Featured Officer of the Month

Officer Francisco Morrow & Officer Darwin Naval



From Academy classmates to School Resource Officers (SRO's), an SFPD partnership was formed between Officer Darwin Naval and Officer Francisco Morrow ten years ago. They knew this partnership would last, as they are both great listeners. Officer Naval would have to endure Officer Morrow's long tales of living in Wisconsin as a kid and chasing wildland fires as a firefighter in Southern California. Officer Naval, in turn, would regale Francisco with stories of patrolling the Stonestown Galleria with his "mountie" hat in his former life as mall security.

Throughout the month of December, I personally witnessed Officers Morrow and Naval deeply engage their community of students, staff, and parents. Whether it was forging a new partnership with Visitacion Valley Middle School to enable police officers to help students with their reading skills to managing a safe campus and safe school dismissal after an unrelated shooting that occurred near a school, December was a busy month for them. Yet, their resolve—forged through their relationships—withstood the challenges.

They, as well as Ofc. Marie-France Conciecao (a fellow SRO who was in Europe during December), have accomplished these noteworthy heights through their relentless determination to solve community problems and by forging deep interpersonal connections grounded in the principles of respect, empathy, and trust. They are seen as tremendous role models both within the school district and in the police community. In 2018, they will continue to build on these relationships while tackling emerging issues such as cyber bullying, social media use, and campus security.

Featured Citizen of the Month

Roberto Pena



On 11/21/2017 at approximately 1418 hours, a 16-year-old named J. Calix was playing a pickup game of soccer at Crocker Amazon Playground with some friends. During play, the ball was kicked in the direction of a male, later identified as Eliezer Hechevarria, who was walking across the field. Calix went to pick up the soccer ball from the area of Hechevarria and suddenly, without warning or provocation, Hechevarria used a pair of surgical scissors to slash Calix in the upper arm twice. Hechevarria turned and fled across the field and onto Geneva Avenue. Mr. Roberto Pena observed the entire incident from approximately 50-60 yards away. He confirmed that Calix was stabbed, called 911, and then followed the suspect both on foot and in a vehicle continually updating dispatch on the suspect's location. When the suspect began to walk through the children's playground area of Crocker Amazon, he feared for the safety of the dozens of children that were playing there and who were unaware of what this violent felon just did. Without regard for his own safety, he exited the vehicle that he was safely inside of, grabbed a tree branch to defend himself and others in case Hechevarria attacked again, and chased after the subject ensuring that he left the playground onto Moscow Street. When officers arrived, he immediately identified Hechevarria as the stabbing suspect. This quick identification allowed officers to search the immediate area where Hechevarria was apprehended and locate the weapon, which was a pair of surgical-type scissors.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Ingleside Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Ingleside Station has foot beat officers assigned to the Geneva and Cortland corridors.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Station personnel also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Email Updates: Ingleside Station sends out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

The following are some examples of Suspicious Activity that are “In progress” crimes, which demand an immediate call to 9-1-1:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or

Crime Definition

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

A woman at home with her daughter heard someone banging on the front door. The woman told Ingleside Officers Grabbe and Camarra that she was afraid and didn't answer the front door. Next, she heard footsteps coming up the stairs to the home from the garage. Still, she was too frightened to confront the intruder and stayed in her room for another ten minutes. When she finally walked out of her room she found her safe in another room pried open and a large amount of cash, jewelry, and identification missing from inside. Ingleside Officers Wise and Anton-Buzzard were dispatched to the unit block of Garrison to investigate a report of several vehicles with bullet holes. When they arrived, the officers found neighbors and three vehicles with bullet holes in various places in each car. They also found three nine millimeter casings, four .40caliber casings, and bullet fragments between two vehicles. 12:30pm Mission & Godeus Robbery w/Force

