



4/20- A DAY IN THE PARK

Friday, April 20th came and went, billowing, and later dissipating, through Golden Gate Park like an enormous plume of smoke. Once again, the illustrious date beckoned thousands to San Francisco to participate in the "4/20" experience, which culminates in Hippie Hill at 4:20 pm, with a sustained moment of communal pot-smoking. At the conclusion of the event, crowds fan out of the park, into to the Haight/Ashbury area.

It has been well-publicized that California legalized cannabis, for adults 21 and older, on Nov. 8, 2016. Since then, adults 21 and older may lawfully possess up to an ounce of cannabis flowers, 8 grams of pot extracts, as well as give up to an ounce of Cannabis to other adults 21 and older. The legal provision also stipulates that adults 21 and older are allowed to cultivate up to six marijuana plants. In recent years, the 4/20 event has garnered an aura of "taboo" given that it was skirting legality. However, this is the first year since Cannabis was formally recognized, within the scope of state law, as a technically permissible substance within California. However, it should be noted it is illegal for anyone to smoke cannabis in public.

As expected, Robin Williams Meadow and Hippie Hill were abuzz with throngs of people who came to demonstrate their profound appreciation of cannabis, and the ingestion of this plant in its various forms. This was the second year that "4/20" in San Francisco's partially permitted cannabis celebration in the park, as orchestrated by local Haight Street Merchant, Alex Aquino, who raised funds for the permits and organized the event. Under the direction of event organizer, Alex Aquino, the entire area of Robin Williams and Hippie Hill was fully fenced-in. Gated admissions were facilitated by private security which was inside the 4/20 event. SFPD was not inside the designated 4/20 area, but police provided constant enforcement and security support to areas outside the event which were extremely busy and well-trafficked.



730 STANYAN STREET

As you all know the city has designated the old Mc Donald's site located at 730 Stanyan Street for the construction of an affordable housing complex.

The Mayor's office of Housing and Community Development recently had a meeting where they were soliciting suggestions for the interim use of the location. This interim time period could last several years while the city complete their plans for the long term use of the site.

The City wants only self-sustaining operations at the location. Some ideas that seem to be gaining traction are a parking lot, mixed use community space similar to Hayes Valley and a navigation center. If you believe the use of this site is important to you and your neighborhood then I would highly recommend you attend the next meeting which is slated for Thursday May 17th at 6pm. The location is to be determined, but the default location is the Park Branch Library—1833 Page Street.

The Department of elections encourages San Franciscans to get READY, SET, and VOTE in the June 5, 2018, election. To get ready, eligible San Franciscans need to register to vote or update their registration by May 21. To get set to vote, find information about all local offices and measures in the Voter Information Pamphlet or online voter guide. To vote, San Francisco Elections offers options: vote at City Hall beginning May 7, vote by mail (requests by May 29), or vote at your polling place on Election Day. Visit sfelections.org or call (415) 554-4375.

Poll Workers Needed!

The Department of Elections seeks volunteer poll workers for the June 5 election. On Election Day, poll workers assist voters at each of San Francisco's 583 polling places. Poll workers must be California residents, U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents, and at least 18 years old. To assist San Francisco's diverse electorate, people fluent in Chinese, Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, or Korean in addition to English are encouraged to apply. For their day of service, all poll workers receive training, a stipend up to \$195, and a commemorative pin. Apply in person at City Hall, Room 48, Monday—Friday, 10 am—4 pm. BIKE, WALK, AND ROLL TO SCHOOL DAY

On Wednesday, April 18, 2018, Officer Wu, Officer Zuckerman, Officer Deignan, and the Captain's Clerk, Miss April, had the opportunity to participate in the Chinese Immersion School's Bike, Roll, and Walk to School Event. In attendance were approximately 30 students, parents, families, teachers, and community members.

The Bike and Walk to School Event is a national movement that first started in 1997. Since then, it's come a long way, even gathering international participation. Events such as these aim to bring together communities to promote: Healthier habits such as regular physical activity, cleaner environments by reducing automobile pollution, and a focus on safety.



DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- <u>Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users</u>: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- <u>Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings</u>: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- <u>Weekly Email Updates</u>: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and <u>battery</u> is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Warrant Arrest/Loitering Where Narcotics are Sold—1500 block of Haight St.—04/21/2018 3:00 pm

Officers in plainclothes observed a male approach another unknown male subject in the above area. It appeared that one of the subjects was attempting to set up a future sale of illegal drugs or narcotics to the other subject. Officers approached the subject and told him that he was being detained. It was discovered that the detained subject had a misdemeanor bench warrant for his arrest out of San Bernardino County for resisting arrest. The subject was advised of loitering for the purpose of illegal drug activity and arrested for his warrant.

