CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

Hello all,

Today I want to review again the importance of reporting crimes you witness or are a victim of. Reporting crimes is crucial in a number of ways.

#1 It is important that incidents are documented at the time of the incident. This ensures that the victim's memory of the incident is fresh and thereby increases the chances of a more accurate and detailed report. (There are some exception to this i.e. when a person is a victim of a serious traumatizing experience their memory maybe better later.)

#2 It allows immediate follow up by the officers and immediate seizure of evidence that could be lost if there is a delay in reporting.

#3 It allows immediate further follow up by our investigative team on any potential leads.

#4 It formally records the event and even though there may not be any leads to follow at the time the incident was reported, it allows all officers in law enforcement access to the report which may be related to other incidents that have been reported or will be reported later. This is especially true of sexual assaults where there are times it involves a repeat offender. If the victims do not report the crime, law enforcement members do not know the crime happened, nor can we follow up on the case nor can we determine if it is related to other cases. It allows the suspect to continue committing crimes, victimizing others because victims have chosen not to report the crime to police.

#5 Many times when cases are related and a suspect is taken into custody the District Attorney can add additional charges for the related cases. Of course this is contingent on additional evidence but a victim's ability to identify a suspect in a case can be enough to charge the case when there are additional cases.

#6 In addition there are cases where an individual is tormenting a neighborhood with a variety of crimes but if community members are not willing to make a report when they see a crime committed and sign a citizen's arrest, there again incidents go unreported and the criminal behavior continues. A citizen's arrest form needs to be signed when a victim or witness sees a misdemeanor crime being committed and the crime has not been committed in the officer's presence. If the victim/witness does not sign the citizen's arrest then the officer cannot arrest the individual for the crime committed.

#7 A citizen signature is not necessary if the crime committed is a felony. The officer can immediately take the suspect into custody. This can happen at the scene when the victim calls 911 and officers respond.

#8 Most importantly if you do not report and document the crime it is as though the crime never happened. Whatever chance we, the SFPD have of solving a crime that has been reported, we have zero chance of solving a crime that has not been reported.

#9 Always call 911 when you see a crime in progress or anytime your or anyone's life is at risk or threatened.

Please remember we can only succeed by working together and you the members of the community are the people who most help us succeed. Thank you for all your help and I look forward to our continued collaboration.

On another but related note I want to remind all of you to activate you're "Find My iPhone" app as this enables us to track phones that have been stolen. We recently have seen an uptick in cell phones being taken from individuals and on two occasions were able to take suspects into custody by tracking the phones via "Find My iPhone". Remember to have your username and password on hand to allow us to track the phone. More importantly be careful when you are in public at night using your phone especially by yourself. Never put up a fight if you are being robbed of your possessions, hand over your possessions and try to memorize what the suspect looks like, the type of vehicle involved and the direction of travel. Never risk your safety to get this information. Possessions can always be replaced you cannot.

Also I cannot over-emphasize the benefits of community members installing surveillance cameras. The footage has been used to identify many suspects in many cases. Please take the time to review the flyer that Safety Awareness for Everyone Agency (SAFE) so kindly put together for your information.

CERTIFICATES OF RECOGNITION

On 8/29/2018, Captain Bailey presented Certificates to Park Station Officers for their outstanding police work in critical incidents. Officer Mike Chicas received a Life Saving Award for his quick thinking, and medical efforts in an incident on 12/15/16, Officer Chicas observed two male subjects in a physical altercation with a dog. During the altercation, one of the subjects was bitten by the dog twice, and severed the subject's femoral artery. Officer Chicas quickly applied a trauma tourniquet to the subject's leg in an attempt to control the bleeding. Officer Chicas also requested an ambulance. The medics stated Officer Chicas saved the subject's life because he applied the tourniquet to the subject's leg.

