DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is left unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ♦ **An individual peering into vehicles, to try and locate any valuables left unattended.**
- ♦ **An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/or residence.**
- ♦ **An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.**

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

DEFINITIONS OF CRIME

Robbery– Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault– An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery- (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

****Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person. ****

Aggravated Assault– Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary– The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.



DEFINITION OF COMMUNITY POLICING

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach: Richmond Station Officers coordinate with city agencies to provide assistance and offer City services as needed. The Officers handle quality of life issues and find programs for willing individuals.

Foot Patrol: Richmond Station has dedicated foot patrols on Clement St., Geary Blvd, Golden Gate Park as well as the Cliff House.

Richmond Station Community Meetings: Community Meetings are held once a month for the public and residents of the Richmond District to attend. People can voice their comments or concerns about issues in the Richmond District.

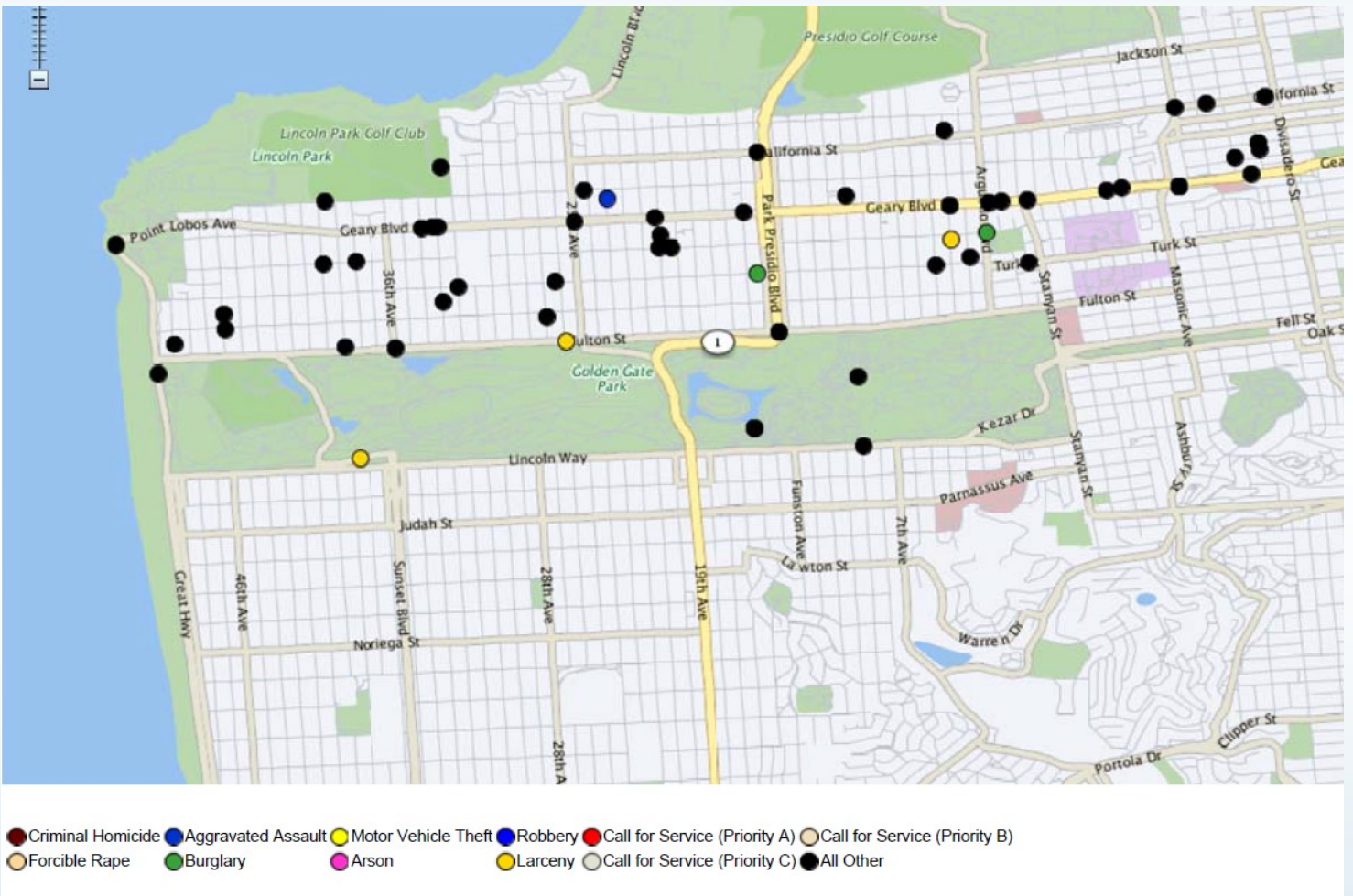


MAP OF CRIMES

Stolen Vehicle, Possession of Burglary Tools, Driving License Suspended (Arrest)

04/30/2018 1545 Hours

3675 Geary Blvd