Park Code Violation—100 block of John F. Kennedy Dr.—04/25/2018 1:15 pm

Officers were dispatched to the above location regarding a subject throwing rocks at people in the area. Upon arrival, officer made contact with the subject who became combative and refused to talk. The subject ran off. Officers chased the subject and placed him in handcuffs. Officers requested an ambulance for the subject who complained of pain to pre-existing scabs on his body. The subject stated that he was not injured by police officers and was transported to UCSF to be treated. The subject was later cited for his violations.

Park Code Violation/False Identification to Peace Officer—Oak St. /Lyon St.—04/25/2018 3:31 pm

Officers were patrolling the area in order to conduct welfare checks, provide outreach, and monitor potential criminal activity in the park. In the above area, officers observed an unknown figure sleeping on the ground. Officers informed the subject of the park code violation and it was discovered that he had an outstanding warrant from Glendale. Glendale PD did not wish to take action on the warrant. Officers issued the subject a citation for sleeping in the park and falsely identifying himself to a peace officer.

Vandalism to vehicle/Battery—Area of Laguna Honda Blvd. /Woodside Ave.—04/25/2018 10:14 pm
Officers responded to the area regarding vandalism to a vehicle. Upon arrival, officers ordered the subject to drop a knife he was holding. The subject complied and was taken into custody without further incident.
Officers spoke with the victim who stated that he was a Lyft driver and picked up the subject who asked if he could smoke a cigarette. The victim stated that it was not allowed and the subject punched him on the shoulder, got out of the vehicle, took out a knife and slashed his vehicle tires. Officers transported the subject to

Terrorist Threats—600 block of Broderick St.—04/28/2018 3:08 am

Officers responded to a call of a person with a knife in the above area. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the resident, who advised officers that his roommate had brandished a kitchen knife towards his girlfriend and threatened to kill her. Officers arrested the suspect and transported him to Park Station, where he was booked for criminal threats and brandishing a weapon.

Traffic Violation Arrest—Unit block of Twin Peaks Blvd.—04/28/2018 12:00 pm

An officer observed a motorcycle traveling in the area fail to stop at the limit line of a stop sign. The officer effected a traffic stop and made contact with the driver. It was discovered that the motorcycle was unregistered and the subject's license was suspended. The officer cited him for the above violations.

PARK STATION- GREAT ARREST!

Driving With No License Issued—Area of Frederick St. /Arguello Blvd.—04/28/2018 3:25 pm

Officers observed a female subject driving while having a cellphone in her hand, held up to her ear. Officers performed a traffic stop at the above intersection and made contact with the driver. It was discovered that her driver's license was expired and she was issued a citation for the above violations.

Hallucinogenic Possession for Sale—Area of Haight St. / Masonic Ave.—04/28/2018 3:49 pm

Officers working in plainclothes capacity observed an individual with a plastic bag in his hand containing suspected marijuana making an exchange with another individual. The subject asked the officers if they wanted "shrooms or acid tabs" referring to Psilocybin Mushrooms and LSD. The subject pointed to his friend across the street and told the officers to go there. The officers suspected both subjects were working together in a criminal conspiracy to sell narcotics. Officers detained both subjects for a narcotics investigation and conducted a probable cause search. Officers located suspected LSD tabs and suspected marijuana. Both subjects were booked at Park Station for possession of drugs for sale, conspiracy, and possession of marijuana for sale.

Hallucinogenic Sale—Area of Haight St. /Belvedere St.—04/29/2018 5:36 pm

Plainclothes officers responded to the above location due to a complaint of drug sales occurring in the area. Officers observed a male subject holding a green vegetable substance, which was suspected to be marijuana, in his hand and openly displaying it to the public. While officers proceeded to walk by the subject, he was actively trying to sell LSD and the officers arrested him by placing him in handcuffs. Officers conducted an arrest cause search and located additional suspected LSD and marijuana. The suspect was booked at Park Station for possession of marijuana and LSD tabs for sale.

Civil Sidewalks Citation—100 block of Church St.—04/30/2018 8:29 am


Two officers observed a male subject lying on the sidewalk in violation of the Civil Sidewalk ordinance. Officers made contact with the subject and issued him a citation.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- · Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

SAFETY TIP FROM S.F. SAFE



Safety tip for your home:

Help first responders by making sure your address numbers are mounted on a high-contrast background, and that they're illuminated when it's dark.

HELPFUL TIPS

DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!

- 1. When placing an online or phone order, request signed confirmation upon delivery
- 2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
- 3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
- 4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
- 5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
- 6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
- 7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
- 8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
- 9. Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?


3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an <u>immediate</u> police response.


9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

- Complete NERT training and receive certification.

 forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the

 for ALERT training.
- If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
