Hello all,

Park Station's officers continue to do great work to ensure the safety of our community, and to increase everyone's sense of security and safety. We continue to pay special attention to the community's concerns within the Panhandle, and its surrounding areas. We hope that our efforts in the Park District are making a difference, because it's our main goal to ensure everyone in our community feels safe.

I want to review with everyone how you can best avoid being a victim of a burglary. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. Just this week we had three individual arrests of suspects caught breaking into vehicles and all because citizens called 911 to report the crime in progress. Our officers responded quickly and were able to take these suspects into custody. This just goes to show how we can work together to make our community safer just by calling 911 when you see a crime in progress.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.

On Wednesday, 3/28/18, at approximately 9:30am to 10:30am, SFPD's Park Station held the "Coffee with a Cop" event at Peet's Coffee & Tea, located at 919 Cole Street, where officers, and the Cole Valley community members conversed over their selected beverage of choice. This "Coffee with a Cop" went well, and had approximately 15 members of the community attend, and engage in conversations regarding quality of life issues, and concerns pertaining to the neighborhood. In attendance from Park Station was Sergeant Meyer, Sergeant Morris, Officer Wu, Officer Deignan, Officer Chicas, Officer Zuckerman, and Officer Villatoro. Officers fielded questions about law enforcement issues and quality of life concerns pertaining to the neighborhood. Park Station appreciates the members of the community, who participated, and engaged in several substantive conversations about the Park District.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

PARK STATION—ARREST**Arrests:****Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1700 block of Fulton St.—03/24/2018 5:10 pm**

Officers were on patrol and observed a wanted subject in the above area. Officers observed the subject exit a building and detained him. A records check revealed that he had an outstanding warrant for assault and battery, grand theft, and resisting arrest. The subject was booked at Park Station.

Driving License Suspended or Revoked—200 block of Ashbury St.—03/27/2018 6:35 pm

An officer observed a vehicle make a left hand turn in an area with a posted “no left turn” sign. The officer initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle in the above listed area. Upon making contact with the driver, it was discovered that he did not have his driver’s license because it was suspended. The subject was cited and the vehicle was towed.

Driving While Under the Influence of Alcohol/Driving License Suspended or Revoked/Traffic Violation Arrest—Area of Waller St. /Stanvan St.—03/28/2018 12:15 am

Officers were dispatched to the area in regards to a possible drunk driver. Upon arrival, officers observed a vehicle with flat tires occupied by a female passenger and male driver. A strong odor of an alcoholic beverage was emitting from the vehicle. Officers made contact with the male subject who was sweating profusely and spoke with a slurred speech. A records check revealed that the male subject’s license had been suspended, and he complied with performing the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests. The subject was placed under arrest for driving under the influence and was later booked at County Jail.

Park Code Violation—Area of Kezar Dr. /John F Kennedy Dr.—03/28/2018 6:00 am

Officers observed a male subject sleeping in a sleeping bag in Golden Gate Park in violation of the Park Code. Officers made contact with the subject and transported him to Park Station in an attempt to verify his identification. He was cited and released from Park Station without further incident.

Search Warrant Service/ Hallucinogenic Possession for Sale—1000 block of Howard St.—03/28/2018 3:13 pm

Officers went to the above address to serve a search warrant. Officers detained the subject inside the residence and conducted a search. Officers found sandwich bags containing large amounts of marijuana, concentrated cannabis, and zip lock bags containing suspected psilocybin mushrooms. The subject was arrested and transported to Park Station for booking.

LIST OF CRIMES**Incidents:****Theft/Pickpocket—400 block of Castro St.—03/23/2018 12:07 am**

Officers responded to the area regarding a pickpocket theft. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim, who stated that he was at the above location when an unknown male brushed up against him. The victim immediately noticed his cell phone was missing from his front pocket and the unknown suspect had fled the scene. Officers searched the area for video surveillance cameras with negative results.

Theft from Locked Vehicle—Area of Kezar Dr. /Lincoln way—03/25/2018 7:30 pm

Victim walked into Park Station to report that his rental vehicle had been broken into. The front right passenger window had been shattered by an unknown suspect. Nothing was stolen from inside, and there were no surveillance cameras that may have captured the incident.

Fraudulent Use of Automated teller Card—900 block of Cole St.—03/27/2018 3:20 pm

Officers responded to a call regarding a subject using fraudulent credit cards in a store located at the above address. Officers spoke with the owner who stated that he observed an unknown male subject attempting to purchase groceries. The subject continued to swipe multiple credit cards, and then ran out of the store without making any purchases. The owner recognized the subject who has a history of using fraudulent credit cards. Officers searched the area for the subject with negative results.

