Some ideas that seem to be gaining traction are a soccer field, a parking lot, mixed use community space similar to Hayes Valley and a navigation center. YOUR CITY. YOUR CHOICE

The Department of elections encourages San Franciscans to get READY, SET, and VOTE in the June 5, 2018, election. To get ready, eligible San Franciscans need to register to vote or update their registration by May 21. To get set to vote, find information about all local offices and measures in the Voter Information Pamphlet or online voter guide. To vote, San Francisco Elections offers options: vote at City Hall beginning May 7, vote by mail (requests by May 29), or vote at your polling place on Election Day. Poll Workers Needed!

The Department of Elections seeks volunteer poll workers for the June 5 election. On Election Day, poll workers assist voters at each of San Francisco's 583 polling places. Poll workers must be California residents, U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents, and at least 18 years old. To assist San Francisco's diverse electorate, people fluent in Chinese, Spanish, Filipino, Vietnamese, or Korean in addition to English are encouraged to apply. For their day of service, all poll workers receive training, a stipend up to \$195, and a commemorative pin. Apply in person at City Hall, Room 48, Monday–Friday, 10 am–4 pm. On Saturday, April 14, 2018, the San Francisco Coordinating Council of Lions Clubs held their 55th Annual Police, Firefighters, and Sheriffs' Award Night, recognizing Peace Officers, Firefighters, and Sheriffs', who protect and serve the community. Officer Jennifer Granucci #371 was honored by the San Francisco Coordinating Council of the Lions Clubs for her outstanding service, and dedication to the community.

Officer Granucci has been a Police Officer with SFPD for 19 years. She is assigned to Park Station as the School Resource Officer. Officer Granucci exhibits professionalism and dedication to duty each and every day. Officer Granucci educates children and parents alike on traffic safety and personal safety. When necessary she enforces the law and has conducted complicated investigations that have resulted in felony arrests, but most importantly, her actions and attention to detail result in children feeling safer in their schools. These children know they have an officer, who listens to them and takes the necessary action to ensure their safety. In a time when children are very aware of the type of violence that has occurred in schools, I think this is a service that cannot be underestimated. I, as captain of Park Station am very happy to see that Officer Granucci received this very deserved award.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

- Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users: Park Station officers coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.
- Foot Patrols: Park Station runs full time beat officers assigned to Haight Street.
- Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings: Community Meetings are held continuously. Officers also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving.
- Weekly Email Updates: Park Station sends out weekly email newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents to crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.



CRIME NOTES*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

PARK STATION—ARREST**Arrests:****Civil Sidewalks Warning/Municipal Police Code Violation—1100 block of Masonic Ave.—05/03/2018 8:09 am**

Two officers observed a subject sitting on the sidewalk while drinking out of a beer bottle. Officers made contact with the subject and advised him that he was in violation of the Civil Sidewalk Ordinance. He was cited for drinking an alcoholic beverage in a public place.

Methamphetamine Offense/Heroin Offense/Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1400 block of Haight St.—05/05/2018 8:47 pm

Officers arrived at the above location and detained a subject who had an outstanding warrant for his arrest. A computer check revealed that the subject had three active warrants for possession of methamphetamine, petty theft, and shoplifting. Officers transported the subject to be booked at SF County Jail. Officers inspected the subject's bag and located plastic baggies of suspected methamphetamine and suspected heroin.

Controlled Substance Offense—700 block of Stanvan St.—05/06/2018 4:57 pm

Officers dressed in plainclothes observed three subjects sitting on the grass in the above listed area. It appeared that one of the subjects had completed a narcotics transaction. Officers made contact with the subjects. Officers observed a small amount of marijuana and suspected psilocybin mushrooms with one of the subjects. He was cited for possession of a controlled substance. The two other subjects were detained and all were later released at the scene.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant/Methamphetamine Offense/Cocaine Offense—Area of Hermann St./Fillmore St.—05/07/2018 5:13 pm

Officers working in plainclothes were advised that a subject in the area had two outstanding warrants for burglary and possession of burglary tools. Officers displayed their department issued stars and detained the subject. Officers conducted an arrest search of the subject and his bags. Officers located a small piece of suspected methamphetamine, two small bindles of suspected cocaine, and mail addressed to Park Station. The subject was transported to Park Station pending further investigation.

