim from behind and grabbed her wallet from her hand. The victim struggled with the suspect. The victim fell to the ground and the suspect was able to flee the scene with her wallet.

5/20	2:30pm	Robbery, Commercial, With Force 300 BLK of Bay	Two unknown suspects entered the store and stole merchandise. The suspects were confronted by security outside of the store. Security tried to recover the items, but one of the suspects punched her in the face multiple times. The suspects then fled the scene.
5/20	3:15pm	Robbery, Commercial, With Force 100 BLK of Powell	The suspect entered the store and stole merchandise. The suspect was confronted by security outside the store. The suspect shoved security and a struggle ensued. During the struggle, the suspect punched security in the face and bit his arm and ankle. Security was able to detain the suspect. Arrest made.
5/20	6:20pm	Robbery, With Force 600 BLK of Jones	An unknown suspect grabbed the victim's laundry cart that was in the hallway. The victim confronted the suspect and tried to pull the cart from the suspect. The suspect bit the victim in the arm. A second victim tried to detain the suspect, but the suspect was able to get away.
5/21	11:00am	Robbery, With Knife Bay/Powell	An unknown suspect approached the victim and pointed a knife at the victim. The suspect demanded the victim's wallet and jewelry. Fearing for his safety, the victim gave the suspect money. A passerby approached and threatened to call the police. The suspect then fled the scene.
5/21	2:55pm	Robbery, Commercial, With Force 100 BLK of Kearny	Three unknown suspects entered the store and placed merchandise in their bags. An employee grabbed onto one of the bags and one of the suspects punched him in the face multiple times. The employee fell on the floor and the same suspect who punched him, kicked him in the face. The suspects then fled the scene.
5/23	10:27pm	Robbery, With Force 800 BLK of California	The suspect forcefully pulled the victim's cell phone from her hands which caused her to fall to the ground. A witness called the police and officers detained a suspect matching the description provided. The victim and witness positively identified the detained suspect as the suspect who stole the cell phone. Arrest made.
5/25	10:01pm	Robbery, Attempt, Commercial, With Other Weapon 100 BLK of Powell	An unknown suspect entered the store and appeared intoxicated. Security observed the suspect detach a price tag of an item and confronted him. The suspect was told to leave. The suspect removed a hammer from his backpack and held it over his shoulder. Security backed away and the suspect fled the scene.
5/26	4:30am	Robbery, With Other Weapon California/Battery	An unknown suspect approached the victim and struck him in the head multiple times. The victim fell to the ground. The suspect reached into the victim's pocket and stole his wallet. The suspect then fled the scene.
5/26	5:35pm	Robbery, Bank, With Gun Unit BLK of Montgomery	An unknown suspect approached the teller window and pointed a gun at the victim. The suspect demanded money. The victim pulled money from the teller drawer and gave it to the suspect. The suspect then fled the scene.
5/26	6:27pm	Robbery, With Force Sutter/Sansome	The victim was walking down the BART stairs when an unknown suspect jumped up from behind the stairs and grabbed her purse. The victim struggled with the suspect and held onto her purse. The suspect then grabbed the victim's cell phone from her hand and fled the scene.
5/27	3:00am	Robbery, With Force 700 BLK of Post	The victim saw the unknown suspect harassing a group of people. The victim told the suspect to leave the group alone. The suspect placed his hands around the victim's neck and pinned him against the wall. Fearing for his safety, the victim pulled out his credit cards and threw them on the ground. The suspect picked up the credit cards and fled the scene.
5/27	7:04pm	Robbery, Commercial, With Force 300 BLK of Powell	An unknown suspect entered the store and stole merchandise. Security attempted to grab the suspect outside of the store, but the suspect pushed security causing him to lose his grip. As the suspect fled, he pushed two victims to the ground.

