Captain Bailey's Message

Hello all,

Today I want to review with you the importance of reporting crimes you witness or are a victim of. Reporting crimes is crucial in a number of ways

#1 It is important that incidents are documented at the time of the incident. This ensures that the victim's memory of the incident is fresh and thereby increases the chances of a more accurate and detailed report. (There are some exception to this i.e. when a person is a victim of a serious traumatizing experience their memory maybe better later.)

#2 It allows immediate follow up by the officers and immediate seizure of evidence that could be lost if there is a delay in reporting.

#3 It allows immediate further follow up by our investigative team on any potential leads.

#4 It formally records the event and even though there may not be any leads to follow at the time the incident was reported, it allows all officers in law enforcement access to the report which may be related to other incidents that have been reported or will be reported later. This is especially true of sexual assaults where some times it involves a repeat offender. If the victims do not report the crime nobody knows it happened and cases cannot be related. It allows the suspect to continue committing these crimes, victimizing others because victims have chosen not to report the crime to police.

#5 Many times when cases are related and a suspect is taken into custody the District Attorney can add additional charges for the related cases. Of course this is contingent on additional evidence but a victim's ability to identify a suspect in a case can be enough to charge the case when there are additional cases.

#6 In addition there are cases where an individual is tormenting a neighborhood with a variety of crimes but if community members are not willing to make a report when they see a crime committed and sign a citizen's arrest, there again incidents go unreported and the criminal behavior continues. A citizen's arrest form needs to be signed when a victim or witness sees a misdemeanor crime being committed and the officer does not. If the victim/ witness does not sign the citizen's arrest then the officer cannot arrest the individual for the crime committed.

#7 Finally and most importantly if you do not report and document the crime it is as though the crime never happened. Whatever chance we the SFPD have of solving a crime that has been reported we have zero chance of solving a crime that has not been reported.

Please remember we can only succeed by working together and you the members of the community are the people who most help us succeed. Thank you for all your help and I look forward to our continued collaboration.

GREAT POLICE WORK

On Thursday, July 7, 2018, at approximately 9am, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were on patrol, and observed a van, which appeared as if a person was living inside the parked vehicle located at Oak Street and Lyon Street.

A computer query was performed on the van's license plate, which revealed that the vehicle was not currently registered, and the displayed 2018 registration sticker did not actually belong on the van's license plate. Sergeant Meyer determined that the owner of the van was attempting to avoid compliance with the vehicle registration requirements.

During their investigation of the vehicle, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte observed there were no occupants, but a dog cowering inside the van. There was no visible water for the dog. One window was completely closed, and the other window was barely open (approximately 1/8"), which is not a sufficient opening to properly ventilate a vehicle.

Sergeant Meyer notified Officer Crockett of the Vicious and Dangerous Dog Unit, who responded out to the scene. Sergeant Meyer, Sergeant Stechschulte, and Officer Crockett attempted to gain access to the vehicle, but both front door handles were broken, and there was large metal shelf attached to the rear hitch of the van with a large trunk chained to it blocking entry to the rear door.

Due to the severe conditions of the van, and the dog owner not being present on scene, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were able to maneuver the large trunk to have enough clearance to access the rear door of the van. Once the rear door of the van was open, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were met with a wall that was stacked full of personal items, which include clothes, boxes, and other personal debris. Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were able to make a small hole big enough for the dog to crawl through.

Once the dog was freed from the vehicle, Officer Crockett transported the dog to Animal Care and Control to receive medical treatment. Sergeant Meyer requested a tow for the vehicle, as the vehicle's registration was expired over six months.

Each day he came to work he gave his heart and soul to the job and smiled all the way through. He truly loved the officers who worked with him and shared with them his knowledge and expertise. He most especially wanted to serve the community of San Francisco and left no stone unturned when it came to doing so. Even as a lieutenant he took the time to go out on patrol with the troops and invariably make an arrest on every outing. He truly lead by example and Ed was always respectful and honorable.

Lt Ed Santos Jr. was born and raised in San Francisco, Ca. He joined the San Francisco Police Department on May 11, 1981, after serving with San Bruno Police Department for sixteen months.

Lt Santos graduated with the 144th San Francisco Regional Police Academy. Throughout his career, Lt Santos has worked in various capacities, progressing from Officer through Acting Captain. Lt Santos has worked at the Southern, Northern, Park, Mission, and Central Stations, as well as at Narcotics, ALU, IAD, and SVU.

Among Lt Santos' notable career accomplishments was the largest seizure of cocaine and cash in department history, the largest seizure of stolen property, and the recovery of a Picasso painting during his time at Central Station.

Lt Santos was a recipient of the Bronze Medal of Valor, as well as a Meritorious Conduct Award, Police Commission Award, Officer of the Year Award, 3 Chief of Police Commendations, a unit citation, and numerous Captain's Commendations for his outstanding police work.

In retirement Lt Santos looks forward to spending time with his wife and family.

<u>Possession of Opiates for Sale/ Traffic Violation—Area of Ashbury St. / Page St.—07/06/2018 4:43 pm</u>
Officers observed a vehicle with its left rear break light out. Officers approached the vehicle and made contact with the driver, and observed an open container of alcohol and suspected marijuana. Officers conducted a probable cause search of the vehicle and located two bags of suspected fentanyl, a scale, and suspected marijuana. The subject was placed under arrest and later booked at SF County Jail.

Officers discovered a vehicle travelling in the above area with expired registration tabs. Officers effected a traffic stop on the vehicle and made contact with the driver. It was discovered that his driver's license was suspended, and the subject was cited for his violations.

Officers responded to a cold robbery report. Upon arrival, officers met with the victim, who stated that a suspect had punched him in the face and stole his iPhone. Officers tracked the iPhone and conducted a traffic stop on the suspect's vehicle. The suspect was booked at County Jail for robbery, possession of stolen property, and preventing the use of a device to notify law enforcement of a crime.

Malicious Mischief/ Parole Violation—Area of Masonic Ave. / Haight St.—07/08/2018 2:34 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a person hitting vehicles with a skateboard. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the victim who stated that he was driving west bound on Haight Street when he was flagged down by a subject. When the victim stopped his vehicle, the subject immediately began to strike his vehicle and other vehicles with the skateboard. Officers located the subject in the area and transported him to Park Station. A computer query revealed that the subject was on CDCR parole.

Officers responded to the area regarding a report of an intoxicated neighbor who broke a window of a residence. Upon arrival, officers made contact with the subject who had taken an aggressive fighting stance. The subject continued to struggle while officers attempted to arrest him. Officers observed an injury to the subject's forehead and requested an ambulance. The subject was transported to SFGH due to his injuries.

Officers responded to the area regarding a person attempting to stab someone. Upon arrival, officers spoke with two victims who were attacked by the subject. 


MAP OF CRIMES— ASSAULTS





CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP OF THE WEEK TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- . Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?


3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.