A woman called police after being robbed of her cell phone on a MUNI bus. The victim told Ingleside Officers Salazar and Tiffer that she was sitting near the rear exit of the bus, looking at her phone, when an unknown man grabbed her phone and ran off the bus. The victim gave chase for several blocks from Mission to eastbound Virginia, to southbound Coleridge, to Westbound Eugenia, and back to Mission where she finally lost site of the suspect. A woman waiting at the bus stop for the #8 Muni bus was suddenly approached from behind by an unknown man. The suspect attempted to pull the purse from the victim who pulled back, leading to a struggle. The struggle continued for a short time until the suspect threw the victim to the ground. The victim then took the purse off her body and threw it on the ground. The suspect then gathered up the purse and ran away west-bound on Mansell. Ingleside Officers Dungca and Calupad arrived and broadcast a description of the suspect. The loss was a wallet, cash, credit cards, a debit card, cell phone, keys, and identification. An elderly woman riding a MUNI LRV home was suddenly confronted by an unknown suspect. The victim traveled to the end of the line at San Jose and Geneva before calling her son, who called police. Ingleside Officers Cvetovac and Prieto were dispatched to a call of a violent attack at a gas station. When they arrived they found the victim with several bruises on his face and neck. Shortly before being transported to the hospital, he told the officers that he was paying for items at the cash register when an unknown man walked up and punched him in the face. The victim fought back and the pair traded punches while struggling through the store. At one point, another suspect joined the fray and punched the victim while the first suspect tried to strangle him. The victim's girlfriend was also attacked while trying to break up the fight. Both suspects ran to a car parked in the station's parking lot which then sped away in an unknown direction. Ingleside Officers Hardy and Lau were on routine patrol when they spotted a man jaywalking through traffic. The officers removed the knife and, in a search of his clothing, Hardy and Lau found a pipe used to smoke methamphetamine. A home on the 100 block of Dublin has been the scene of many arrests and calls for service. Shortly after arriving, a man exited the home and got into the Lincoln, without attaching his seatbelt, and sped away. The officers pulled the Lincoln over and asked the driver for her license. It was suspended. She also had a misdemeanor warrant for her arrest out of San Mateo County. Her passenger had a much more extensive criminal history. He was on probation with two convictions for domestic violence and aggravated assault. Inside the car were several open bottles of liquor. He was arrested for violating his probation. A woman called police after finding her front windows blown out. Ingleside Officers Leung and Clayton responded and discovered the windows had been damaged by gunshots. The victim and neighbors reported hearing four gunshots and then a vehicle speeding away. The officers found several bullet casings outside the home and four bullet holes in the victim's ceiling. A woman walking home from the store with her pet dog was suddenly confronted by an unknown suspect holding a gun. She told Ingleside Officers Wong and Garza that the suspect asked the woman for her shoulder bag, but before she could surrender the bag, he pulled it off of her shoulder. Her dog, seeing the suspect aggressively pull the bag from the victim, bit the suspect on the leg. The suspect then shot the woman's dog killing it instantly. The victim's mother, hearing the shots, went outside and found her daughter sobbing and cradling her dead companion while the suspect ran away with her daughter's property. Report number: 180010397

Many suspects drive vehicles with paper plates to avoid detection for a variety of crimes. Sometimes the vehicles are stolen. Sometimes they have expired registration. Sometimes they're wanted for non-vehicle felonies. On this date, Ingleside Officers Naser and Tayliong were driving south on Mission when they noticed a Honda Accord driving north with paper plates and tinted windows. The officers made a U-Turn and followed the Honda stopping the driver near Tingley and Mission. The driver didn't have a license. He did give his name to the officers, who ran it through the computer system, which showed his license was suspended. But that wasn't all. He also had two arrest warrants out of San Luis Obispo and Alameda Counties for vehicle code violations. He was placed in custody and a search of his clothing revealed approximately \$2500 in cash in his pockets. Underneath the driver's seat was a loaded .45 caliber firearm. The suspect was arrested and taken to Ingleside Station. Report number: 180006584

