They really play a vital role in creating community spirit and keeping their neighborhoods safe. These groups typically meet once per month and keep their community informed as to what is happening in their neighborhood and community.

The groups work with the many city agencies to help solve issues in their neighborhood. They work with members of Park Station to help address crime problems in the neighborhood. Many times they see a situation that they believe may develop into a problem and resolve it before it does. They really serve as the finger on the pulse of the neighborhood or the boots on the ground.

These groups allow community members to organize and have a voice in local government. They also work with one of my favorite city agencies SAFE (safety Awareness for Everyone) and form community watch groups who serve to educate community members on strategies and plans to keep individuals and their community member's safe.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT 2018

San Francisco, CA—July 21, 2018—The Park Station Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB) and Park Station are hosting the 35th National Night Out in Duboce Park on Tuesday, August 7, 5 - 8 p.m. This will be the third year in a row that the event is being held in Duboce Park and the Harvey Milk Photo Center Exhibition Room. National Night out attracted over 500 attendees last year.

Officer from Park Station will prepare hot does and hamburgers, SAFE is hosting a taco truck, and the CPAB will provide desserts, all free of charge. There will be performance and demonstrations by Acro Sports including Parkour and their Circus Lab and attendees will have an opportunity to learn and practice Parkour and tumbling. Zanshin Dogo will demonstrate Goju Ryu, a traditional martial art that can practiced at any age and Xian Yun Academy of the Arts California (Fei Tien) will demonstrate Chinese dancing.

"Who Let the Dogs Out" is a light-hearted and fun dog show that will be held for the first time from 6—6:30 p.m. and will have a variety of contests, including the Cutest Dog, Best Trick, Waggiest Tail, Best Smile, and Best in Show. National Night Out is the country's united effort to promote neighborhood involvement to help stem crime and create safer neighborhoods; this is accomplished through strengthening police community relations and encouraging camaraderie by hosting neighborhood events. It's a great chance to meet and interact with Captain Una Bailey and other officers from Park Station as well as socializing with your neighbors.



GREAT POLICE WORK

On Thursday, July 7, 2018, at approximately 9am, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were on patrol, and observed a van, which appeared as if a person was living inside the parked vehicle located at Oak Street and Lyon Street.

A computer query was performed on the van's license plate, which revealed that the vehicle was not currently registered, and the displayed 2018 registration sticker did not actually belong on the van's license plate. Sergeant Meyer determined that the owner of the van was attempting to avoid compliance with the vehicle registration requirements.

During their investigation of the vehicle, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte observed there were no occupants, but a dog cowering inside the van. There was no visible water for the dog. One window was completely closed, and the other window was barely open (approximately 1/8"), which is not a sufficient opening to properly ventilate a vehicle.

Sergeant Meyer notified Officer Crockett of the Vicious and Dangerous Dog Unit, who responded out to the scene. Sergeant Meyer, Sergeant Stechschulte, and Officer Crockett attempted to gain access to the vehicle, but both front door handles were broken, and there was large metal shelf attached to the rear hitch of the van with a large trunk chained to it blocking entry to the rear door.

Due to the severe conditions of the van, and the dog owner not being present on scene, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were able to maneuver the large trunk to have enough clearance to access the rear door of the van. Once the rear door of the van was open, Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were met with a wall that was stacked full of personal items, which include clothes, boxes, and other personal debris. Sergeant Meyer and Sergeant Stechschulte were able to make a small hole big enough for the dog to crawl through.

Once the dog was freed from the vehicle, Officer Crockett transported the dog to Animal Care and Control to receive medical treatment. Sergeant Meyer requested a tow for the vehicle, as the vehicle's registration was expired over six months.

SOME OF PARK STATION'S ARRESTS FOR THE WEEK

<u>Malicious Mischief/Vandalism to Property/ Burglary/Unlawful Entry—200 block of Steiner St.—07/27/2018 8:22 am</u>

Officers responded to the area regarding a vandalism report. Upon arrival, officers detained a subject matching the suspect's description. Officers spoke with a victim who stated that the subject had previously stolen a bag of coffee and vandalized an espresso machine from his shop. On the above date and time, the same suspect walked into the shop and grabbed items without attempting to pay for them. Medics arrived on scene to transport the subject to SFGH for evaluation. The subject was later booked at Park Station for vandalism and burglary.

Robbery w/Force—600 block of Lincoln Way—07/28/2018 8:41 am

Officers responded to the area regarding a subject who attempted to steal items and assault employees in a store. Upon arrival, officers observed the subject holding a wooden stick in his hand. Officers spoke with a victim who stated that the subject had thrown a toy gun at his face and struck him in the forearm. The subject was placed under arrest and transported to Park Station without incident.