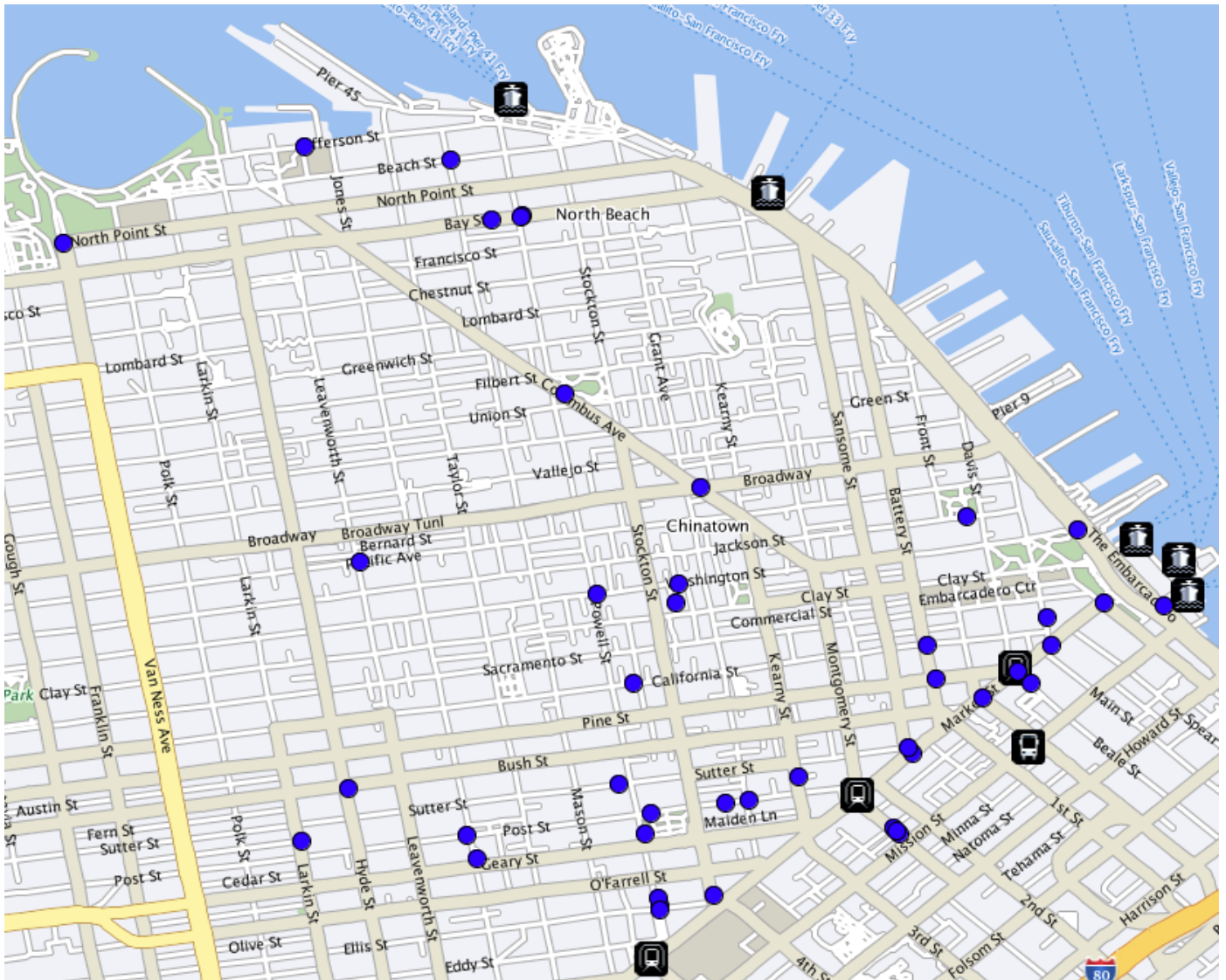

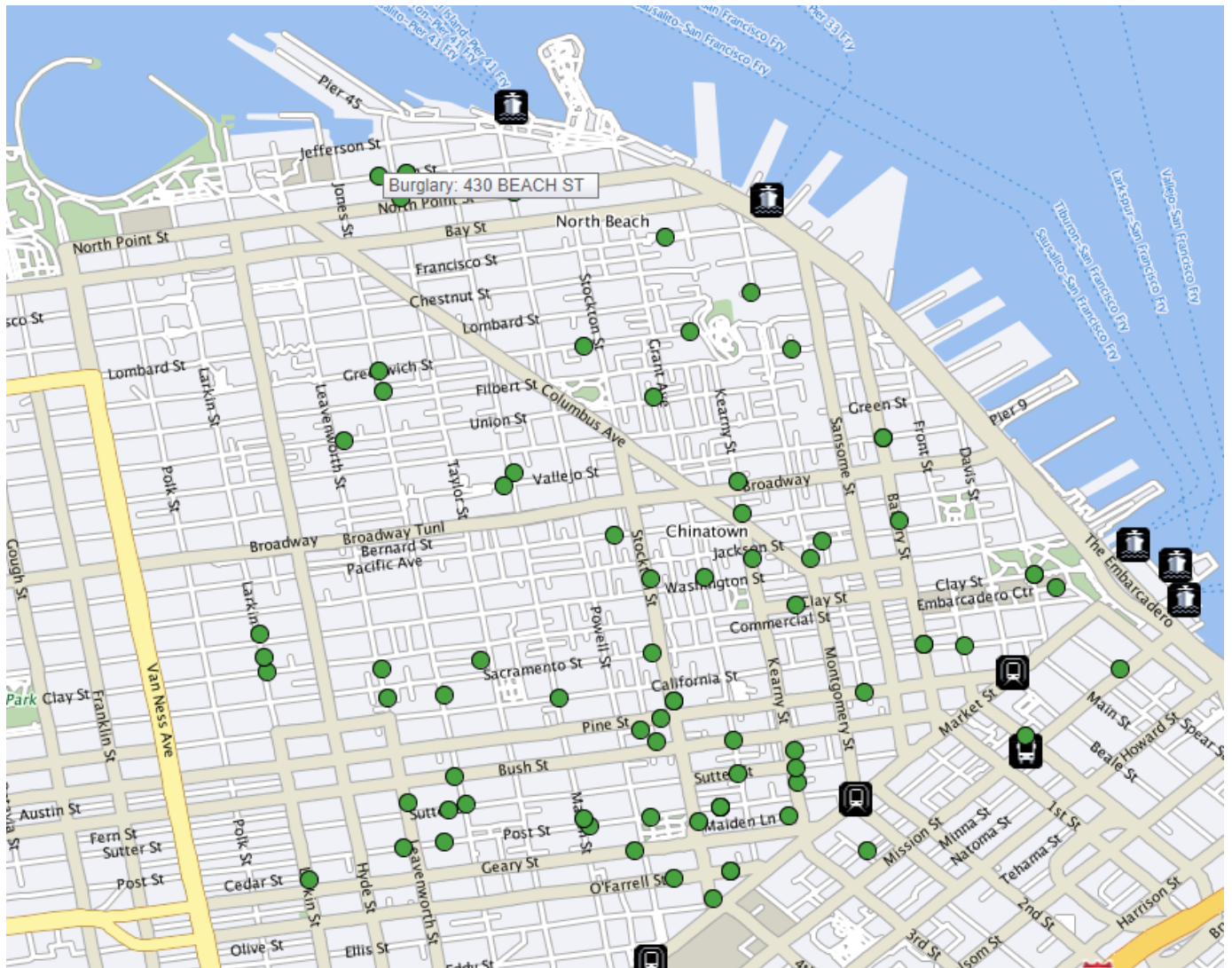

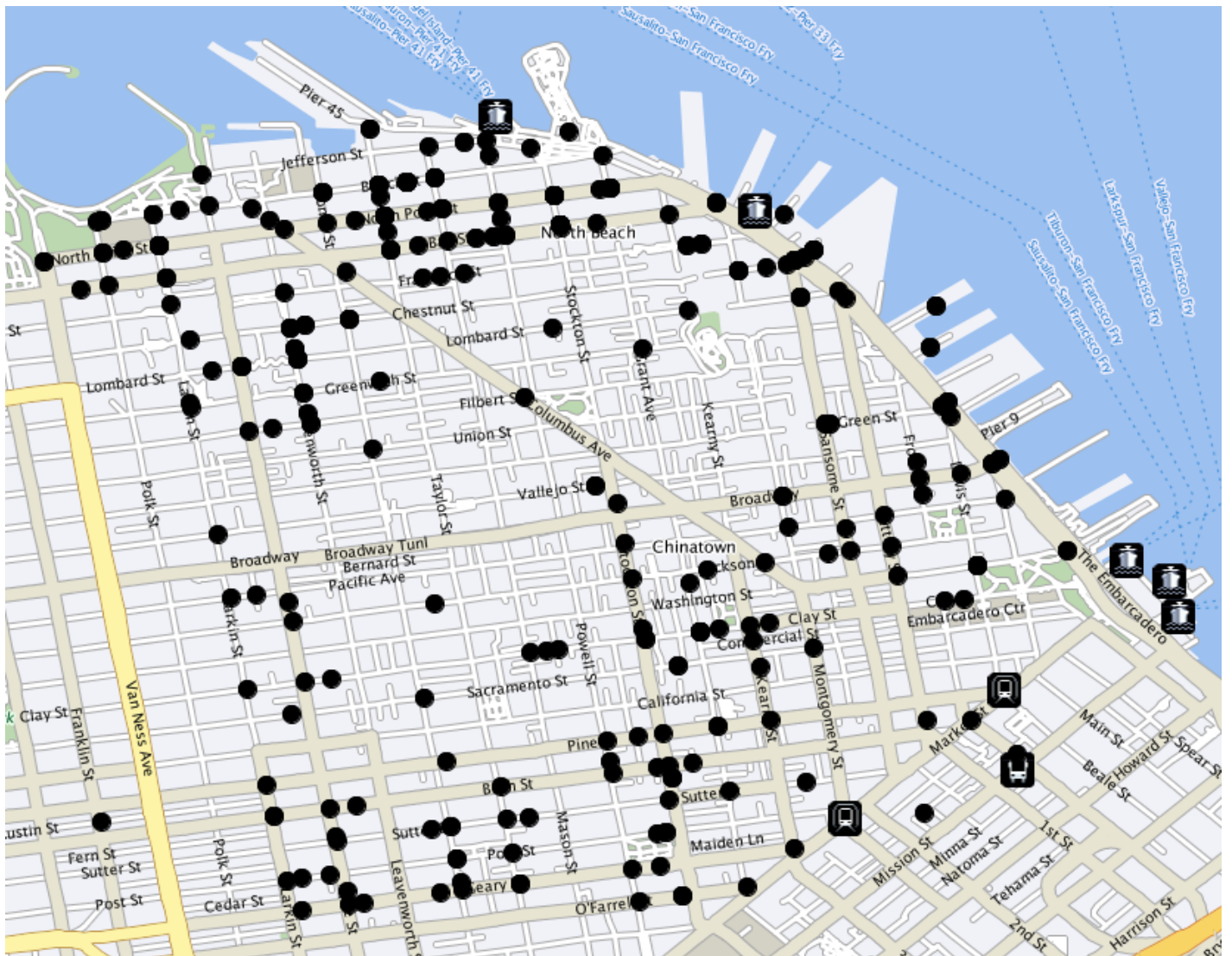

Robbery, Residence, With Gun

5/14/18 2316 hrs
900 BLK of Larkin St

On 05/14/18, uniformed officers on patrol were flagged down by a pedestrian and notified of a takeover robbery with a gun occurring. The officers responded to the location and set up a perimeter. An officer began to make entry, Suspect #1 pointed a firearm at the officers and claimed to be law enforcement. The suspect fled the scene on foot but was apprehended shortly after a firearm was recovered from his person. Officers set up a perimeter around the initial location and ordered potential suspects out of the building. A second suspect was located around the building he initially claimed to be homeless and just looking for a place to sleep. The officers learned that two suspects entered the residence and forced the victim to the ground using their firearms as they looked for money and narcotics. During the investigation, the officers determined that the second suspect was involved in the incident. A search of the residence was conducted and evidence was seized, including a second firearm. Both suspects were booked at County Jail.

Shoplifting, Force Against Agent

On 5/20/18, uniformed officers responded to a retail store regarding a theft. Officers made contact with Victim #2 who is a loss prevention agent for the store. Officers learned that the suspect hit and bit the victim after he attempted to detain her as she walked out of the store with stolen merchandise. A second suspect was able to get away from the victim during his struggle to detain suspect #1. Suspect #1 was booked at the Juvenile Justice Center.

