

If you have valuables in plain sight make sure to remove or secure the items in your trunk prior to parking your vehicle in the location you are going. There are always people watching, so be alert. I will be asking private parking garages to increase security with better lighting, video cameras, security signage, and possibly security guards. I'm also asking that the community report anyone who is suspicious in your neighborhood, describe the individuals from head to toe. Also please check the block you live on. See if the shrubs and trees need to be trimmed and the street lighting is sufficient and bright enough. You can also install motion lights and video cameras to your homes to better deter individuals from entering your property and/or removing packages from your front porch.

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San Francisco Police Department Mourns the Loss of Canine Member

On January 4, 2018 canine "Cavik" of the San Francisco Police Department Tactical Canine Unit crossed the Rainbow Bridge as a result of an illness.

Cavik was a Belgian Malinois Shepherd, trained in patrol and explosive detection. He was born on April 29, 2009 in the Netherlands and traveled to the United States where he joined the San Francisco Police Department in 2011. Upon completing his training, K9 Cavik and his handler Officer Matt Maciel patrolled the streets of San Francisco assisting with suspect searches, conducting explosive sweeps for dignitary visits and large venues, assisting in S.W.A.T. operations, and performing canine demonstrations.

During his almost seven years on patrol, Cavik and Officer Maciel made numerous arrests and had the pleasure of assisting with security at countless special events and VIP visits; most notably the 2012 and 2014 World Series, Super Bowl 50, and 2012 U.S. Open.

Cavik was always eager to go to work but also enjoyed time at home with Officer Maciel and his family. He will be sorely missed by both the Maciel family and SFPD family.



Recent Incidents:

Time/Date: 12/09 1335 hours Location: Mission Street

Crime: Estes Robbery, Child endangerment

Summary: Mission units were responding to a robbery with force at the Factory 2 U store on Mission St. While en-route, dispatch updated the officers the suspects had boarded a MUNI bus. Officers located the bus three blocks north on Mission St and stopped it. When the officers boarded the bus, they found the three suspects as described by dispatch and detained them. Suspect 1 was holding her two year old daughter. All three suspects were in possession of stolen goods from Factory 2 U. Another Mission unit went to Factory 2 U and met with the store manager. The store manager said the suspects attempted to bypass the registers and leave the store with store goods. The store manager attempted to stop all three, and Suspect 1 (while holding the child) pushed the store manager. The security guard grabbed at Suspect 1 from behind and pulled her hair, knocking her to the ground. The store manager then kicked at Suspect 1.

The store security guard, saw the suspects enter the store. He watched the suspect secret clothes and other items via a security mirror. The security guard then attempted to stop the suspects prior to exiting the store, and when he confronted them, Suspect 3 pushed him and they fled. Suspect 2 threatened to pepper spray the security guard outside the store when the security guard attempted to stop them outside. Cold shows with the victims were positive. The child's father came to the scene and took custody of the girl. All subjects were booked for robbery, conspiracy, Suspect 1 for child endangerment, and Suspect 3 for aggravated assault.

Time/Date: 12/13 1343 hours Location: Bernal Dwellings

Crime: Felon in possession of a firearm

Mission housing officers observed a known subject and Army Street gang member in the Bernal Dwellings public housing. A records check showed the subject, Suspect 1, to have two active warrants for his arrest and to be on felony probation for 487(c) PC. A traffic stop of Suspect 1's vehicle was made. Suspect 1 was arrested for the warrants. During a probation search of the vehicle, a loaded Springfield XD .40 pistol was located in Suspect 1's backpack. Along with the firearm, they located over a kilogram of marijuana, 103 Xanax pills, 16 Ecstasy pills, 5 hydrocodone pills, and 17 grams of cocaine. Suspect 1 was charged with the firearm and drug charges as well. Suspect 1 is in custody.

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Recent Incidents Continued:

Time/Date: 12/15 2248 hours Location: 149 Lexington St. Crime: Strong Arm Robbery

Mission officers responded to a report of a strong-arm robbery. The victim stated he was robbed by three people of his iPod and wallet at Mission St and Sycamore St. One of the suspects brandished a knife during the robbery. The victim followed Suspect 1 to 149 Lexington, where Suspect 1 entered the basement. Officers canvassed the area and located a witness who saw Suspect 1 jumping backyard fences. Officers located Suspect 1 three backyards away where he said he had fallen off a fence. Suspect 1 was in possession of the stolen wallet and iPod. Suspect 1 stated he had been given the property by an unknown friend and was unable to explain why he was in the backyard. Cold shows were positive on Suspect 1 and he was booked for the robbery.