Warrant Arrest—Area of Valencia St. / 17TH St.—07/29/2018 6:29 pm

Officers were dispatched to the area regarding a possible male with a gun. Upon arrival, officers observed the subject walking in the area. Officer detained the subject and no gun was located on him. It was discovered that the subject had a misdemeanor warrant out of Alameda for two counts of violating a restraining order. He was transported to Park Station for booking.

Warrant Arrest—Area of Lyon St. / Fell St.—07/29/2018 10:48 pm

Officer observed two subjects rummaging through construction debris along the sidewalk. The officer made contact with the subjects and it was discovered that one of the subjects had an outstanding felony warrant for his arrest. He was booked at Park Station for the warrant and later transported to County Jail.

<u>Vehicle Burglary/Recovered Vehicle/Possession of Burglary Tools—100 block of Graystone Ter.—</u> <u>07/30/2018 5:53 am</u>

Officers responded to a call of an auto boost in the area. Upon arrival, officers spoke with a victim holding a male subject against the driver side of a vehicle. Officers detained the suspect and placed him in handcuffs without incident. Officers met with a witness who directed the officers to a vehicle. He was on his porch when he heard a loud smash and the sound of glass breaking. He also stated that there appeared to be a person in the rear of the vehicle. A computer check of the vehicle revealed that the plates were reported stolen. Officers detained another subject who stated that she was sleeping in the passenger seat and had no idea of what was going on. She was later transported to Park Station for further investigation. Medics arrived on scene to transport the suspect to SFGH. The suspect was later placed under arrest for second degree auto burglary, possession of burglary tools, and driving a stolen vehicle. He was transported to County Jail where he was booked accordingly.

Battery/ Trespassing—1700 block of Fulton St.—07/30/2018 9:36 am

Officers responded to the above listed area regarding a battery. Upon arrival, officers spoke with the store manager who stated that he observed the suspect get into a verbal argument with a customer. The manager asked the suspect to leave the store and she became aggravated and hit him. Officers cited the suspect for battery and trespassing.




MAP OF CRIMES— ASSAULTS





CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP #1 TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

Tip #1 to prevent or solve crimes:

I want to review with everyone how you can best avoid being a victim of a burglary. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Finally please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. District residents have being doing a great job of calling 911 when they see suspicious activity or what they believe to be a crime in progress. These calls have led to numerous arrests. Our officers responded quickly and are able to take suspects into custody.

Your safety is paramount to us here at Park Station and with your help we can prevent many crimes and solve more.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP #2 TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.



CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TIP #3 TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

Reporting crimes is crucial in a number of ways:

- #1 It is important that incidents are documented at the time of the incident. This ensures that the victim's memory of the incident is fresh and thereby increases the chances of a more accurate and detailed report. (There are some exception to this i.e. when a person is a victim of a serious traumatizing experience their memory maybe better later.)
- #2 It allows immediate follow up by the officers and immediate seizure of evidence that could be lost if there is a delay in reporting.
- #3 It allows immediate further follow up by our investigative team on any potential leads.
- #4 It formally records the event and even though there may not be any leads to follow at the time the incident was reported, it allows all officers in law enforcement access to the report which may be related to other incidents that have been reported or will be reported later. This is especially true of sexual assaults where some times it involves a repeat offender. If the victims do not report the crime nobody knows it happened and cases cannot be related. It allows the suspect to continue committing these crimes, victimizing others because victims have chosen not to report the crime to police.
- #5 Many times when cases are related and a suspect is taken into custody the District Attorney can add additional charges for the related cases. Of course this is contingent on additional evidence but a victim's ability to identify a suspect in a case can be enough to charge the case when there are additional cases.
- #6 In addition there are cases where an individual is tormenting a neighborhood with a variety of crimes but if community members are not willing to make a report when they see a crime committed and sign a citizen's arrest, there again incidents go unreported and the criminal behavior continues. A citizen's arrest form needs to be signed when a victim or witness sees a misdemeanor crime being committed and the officer does not. If the victim/witness does not sign the citizen's arrest then the officer cannot arrest the individual for the crime committed.
- #7 Finally and most importantly if you do not report and document the crime it is as though the crime never happened. Whatever chance we the SFPD have of solving a crime that has been reported we have zero chance of solving a crime that has not been reported.

Please remember we can only succeed by working together and you the members of the community are the people who most help us succeed. Thank you for all your help and I look forward to our continued collaboration.



Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- · Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?


3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.
