



Recently there were some questions about how to best report crimes. Here is some information that was published in a previous newsletter that may be useful.

Here is some useful information for our Park residents about reporting crimes and obtaining police services. If you are reporting a crime that is in progress, dial 9-1-1 immediately. Also, call 9-1-1 to report fires, medical emergencies and any emergencies related to public safety.

To report a non-emergency incident (a crime that has already occurred and the suspects are gone), please call the SFPD non-emergency phone number at 415-553-0123 to have an officer dispatched to meet with you.

You may also go to any SFPD district station to make a report. Park Station is located at: 1899 Waller Street.



PARK STATION'S OFFICERS OF THE MONTH FOR FEBRUARY 2018



It's a proven fact that police presence brings down crime, however, we know it is impossible to have police presence everywhere 24/7. Captain Bailey dedicated Officers Jeffery Sung, Ashley Slomowitz, and Michael Reilly as Park Station's homeless outreach officers. These three officers have been tasked with providing outreach to the homeless population within the Park district, with a focus on the parks in the district as well as high-traffic areas. The team performs well-being checks and attempts to engage individuals into services and other resources as identified by the community and their own daily observations. These officers are tasked with teaming up with Richmond Police Station Officers, the Department of Public Works, the Recreation & Parks Department, the Park Rangers, and SF HOT to reduce the number of calls for service and to improve the quality of life for everyone within the community. These officers are out on a daily basis maintaining a high-visibility police presence in providing admonishments, issuing citations, and making arrests when deemed appropriate. Their high-visibility and efforts to identify as many people as possible makes suspects think twice about committing crimes while visiting our neighborhoods.

Larry Rosenfeld was born in Southern California and acquired an appreciation for San Francisco and the Bay Area quite young. Larry had his eighth birthday in Cuernavaca, Mexico where his family lived during much of that year. After high school, Larry migrated around California attending different colleges, the last one being Stanford University, where he did his graduate work in Electrical Engineering. Larry spent the bulk of his professional career in Santa Rosa with Hewlett-Packard Company and its spin-off, Agilent Technologies. It was in Santa Rosa that his daughter was born.

Upon his retirement from Agilent in 2006, Larry and his wife moved to the Inner Sunset and he busied himself doing volunteer work at All Saints' Episcopal Church in the Upper Haight. Larry's daughter, son-in-law, and granddaughter live quite near him (although in the Taraval District). In 2009, Larry became treasurer and a board member of Inner Sunset Park Neighbors, and soon after, when then-Chief George Gascón, and then-Captain David Lazar asked all the district commanding officers to implement Community Police Advisory Boards at their stations, Larry became the representative from the Inner Sunset to Park Station.

In 2011, Larry took over from Richard Magary as representative from Park to the Citywide CPAB committee.

Captain Bailey and Park Station would like to thank Larry for his dedication, and generosity he has shown to the community, and all the officers at Park Station.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- <u>Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users</u>: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- <u>Foot Patrols</u>: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Weekly Email Updates</u>: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

COFFEE WITH A COP

On Thursday, 1/25/18, from 9:30am to 10:30am, SFPD's Park Station held their "Coffee with a Cop" event at Duboce Park Cafe, located at 2 Sanchez Street, where officers, and the Duboce Triangle community members conversed over their beverage of choice. This "Coffee with a Cop" event went well, and had numerous members of the community attend, and engage in conversations regarding quality of life issues, and concerns pertaining to the Duboce Triangle neighborhood. Captain Bailey was accompanied by Lieutenant Santos, Officers Sung, Wu, Abaunza, Aguilar, Reilly, and Deignan. These officers fielded questions about law enforcement issues and quality of life concerns pertaining to the surrounding neighborhoods. Park Station appreciates the members of the community, especially Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB) member and Duboce Triangle Neighborhood Association (DTNA) member, Mark Scheuer, the President of DNTA, Kimyn Braithwaite, and her daughter, Savannah, who participated, and engaged in several substantive conversations about the Park District.

Special thanks to the manager, Pablo, and assistant manager, Naomi, of Duboce Park Cafe for being so accommodating, and allowing Park Station to have our "Coffee with a Cop" event at their cafe.