Officers observed a verbal argument between two subjects in a car at a gas station. A records check on the vehicle revealed it was stolen. Officers detained the occupants with the assistance of arriving units. A records check revealed Suspect 1 had an outstanding felony warrant and several prior arrests for possession of a stolen vehicle. Burglary tools, spark plugs, shaved keys, and suspected Marijuana were found on Suspect 1 during an arrest search. An arrest search of Suspect 2 revealed stolen credit cards.

Suspect 1 was arrested and booked at County Jail One on the following charges: Possession of Stolen Vehicle, Possession of Burglary Tools, Driving license Suspended

Suspect 2 was issued a citation and released at the scene on the following charges: Possession of Stolen Property

Shoplifting with Force, Vandalism to Property (Arrest)

Store Security observed the Suspect on the stores video surveillance cameras taking merchandise and stuffing it into his pants and plastic bags. Store Security then saw the Suspect walk past the last manned register and exit the store without paying. Store Security then exited the security office, confronted the Suspect, and told him he was under citizen's arrest. The Suspect became violent and attempted to hit and push Store Security in an attempt to escape. Store Security was able to gain control of the Suspect with the assistance of store employees until police could arrive. During the struggle Store Security sustained an abrasion to his hand and a Security Tower was damaged by the Suspect.

The Suspect was arrested and booked at County Jail One on the following charges: Robbery, Vandalism to Property