On 1/30/16, a citizen notified Park Station Officers that he recognized a male subject as a person he saw in the news that had escaped from the Orange County Jail with a white van. Officers followed the subject, and located the white van. Officers were able to apprehend the subject, and while searching the van located a second wanted subject out of Orange County, and took him into custody. Captain Bailey presented Police Commission Commendation Certificates to Sergeant Bernadette Robinson, Officer JoAnn Walker, Alaric Wu, and Officer Gary Cheng for their hard work, and dedication to duty in apprehending these two escapees from Orange County Prison.

On 7/6/16, Narcotic Plainclothes Officers were informed that a subject had possession of a firearm at Jones Street and McAllister Street. Narcotic Officers informed patrol officers at Tenderloin Station, who responded to the area of Jones Street and McAlister, and located an unknown male subject with his hands in his pockets. Officers could see what appeared to be the outline of a firearm concealed within his front right pants pocket. It was declared a critical incident when the subject would not surrender his weapon. Specialized units such as Hostage Negotiations Team, Tactical Unit and Specialist Team were requested to respond. After some tactical application, the Specialist Team was able to move in, and were able to take the subject into custody. Captain Bailey presented Police Commission Commendation Certificates to Officer Mike Chicas, who is a Specialist on the SFPD Specialist Team and Officer Gary Cheng, and Officer Therese Deignan for their response to assist with this critical incident.

Thank you to all the Officers for all your hard work and dedication to keeping San Francisco, especially the Park District safe.

Captain Bailey also presented Certificates of Recognition to acknowledge the hard work of two Park Station's Interns, Jenan Sarsour and Jungo Taniguchi. Thank you, Jenan and Jungo, for being such a positive addition to the Park Station family. We wish you both the best of luck!!!

On 3/8/2009 at approximately 6pm, Iain Finlay was in front of his residence on the 100 block of Lyon Street when he observed his vehicle drive westbound on Page St passing Lyon St with unknown driver. Last time Iain saw his vehicle, he parked his vehicle inside his garage. Iain opened his garage door, and confirmed his vehicle was not inside the garage. No one had permission to drive Iain's vehicle. Iain heard an engine turn on inside his garage, and saw the reverse lights on the vehicle. Iain approached the vehicle and the suspect jumped out of the driver's side door and started to run away. Iain caught the suspect just outside his garage, and was able to detain the suspect until police arrived on scene.

We are so appreciative of his efforts and bravery, and citizen like Iain are an enormous asset to our beautiful district. Thank you, Iain!

A little about Iain Finlay's personal life. Iain was born in St Helens, an industrial town in Northern England in the 1960's. Iain's parents were a Nurse and a Scientific Officer. SOME OF PARK STATION'S ARRESTS FOR THE WEEK





(from Monday, 9/17/18 to Sunday, 9/23/18)






MAP OF CRIMES- ASSAULTS





Overview

Note: The following information is specific to commercial and retail establishments; however, can be applied to any location utilizing video surveillance

Basic set up and maintenance problems can reduce the effectiveness of many systems.

- Resolution is it good enough for facial recognition.
- Camera position are they positioned for clear view of suspect.
- c. Lighting is it adequate to capture clear images both day and night.
- d. Image detail is the recorder set up for best image detail
- e. Maintenance are you maintaining your system properly so it can do its job when needed?

Set Up and Maintenance

- Backlighting when sun is bright at doorway, images in front appear darker or even black. Use another light source inside to counteract back light.
 - Low Frame Rate saves on drive space and gives better image quality, but you may not get an image at all (now you see him; now you don't)

SAFE VIDEO SURVEILLANCE RECOMENDATIONS

- Obstructions displays and other objects blocking view should be eliminated.
 - Focus Problems must check system regularly to prevent.

Minimum camera resolution should be 480 horizontal lines.

Good cameras have faster lenses (allows more lighting), larger maximum aperture opening (lets more light into the focal point of the camera) and controls image brightness allows brighter images in dim lighting) – the more lighting, the more depth of field (greater depth of field; the more of the scene is in focus)

Focal Length – some cameras zoom in and out while others have a fixed focal length. The type of cameras used depends on what your needs are.

Transaction Areas – anything at a transaction point (cash register, toll booth, etc.), the subject's head should fill at least 15% of the total image in the frame, giving the detail you need.