Civil Sidewalks Warning—100 block of Church St.—01/17/2018 8:04 am

Officers on patrol in the area observed a subject asleep inside of a sleeping bag in violation of the Civil Sidewalks Ordinance. Officers warned the subject regarding his violation and called the Homeless Outreach Team to assist him

Civil Sidewalks Citation—1400 block of Haight St.—01/19/2018 10:32 am

Officers observed a subject sitting in the above area in violation of the Civil Sidewalk Ordinance. The subject had been previously arrested for violating the sit/lie ordinance and officers cited him for his violation.

<u>Battery/Obstructing Peace Officer Duties/Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—Area of Irving St.—</u> 01/19/2018 12:53 pm

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a battery. Upon arrival, two unknown females approached the officers and stated that they witnessed a female suspect assaulting a male subject. The officers spoke with the victim who stated that an unknown female subject began to kick and yell at him. Officers located the female suspect and detained her. The suspect refused to follow simple commands and became argumentative. It was discovered that the female suspect had a local SF warrant. Officers requested an ambulance and medics transported her to SFGH for her altered mental status.

Terrorist Threats/Malicious Mischief—2000 block of Oak St.—01/21/2018 3:36 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a person being threatened with a sword. Officers located an individual that matched the description that was broadcasted by dispatch. The subject was detained without incident. Officers contacted the victim, who identified the person that had threatened him. The subject was arrested, and transported to Park Station.

Battery—Area of Haight St. /Masonic Ave—01/21/2018 4:22 pm

Officers were dispatched to the above area regarding an assault. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the victim, who stated that while she was getting on the MUNI bus she slightly bumped into an unknown subject, who started to yell obscenities at her. The subject later approached the victim while she was sitting, and pushed the right side of her face against the window. The MUNI bus stopped, and the suspect exited through the rear door. Officers searched the area for the suspect with negative results.

Terrorist Threats—1500 block of Haight St.—01/21/2018 6:13 pm

Victim walked into Park Station to report a verbal threat. The reporting party stated that an individual followed her out of a building at the above location, and stated he was going to harm her. Then the subject walked away from the report party. The victim was afraid for her safety, and wanted to document this incident.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1700 block of Irving St.—01/22/2018 8:44 am


Officer responded to the above location, and contacted a subject with an outstanding warrant for his arrest. The subject was arrested and transported to Park Station.

Malicious Mischief/Vandalism to Property—Area of Ashbury St. /Frederick St.—01/23/2018 6:46 am

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a possible vandalism. Upon arrival, officers observed glass on the ground underneath a bus shelter glass panel that had been shattered. Officers canvassed the area for unknown suspects, witnesses, and cameras with negative results.

Burglary/Unlawful Entry—Unit block of Villa Ter.—01/20/2018 11:53 am

Officer responded to the above area regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, the officer spoke with the reporting party, who stated that she was advised by her neighbor that her garage door was open. When reporting party checked her garage, she noticed that her road bike and helmet had been stolen. Officers noticed a found property call for service regarding a bicycle. Officers confirmed that the found bicycle was the reporting party's stolen bicycle.

Burglary/Forcible Entry—100 block of Beaver St.—01/20/2018 2:53 pm

Officers responded to the above area regarding a burglary report. Upon arrival, officers met with a resident of the building, who stated he heard a noise coming from his back yard. When he looked out of the window, he observed an unknown male subject in the backyard of his neighbor's house attempting to slide open the rear door. The resident told the subject he was calling 9-1-1, and the subject fled the scene. Officers searched the area for the subject with negative results.

Officers responded to the above area regarding a report of a burglary. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim, who stated that his residence was burglarized. He observed miscellaneous items around the house moved around, and his laptop and thumb drive were missing from his room. There were no apparent signs of forced entry and no surveillance cameras nearby.

Burglary/Unlawful Entry—Unit block of Hermann St. -01/22/2018 2:52 pm


Officer responded to the above location regarding a burglary. Upon arrival, the officer met with the victim, who stated that two of his tool bags located inside his garage were missing. It was determined that the point of entry and exit was the maintenance room door. The officer was unable to locate any surveillance cameras in the area that may have captured the incident.

Two officers responded to the above location regarding a burglary. Officers contacted the victim, who stated that the safe in his garage was tampered with, and items inside were stolen. Theft from Locked Vehicle—01/23/2018 8:10 pm


Back window of station wagon was smashed. Bag containing wallet was stolen.