Mental Health Detention/Civil Sidewalks Citation/Resisting, Delaying, or Obstructing Peace Officer Duties—1100 block of Masonic Av.—05/08/2018 9:39 am

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a homeless person sleeping on the sidewalk inside of a tarp in violation of the Sit and Lie Ordinance. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the subject and it was discovered that he had a local misdemeanor warrant. Officers detained the subject and informed him of his warrant. The subject became upset and angry, and began to ram his head against the police vehicle. Medics arrived on scene and treated the subject, who continued to verbally assault officers at the scene. The subject was transported to SFGH for evaluation and he was cited for the charges.

PARK STATION— GREAT ARREST!**Aggravated Assault with Other Weapon—100 block of John F. Kennedy Dr.—05/01/2018 11:47 am**

Officers were dispatched to the above area regarding a possible aggravated assault with a bottle. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the victim, who was sitting on the sidewalk holding a towel and putting pressure on a wound to the side of his head. The victim stated that he was on the grass talking to himself when a group of people told him to be quiet. The victim continued to shout, when a male approached him and threatened to smash him with a liquor bottle if he continued to harass them. The victim challenged that subject to fight and was struck with the glass bottle. Medics arrived on scene and transported the victim to SFGH for further evaluation. Officers spoke with two witnesses who provided inconsistent statements. The suspect was arrested and booked for assault with a deadly weapon and later transported to County Jail.

Civil Sidewalks Citation—1400 block of Haight St.—05/02/2018 10:00 am

Officers assigned on foot patrol observed a subject sitting on the sidewalk in violation of the city's sit-lie ordinance. The subject was informed of her violation and issued a citation.

Resisting Delaying or Obstructing Peace Officer Duties/Civil Sidewalk Citation—400 block of Ashbury St.—05/04/2018 8:51 am

An officer was dispatched to the above area regarding a subject laying down on the sidewalk. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the subject and advised her of her violation. The subject gave the officer a false name and she was transported to Park Station in order for the officer to positively identify her. The subject was later cited for the charges and released from Park Station.

Threat or Force to Resist Executive Officer/Park Code Violation—Area of Kezar Dr. /John F Kennedy Dr.—05/07/2018 4:53 am

While citing campers in the area, officers heard aggressive shouting and yelling from nearby. Officers rushed to investigate the shouting and made contact with a ranger who had cited a camper who was refusing to leave the above listed area. Officers attempted to ask the subject to relocate from the area but he refused to comply. Due to the subject becoming explosively louder and clenching his fists, officers placed him under arrest for a continuing offense. Officers transported the subject to County Jail.

Warrant Arrest/Local SF Warrant—1300 block of Fulton St.—05/08/2018 7:20 am

Officer was dispatched to the area regarding a homeless person sleeping in a doorway. Upon arrival, the officer made contact with the unknown person who was in violation of the Sit and Lie Ordinance. It was discovered that the subject had an outstanding local misdemeanor warrant for vandalism. Additional officers responded to the scene and transported the subject to County Jail.