A woman, home alone, heard her doorbell ring. At first it rang at a slow pace and then it rang at an increasingly fast pace. She looked outside and saw a male suspect outside her iron gate. She called her father who told her to call 911, which she did after escaping to her backyard. While in the backyard, and waiting for police to arrive, she heard the suspect or suspects in her home. Soon thereafter she heard the suspect's car leaving just before Ingleside Officers Prieto and Alejandrino arrive. The officers found the suspect or suspects entered the home using some type of tool that pried open the security gate and the front door. Inside they stole a safe containing a large amount of cash, jewelry, passports and other valuables. Several other items were stolen from bedrooms before the suspects made their quick escape. 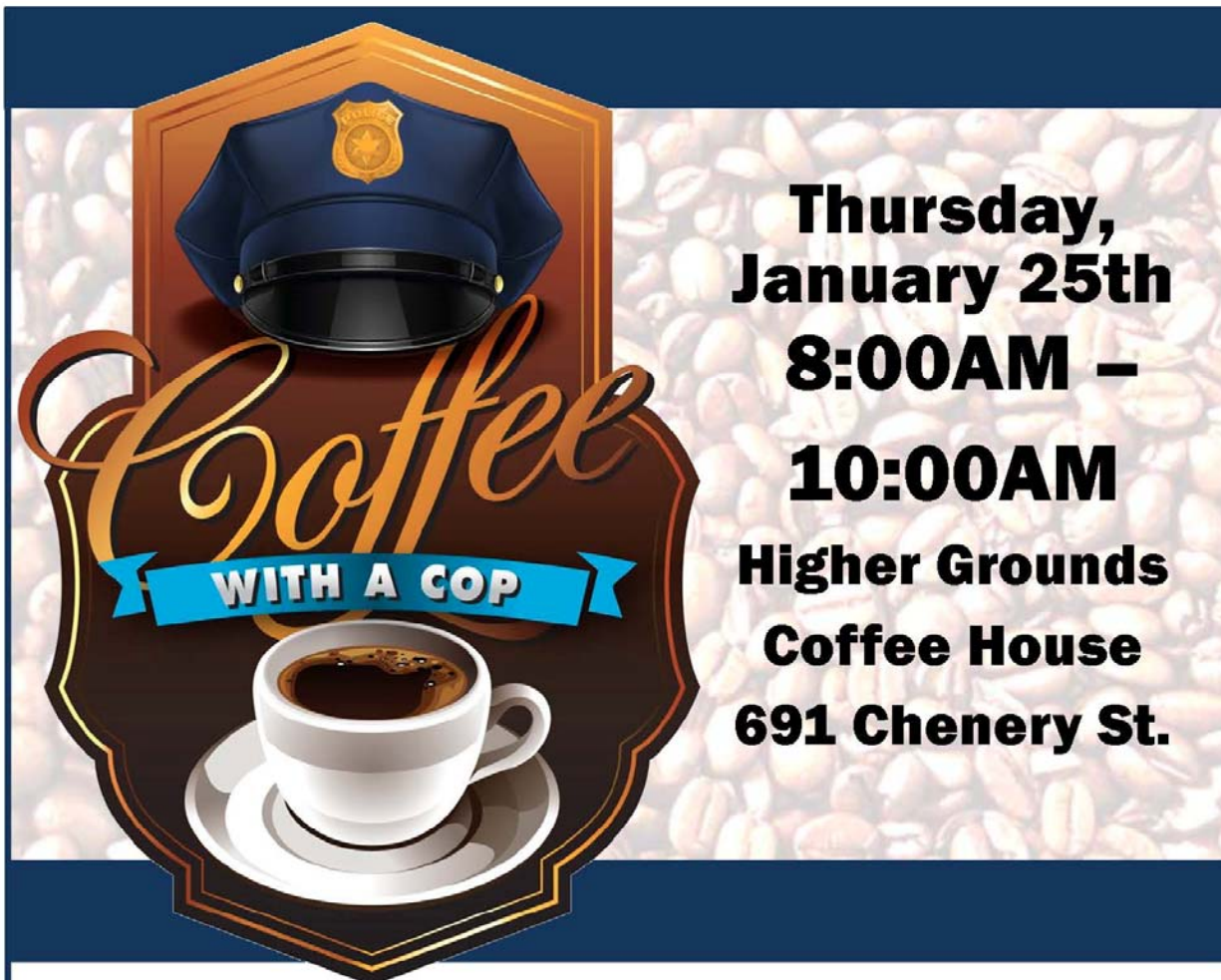

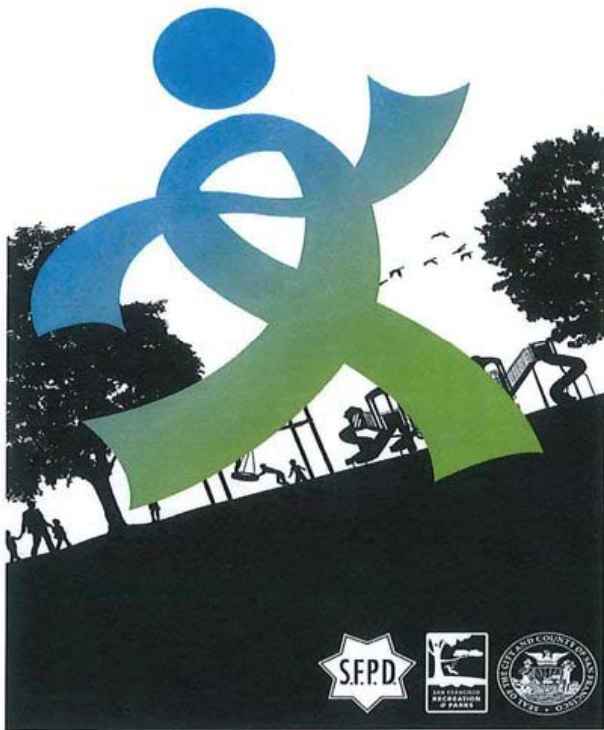

Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on January 4th, 8th, 10th and 30th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our triannual ALERT training classes as follows:

1. Complete two 8 hour classes with ALERT, or,
2. If you are already NERT Certified, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT, or,
3. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, complete one 8 hour class with ALERT.