Store Robbery with Force—1500 block of Haight St.—01/23/2018 2:05 pm

Officers responded to the above location to investigate a shoplifting incident. Upon arrival, officers met with the reporting party, who stated that he observed an unknown suspect enter the store, grab two jackets, and exit the building without attempting to pay for the items. The manager confronted the suspect outside, who then took an aggressive fighting stance. Fearing for his life, the manager returned back into the store and called 9-1-1. SFPD units searched the above area in an attempt to locate the suspect with negative results.



ARREST OF THE WEEK

On 1/24/18, at approximately 7am, Officers Sung, Slomowitz, and Reilly were on in full SFPD uniform, and patrolling the area of Buena Vista Park when Officer Reilly observed an unknown woman sleeping in the park, in violation of 3.13 Park Code, which states that it is unlawful to sleep in a park between the hours of 8pm to 8am.

Officers Sung, Slomowitz, and Reilly made contact and identified the subject. A computer query revealed that the subject had two (2) active warrants for her arrest, and was under court supervised probation. With the approval of Sergeant Kim, the subject was booked for the two (2) warrants, and sleeping in the park, and later was transported to County Jail #1.






PREVENTING CRIMES

Twin Peaks Viewpoint, a destination frequented by numerous tourists on a daily basis for the beautiful view of the city, is well known to SFPD's Park Station and the surrounding neighbors as a hotspot for crimes. Because of this, Captain Sanford #657 requested Sergeant Kim #4171, to conduct crime abatement operations to attempt to reduce the crimes committed in the surrounding area of Twin Peaks.

In the month of August 2017, Sergeant Kim conducted several crime abatement operations in the Twin Peaks area. The crime abatement operations were successful in identifying several career vehicle burglars that are active in the Twin Peaks area.

Park Station would like to remind the community to please report any suspicious activity so we can do our best to address the problem. Park Station would also like to remind the community to please keep valuables out of view of the public and also to refrain from placing valuables in their cars unattended!!



HELPFUL TIPS

DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!

- 1. When placing an online or phone order, request signed confirmation upon delivery
- 2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
- 3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
- 4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
- 5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
- 6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
- 7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
- 8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
- 9. Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



COMMUNITY POLICE ADVISORY BOARD

We have continued to facilitate and sustain on-going dialogues with the members of the community to cultivate and expand the regional Community Policing Advisory Board (CPAB). CPAB has routinely contributed to facilitating many community events, discussions, and informal outreach with all members of the community. Since the onset of this larger project, we have held many community engagement events, which have been successfully facilitated by law enforcement personnel from Park Station with the assistance of members of CPAB such as: as "National Night Out", the 'Meet the Beat" neighborhood forum series, Community meetings, and the "Coffee with a Cop" outreach series. We have also promoted and provided updates on these CPAB-facilitated events in our station's Newsletter, with upbeat and informative articles that describe the work of our officers alongside CPAB members. As mentioned previously, CPAB consists of senior leaders in the community who are invested in and committed to enriching the relationship between law enforcement and the community it serves. CPAB is an integral part of the dynamic evolution of this community engagement project.

These weekly and monthly events, which encourage all members of the community to participate and engage with Police, provide us with a direct opportunity to listen to people, and to hear their concerns and perspectives, which we in turn share with the committee for further review and consideration. Our commitment to community policing is enriched tremendously by these engagements and ultimately assist our goal in providing the highest level of public service and safety to the communities we serve.

San Francisco Police Seeking Public Assistance in Castro Street Incident

On January 20, 2018 at approximately 3:12PM, San Francisco police officers responded to an incident on the 400 block of Castro Street in which a van was driven onto the sidewalk. Following an investigation, the driver of the van, Kenneth Rotter was arrested and charged with aggravated assault, attempted murder, felony vandalism, hit and run, reckless driving, driving under the influence (drugs) and vehicle code violations.

This incident occurred on a busy Saturday afternoon and many people were in the area enjoying the day. Investigators from the Mission Station Investigation Team (SIT) are seeking witnesses. Anyone with information who has not spoken with an investigator is asked to contact the SFPD 24 Hour Tip Line at (415) 575-4444.

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Three Steps To Becoming An ALERT volunteer:

- Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert
- Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfqov.org
- After clearing a basic background check you will be eligible to register for one of our quarterly ALERT training classes.