Lines of Sight – lines of sight are always critical, make sure there are no obstructions

Le reprise the right site plan is crucial (retail store blueprint or diagram). Key camera spots are at transaction points (cash registers and entry/exit points) - the more cameras, the better.

You want good camera overlap (you want multiple chances to capture good images). Extra coverage is also needed for aisles, restrooms and other key points

With a good site plan you can make sure you don't have any blind spots (you can toy around with camera positions, and do a test recording to see that you are getting what you want). Camera Height – placement is very important, make sure it is as close to eye-level as possible. Otherwise, you might lose out to a baseball cap.

nterior Lighting – interior lighting can balance bright light from one direction (back lighting) by adding another light source from a different location (add a bank of lights).

screens sunlight). Adding more light from a different direction balances lighting, giving better camera clarity (if sunlight is shining through large windows you can tent windows or add screens Example: Artificial lighting (inside store) for cameras may be good in the morning, but by noon, the sun (through a doorway or window) can blow the entire frame out (add lighting to fill in for

Exterior Lighting – if lights are on timers, you must adjust appropriate to seasonal changes (Fall/Winter: gets dark earlier. Spring/Summer: gets dark later).

- 5. SEAL THE CONTAINER AND BRING TO YOUR LOCAL SYRINGE ACCESS PROGRAM OR DROP IT OFF AT A 24-HOUR DISPOSAL SITE.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TOP TIPS TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

TIP #1 to PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIMES

I want to review with everyone how you can best avoid being a victim of a burglary. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Finally please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. District residents have being doing a great job of calling 911 when they see suspicious activity or what they believe to be a crime in progress. These calls have led to numerous arrests. Our officers responded quickly and are able to take suspects into custody.

Your safety is paramount to us here at Park Station and with your help we can prevent many crimes and solve more.

TIP #2 to PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIMES

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is



really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an I ndividual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TOP TIPS TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

Reporting crimes is crucial in a number of ways:

#1 It is important that incidents are documented at the time of the incident. This ensures that the victim's memory of the incident is fresh and thereby increases the chances of a more accurate and detailed report. (There are some exception to this i.e. when a person is a victim of a serious traumatizing experience their memory maybe better later.)

#2 It allows immediate follow up by the officers and immediate seizure of evidence that could be lost if there is a delay in reporting.

#3 It allows immediate further follow up by our investigative team on any potential leads.

#4 It formally records the event and even though there may not be any leads to follow at the time the incident was reported, it allows all officers in law enforcement access to the report which may be related to other incidents that have been reported or will be reported later. This is especially true of sexual assaults where some times it involves a repeat offender. If the victims do not report the crime nobody knows it happened and cases cannot be related. It allows the suspect to continue committing these crimes, victimizing others because victims have chosen not to report the crime to police.

#5 Many times when cases are related and a suspect is taken into custody the District Attorney can add additional charges for the related cases. Of course this is contingent on additional evidence but a victim's ability to identify a suspect in a case can be enough to charge the case when there are additional cases.

#6 In addition there are cases where an individual is tormenting a neighborhood with a variety of crimes but if community members are not willing to make a report when they see a crime committed and sign a citizen's arrest, there again incidents go unreported and the criminal behavior continues. A citizen's arrest form needs to be signed when a victim or witness sees a misdemeanor crime being committed and the officer does not. If the victim/witness does not sign the citizen's arrest then the officer cannot arrest the individual for the crime committed.

#7 Finally and most importantly if you do not report and document the crime it is as though the crime never happened. Whatever chance we the SFPD have of solving a crime that has been reported we have zero chance of solving a crime that has not been reported.

Please remember we can only succeed by working together and you the members of the community are the people who most help us succeed. Thank you for all your help and I look forward to our continued collaboration.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

- 1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
- Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
- Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
- Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

- Photograph all tools.
 Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
- Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
- Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage: When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car: Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key: Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- Open Buzzer: When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems: Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Clight Timers: Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows: Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- · Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- · Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Pease call the non- emergency dispatch line (415-553-0123) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1**.