Theft from Locked Vehicle—Area of Frederick St. /Stanvan St.—03/27/2018 5:01 pm

Victim walked into Park Station to report that her vehicle was broken into. The driver's side rear window was smashed out and multiple items were stolen by an unknown suspect. Her bank statements were also stolen, and officers advised her to contact her bank regarding this incident.

Theft from Merchant or Library/Imitation Exhibiting deadly Weapon—600 block of Stanvan St.—03/28/2018 2:07 pm

Officers responded to a business regarding a theft at the above address. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the security guard who observed an intoxicated male subject, holding a golf club, grab wine and salmon from the store shelf, walk outside, making no attempt to pay for the items. The victim followed the subject and grabbed his arm in order to stop him. The subject raised his arms and began waving the golf club in the air. The subject was placed under arrest and booked at Park Station for theft and exhibiting a deadly weapon.

An officer responded to the above area regarding a call of a burglary. Upon arrival, the officer spoke with a victim, who stated that his garage door was malfunctioning, and discovered that an unknown suspect had stolen two bikes, snowboard, and skateboard from inside the garage.

Burglary/Forcible Entry—500 block of Buena Vista Av.—03/26/2018 9:00 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a burglary report. Upon arrival, officers met with the manager of the building who stated that she noticed two open cardboard parcels on a shelf in the laundry room. Surveillance footage showed two suspects with a dog enter the building from the front door by prying it open with an unknown device. The subjects grabbed two parcels from the mail boxes and carried them out to the parking lot.

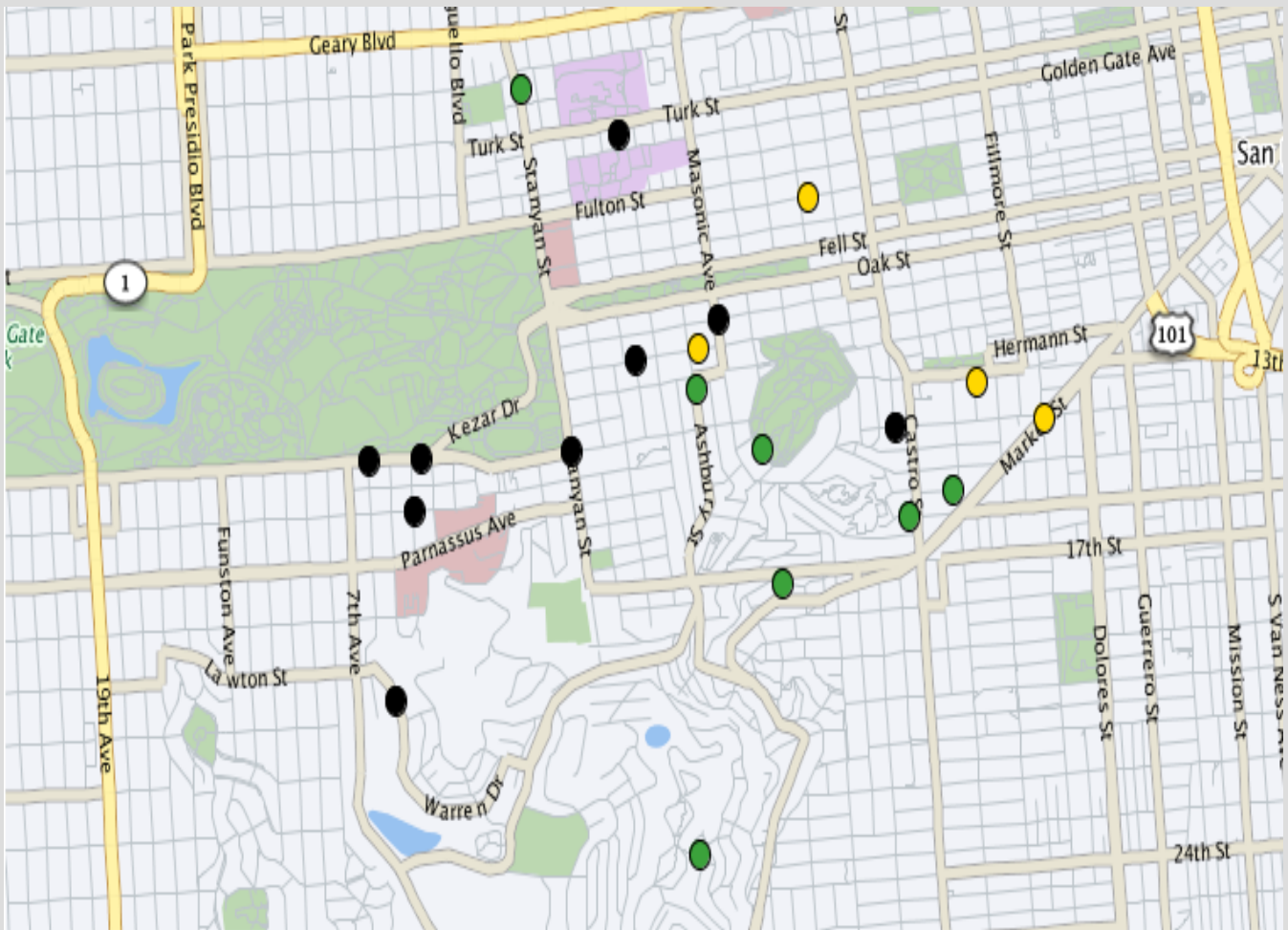
Burglary/Unlawful Entry—700 block of Ashbury St.—03/27/2018 11:48 am

Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the victim who stated that he noticed items missing from the storage area of his apartment complex. Video surveillance footage showed a male subject enter the front entry gate and leave the area holding the missing items.

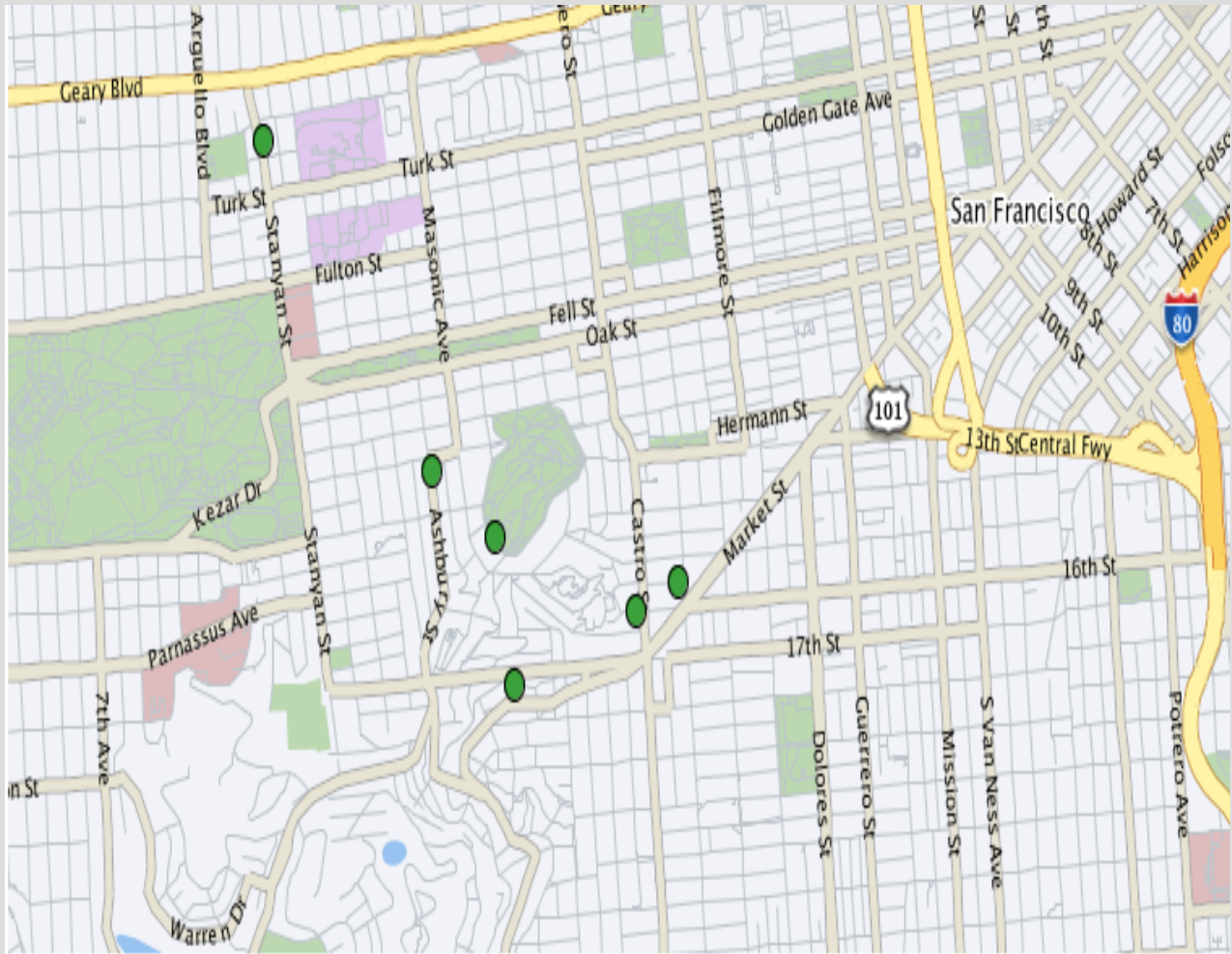

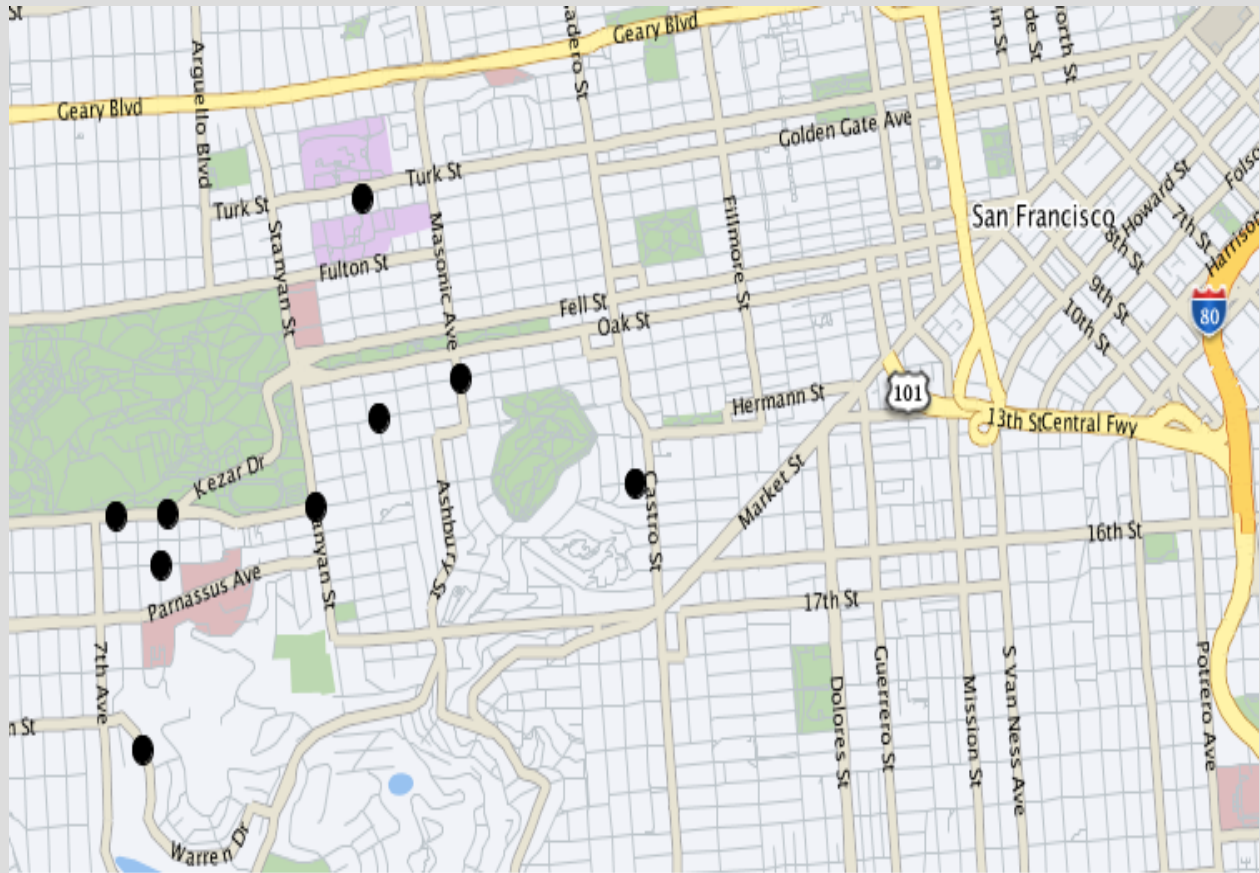

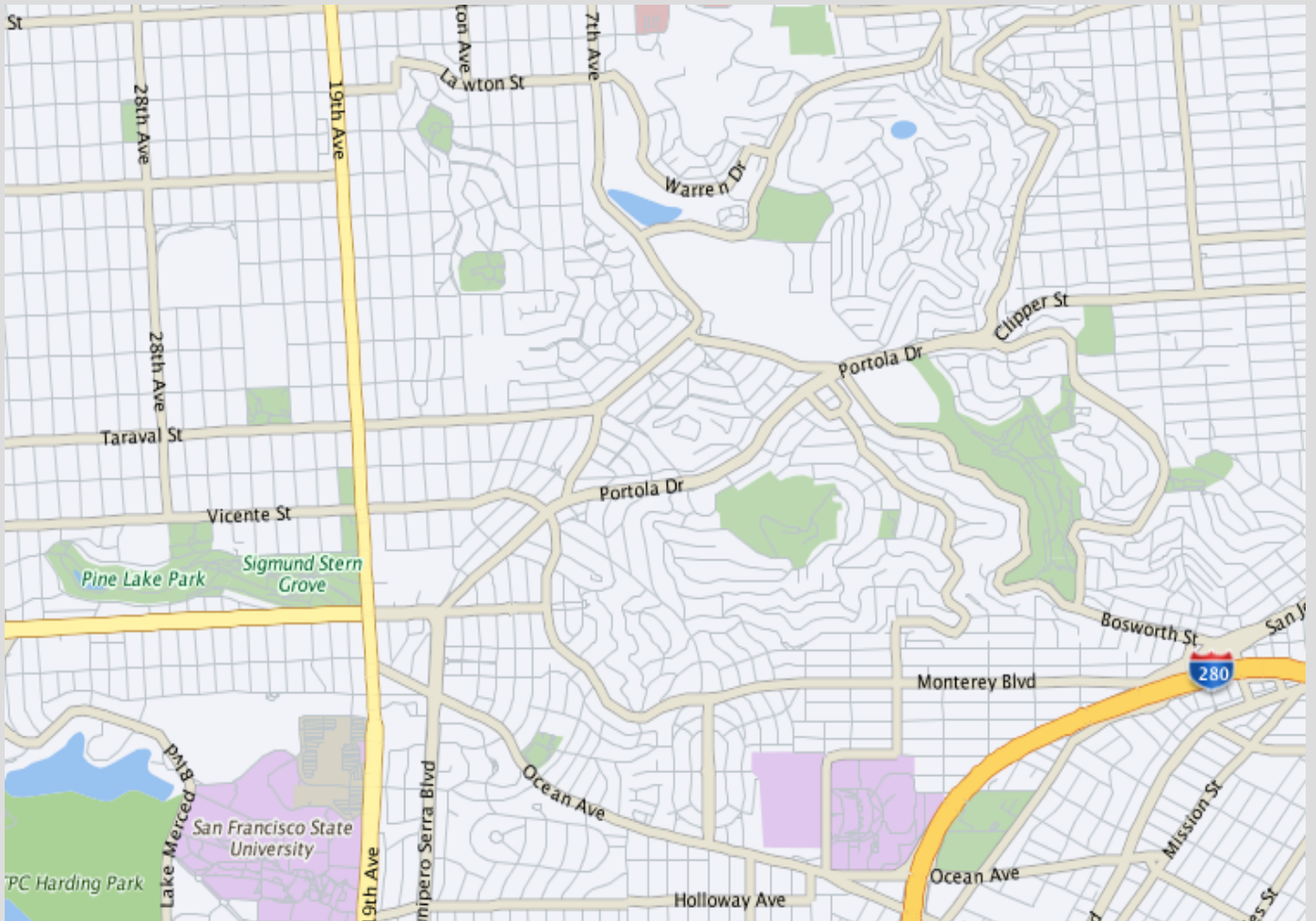

SAFETY TIP FROM S.F. SAFE



Safety tip for your home:

Help first responders by making sure your address numbers are mounted on a high-contrast background, and that they're illuminated when it's dark.

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

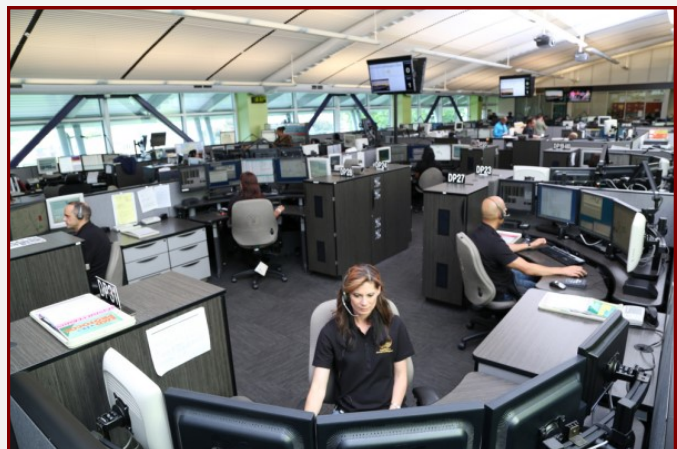
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