Burglary, Non-Residential, Unlawful Entry

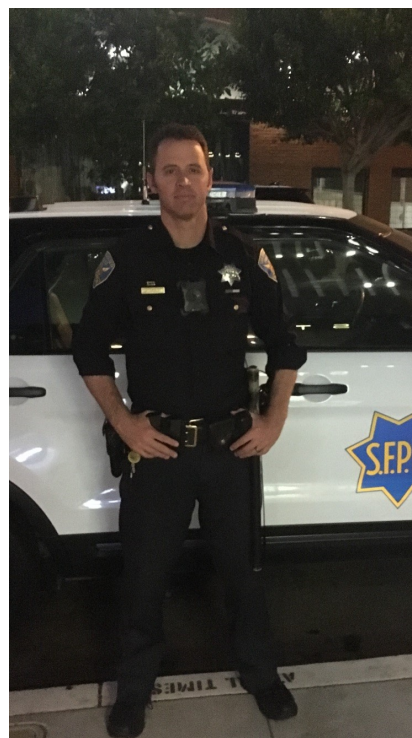

On 4/30/18, Victim #2 responded to Central Station to make a report regarding the theft of a bicycle from his store. The Victim stated a suspect entered the store and asked to test ride a bicycle. The suspect left his identification for the test ride but never returned with the bicycle. A crime bulletin was issued regarding the incident. On 5/27/18, uniformed officers observed the suspect and identified him as being the suspect in the crime bulletin. The suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail.

Featured Officer of the Month

Officer Justin Leach

Each month Central Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Officer Justin Leach, a 2-year member of Central Police Station.



Officer Leach was born in Marin at Marin General Hospital. He graduated from Casa Grande High School in Petaluma and went on to attend college at University of New Mexico Highlands where he received a degree in Kinesiology.

San Francisco Police Make Arrest in Cold Case Homicides

On December 9, 1999 at approximately 7:00 PM, San Francisco Police responded to an incident in an apartment building on the 400 block of Bush Street. Former University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV) swimmer Kameron Sengthavy, a 25 year-old male, was found deceased from apparent stab wounds.

On June 1, 2000 at approximately 7:00 AM SFPD officers responded to a gas station at Washington and Van Ness Streets where the body of a gas station attendant, Thomas Lee, a 60 year-old San Francisco resident was found shot by an unknown assailant.

Investigators from the SFPD Homicide Detail conducted investigations of these crimes. After exhausting all leads, these investigations were assigned to the Department's Cold Case Unit.

In early 2018, investigators from the SFPD Homicide Detail's Cold Case Unit developed information that led to the identity of the suspect in these two homicides. The suspect was determined to be a Donovan Ray Lacy, a 38 year-old male.

Lacy is currently serving time in a Florida prison for several bank robberies he committed in that state. Lacy, however, had previously lived in the Bay Area and was brought back to Marin County to stand trial for several bank robberies that occurred in 2012 and 2013. In January of 2014, Lacy was convicted on the Marin County bank robbery charges and was sentenced to 105 years in prison. Following his sentencing in Marin County, Lacy was transported back to Florida. A booking photo of Lacy from Marin County Sheriff's Office accompanies this news release.

SFPD investigators gathered evidence and developed probable cause to charge Lacy with the murders of Sengthavy and Lee. An arrest warrant has been issued charging Lacy with two counts of homicide. Lacy is expected to be extradited to San Francisco to stand trial for the murders.

Upon conclusion of the San Francisco murder trials, Lacy is expected to return to Florida to finish out his nine-year sentence for bank robbery. He would then be transported back to Marin County and serve out his 105-year sentence for the 2012 and 2013 bank robbery convictions.

While an arrest has been made in these cases, they remain open investigations. Anyone with information on the murder of Kameron Sengthavy or Thomas Lee is asked to contact Inspector Dan Cunningham of the SFPD Homicide Detail at (415) 553-9515. Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles to locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

Definition of Community Policing

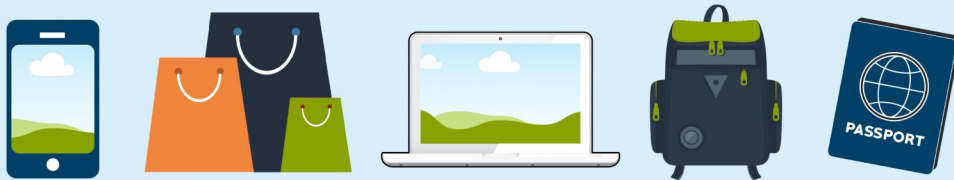
Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Central Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Central Station have beat officers assigned to Union Square, Fisherman's Wharf, Chinatown, North Beach and Market/Drumm area.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Central Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.

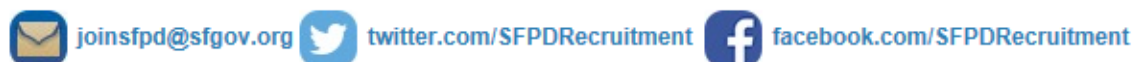