Time/Date: 12/23 0203 hours Location: South Van Ness Avenue

Crime: Aggravated Assault

Mission officers responded to a report of a man with a gun at So Van Ness Ave at 19th St. When officers arrived on scene they met with the victims, who are brothers. The victims said they were walking northbound on So Van Ness Ave when Suspect 1 approached them said "f*** you", and pointed a black firearm at them. Victim 1 stated he was afraid and that Victim 2 immediately punched Suspect 1 in the mouth. Suspect 1 then punched Victim 2 in the stomach. Suspect 1 then grabbed a nearby tree branch and began hitting both brothers. Suspect 1 then threw the gun over a fence and was pinned against a wall by both Victims. When officers arrived, they handcuffed Suspect 1, searched the area, and located the gun which turned out to be a bb gun with a holster. Both victims said they had no prior contact with Suspect 1 and did not know him. Suspect 1 refused to give the officers his real name while he was transported to the hospital for treatment of the injuries he sustained. Neither victims required transport. Upon interview with a SIT sergeant, Suspect 1 gave his real name, which showed two felony warrants, one from San Mateo and one from San Francisco. Suspect 1 remains at SFGH pending booking.

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Definitions:

Robbery: Robbery is the felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his person or immediate presence, and against his well, accomplished by means of force or fear.

Possession of Stolen Property, 496 PC: (a) Every person who buys or receives any property that has been stolen or that has been obtained in any manner constituting theft or extortion, knowing the property to be so stolen or obtained, or who conceals, sells, withholds, or aids in concealing, selling, or withholding any property from the owner, knowing the property to be so stolen or obtained, shall be punished by imprisonment in a county jail for not more than one year, or imprisonment pursuant to subdivision (h) of Section 1170. However, if the value of the property does not exceed nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950), the offense shall be a misdemeanor, punishable only by imprisonment in a county jail not exceeding one year, if such person has no prior convictions for an offense specified in clause (iv) of subparagraph (C) of paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of Section 667 or for an offense requiring registration pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 290.

Warrant: A document issued by a legal or government official authorizing the police or some other body to make an arrest, search premises, or carry out some other action relating to the administration of justice.

Aggravated Assault: An aggravated assault, punishable in all states as a felony, is committed when a defendant intends to do more than merely frighten the victim. Common types of aggravated assaults are those accompanied by an intent to kill, rob, or rape. An assault with a dangerous weapon is aggravated if there is an intent to cause serious harm. Pointing an unloaded gun at a victim to frighten the individual is not considered an aggravated assault.

A Community Police Services Aide performs a variety of police related duties for the San Francisco Police Department. Essential functions may vary depending on assignment and may include: accepts and processes complaints in person or over the telephone; ensures security of restricted areas and property; utilizes two-way radios; completes reports and forms; provides information and assistance to the public; assists ill or injured citizens; assists in receiving, storing, and releasing of property; utilizes a computer terminal to enter and retrieve information; provides crowd management during events and emergency situations; sorts, files, and maintains reports and records.



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What is the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT)?

The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) is comprised of community members, mental health advocates, health service providers, and police officers working together to provide cutting edge training for law enforcement officers. The goal of CIT is to instruct officers how to effectively manage behavioral crisis situations in the field. The training is designed to teach officers how to manage individuals in behavioral crisis using descalation techniques and time, distance, and cover for the safety of all individuals. CIT training provides an additional set of tools that officers can utilize to de-escalate situations and obtain a safe and positive outcome for the officer and consumer. This is accomplished by teaching officers the inner workings of a crisis, including the feelings and emotions (or lack thereof) an individual experiences during a crisis situation.

CIT curriculum addresses the following topics: Verbal De-escalation Scenarios; Mental Health Disorders; Medical Issues; Psychotropic Drugs and Side Effects; Juvenile Mental Health; Geriatric Mental Health; Family Perspective by the National Alliance on Mental Illness; Suicide and Suicide Intervention; Dual Diagnosis; Vicarious Trauma; Self-Care; Conflict Resolution; Suicide by Cop; PTSD Signs and Symptoms; Veteran Encounters and Interactions; Homeless Outreach; Department Policy and Procedures; Intellectual Disabilities; Spectrum Disorders; and Substance Use and Mental Health. CIT is supported through the leadership of the Police Commission, SFPD Command Staff, The Mayor's Office on Disability, SF District Attorney's Office, SF Public Defender's Office, Office of Citizen Complaints, SF Mental Health Board, mental health advocates, health service providers and community members.

Protocols for CIT call responses are covered in Department Bulletin 14-143 Response by Crisis Intervention Trained Officers, (See Attached) and San Francisco Division of Emergency Communications Training Bulletins, TB11-031 and TB14-013

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