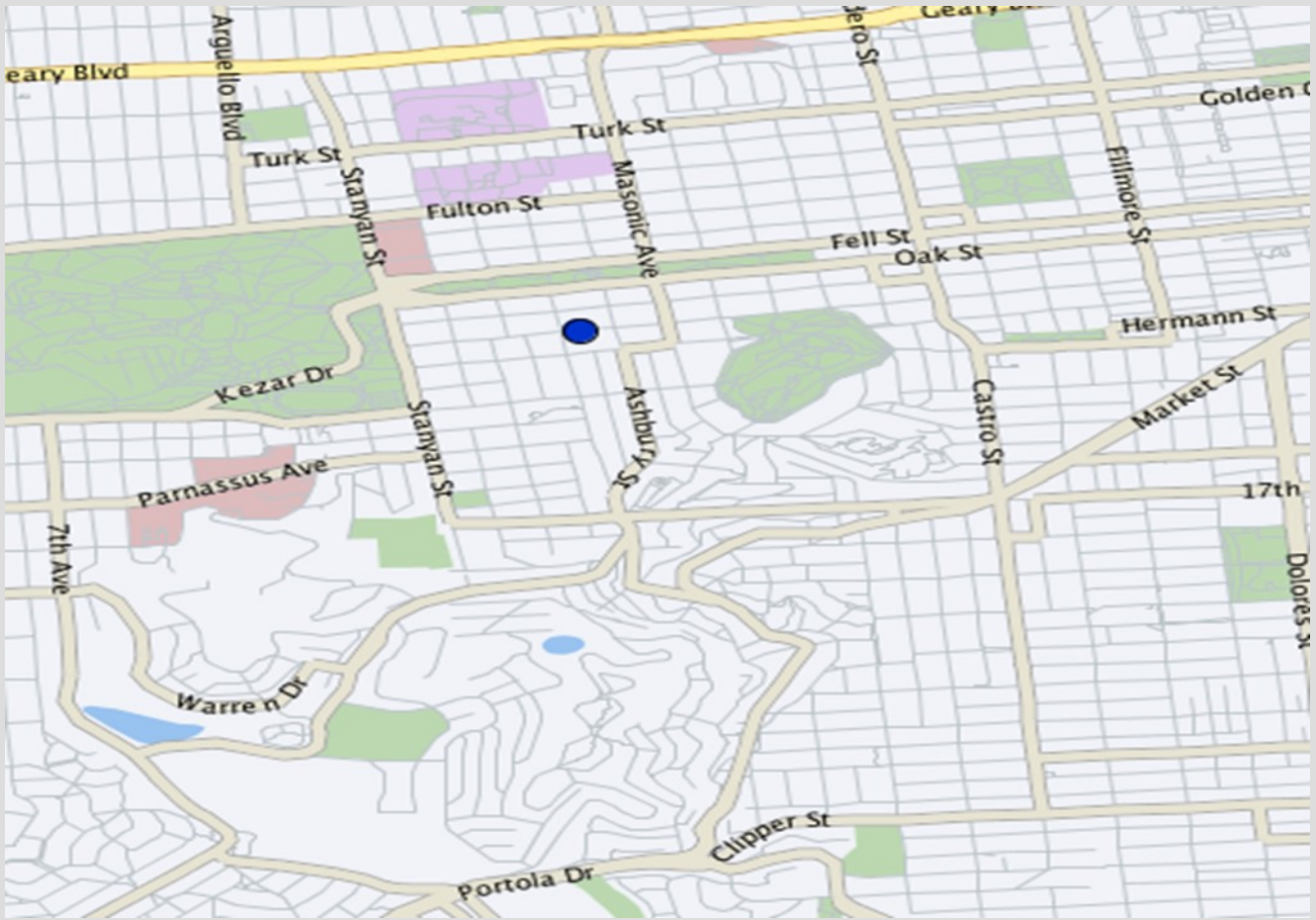


MAP OF CRIMES

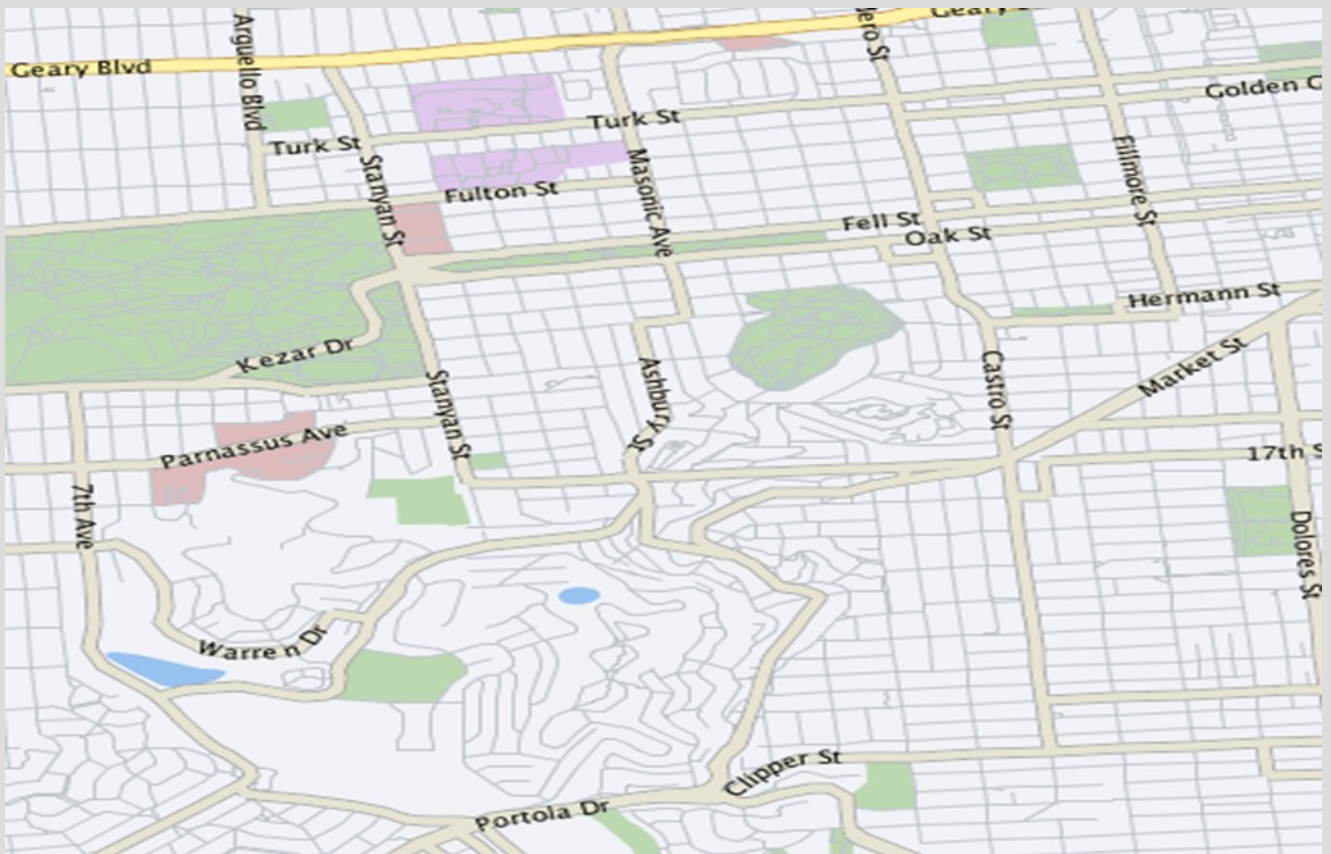

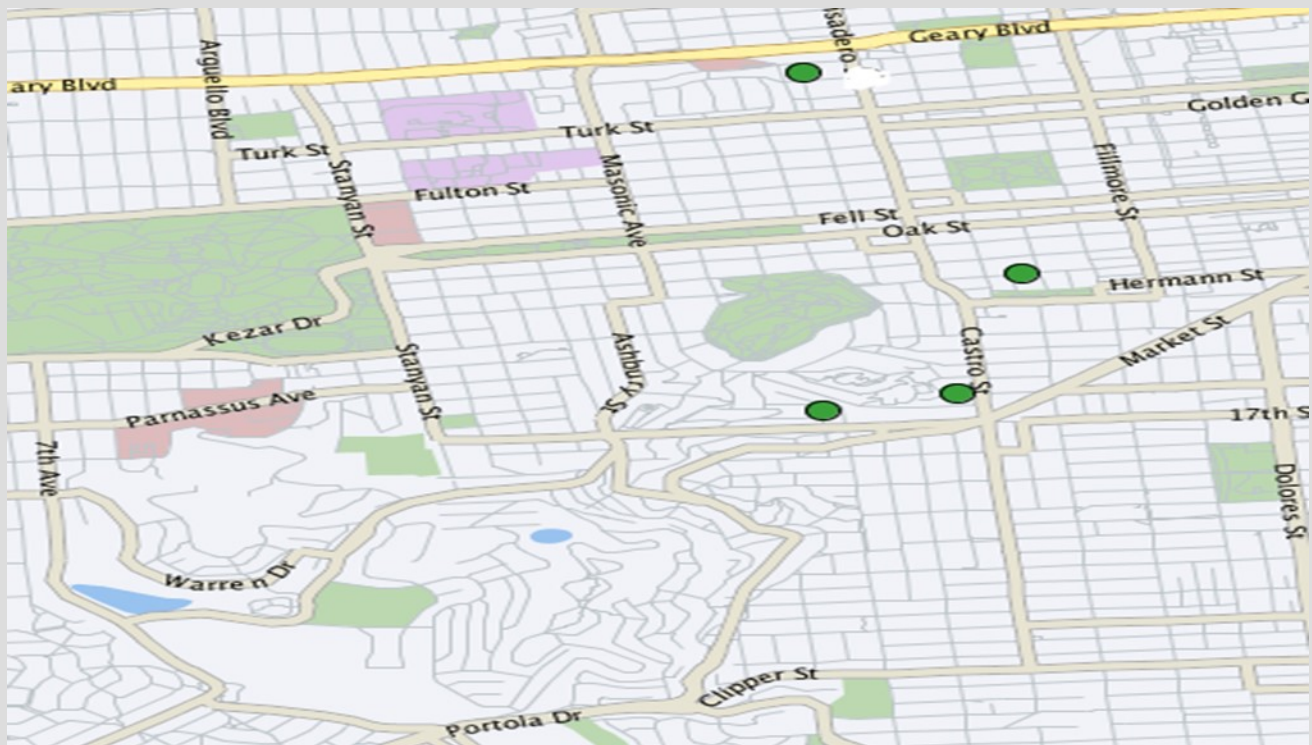

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.

SAFETY TIP FROM S.F. SAFE



Safety tip for your home:

Help first responders by making sure your address numbers are mounted on a high-contrast background, and that they're illuminated when it's dark.

HELPFUL TIPS**DON'T BE CAUGHT EMPTY-HANDED!!!!**

1. When placing an online or phone order, **request signed confirmation upon delivery**
2. Deliver packages to your office if at all possible; if not, deliver to a neighbor who will be home to sign for your package
3. If ordering from Amazon, use a self-service Amazon locker located throughout San Francisco; they will send you a notification email when the package is received. Go to Amazon.com and search for "Amazon Locker"
4. For U.S. Postal Service deliveries, you can authorize USPS to have certain deliveries left in a garage, with your neighbor, etc.; first you will need to create an account at USPS.com. Also check out "UPS My Choice" where you can log on to UPS.com and track your package to reroute, reschedule, or authorize a shipment release for your delivery. Get a PO box for deliveries for extra security
5. Shipping via UPS? Go online to UPS.com and search for "UPS Access Point"; neighborhood stores that will hold your packages for you
6. There are several apps available in San Francisco that allow you to ship to a package destination, and then will schedule the delivery to your home once you are available
7. Set up a delivery alert by email or text as to when your package has been delivered
8. Pay for insurance to cover the cost of the item shipped if lost, damaged or stolen
9. **Never let a package sit unattended on your doorstep**; package theft is very high in San Francisco.



WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

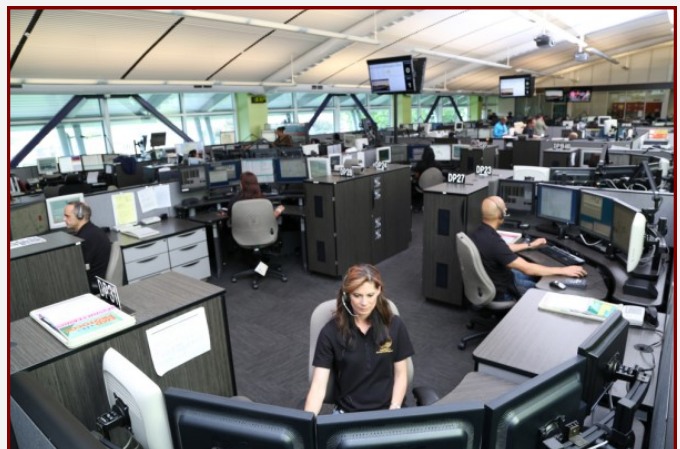
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

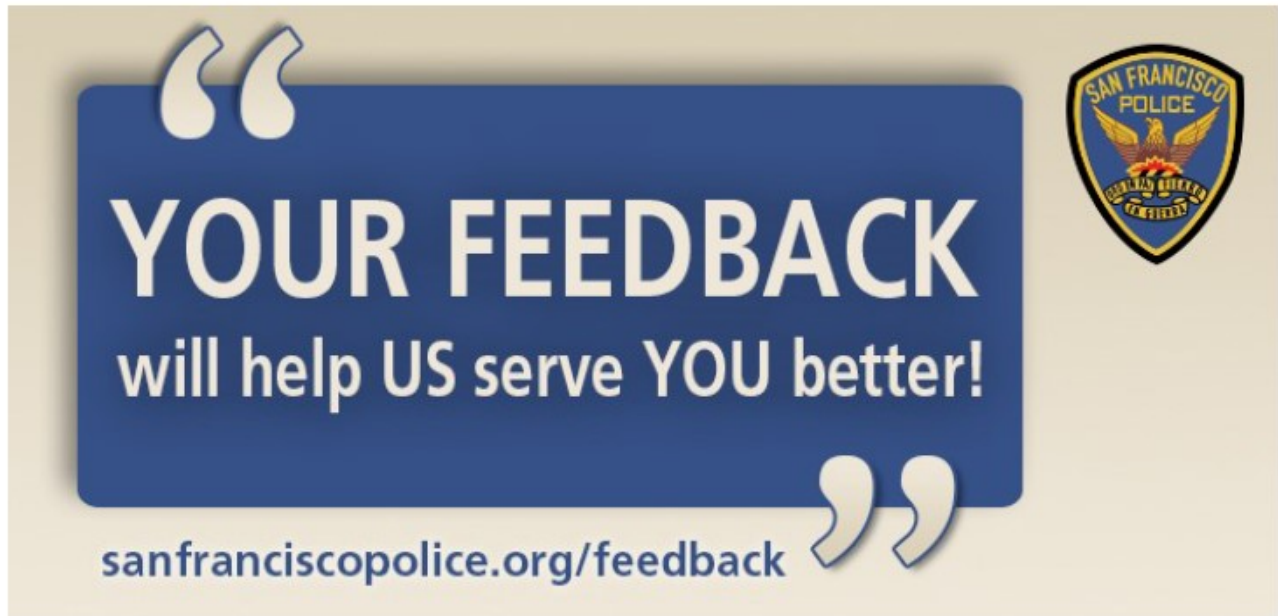
9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.