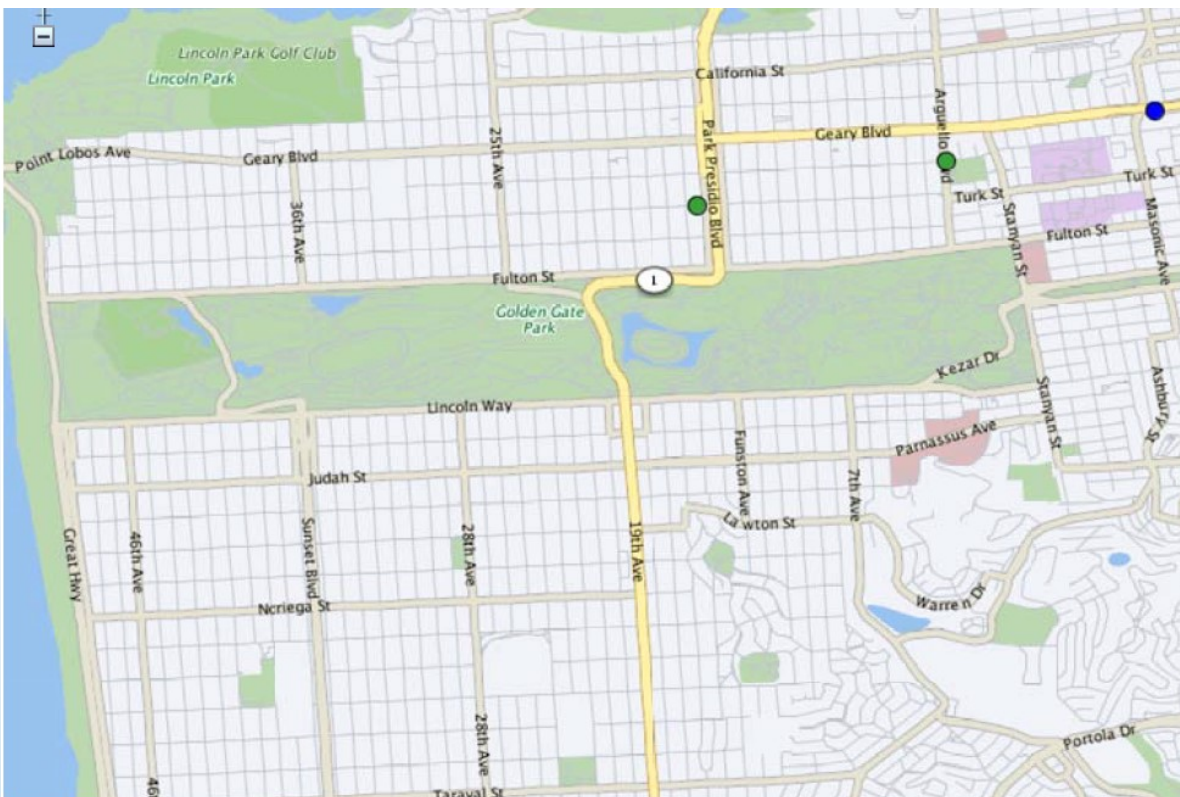

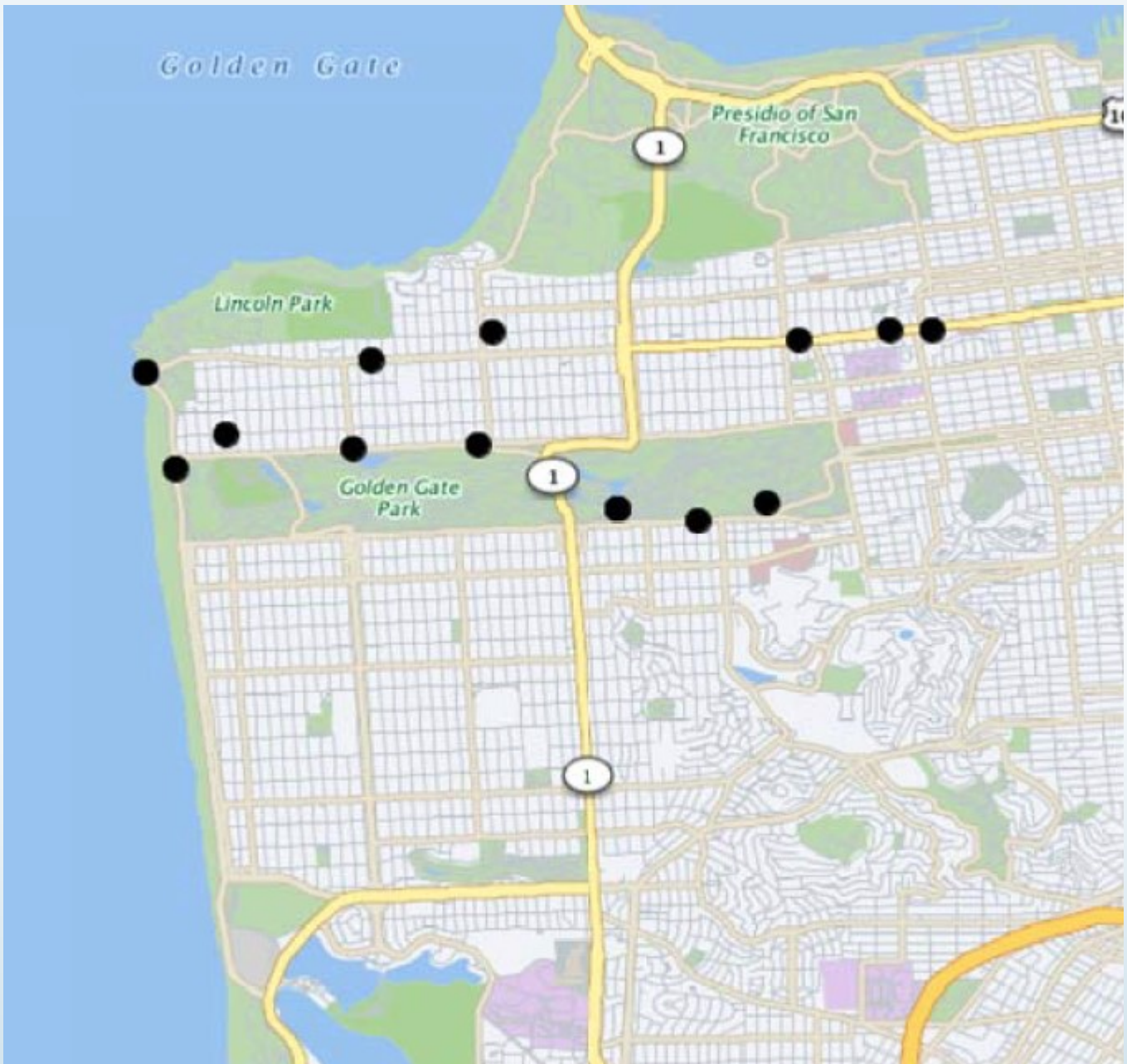

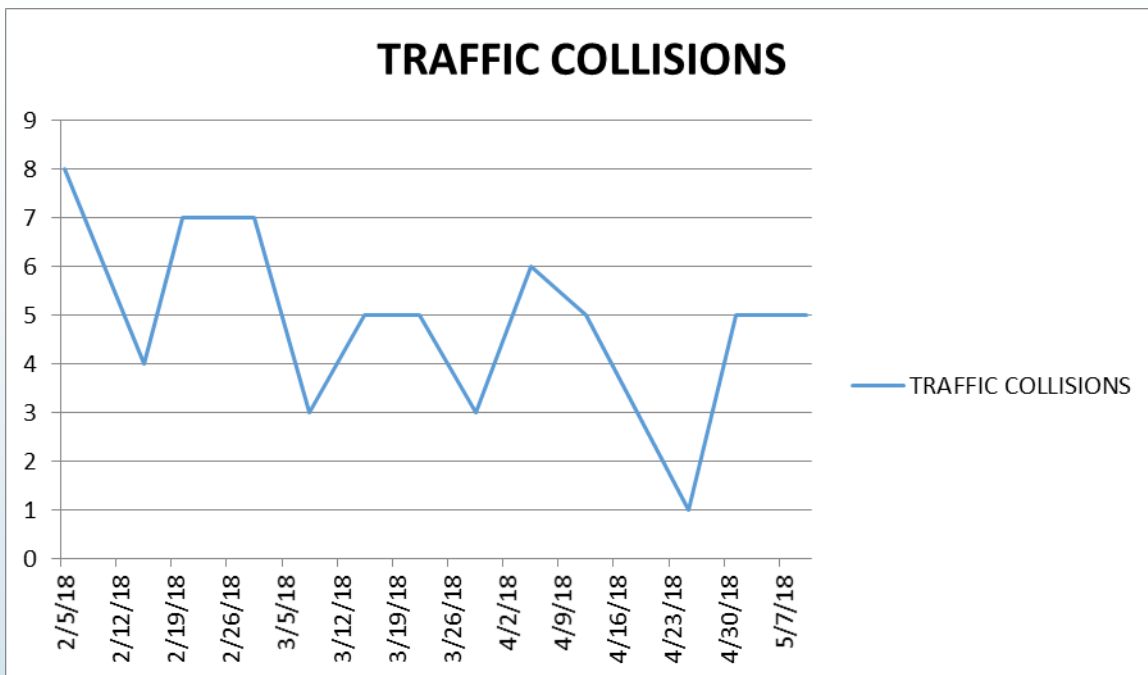

Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on May 8th, 15th, 18th, 24th and 30th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

SFPD Investigators Arrest Prolific Commercial Burglar

On April 25, 2018 at approximately 11:13 AM, members of the San Francisco Police Department's Burglary Unit arrested 58 year-old James Flanagan of San Francisco, on the 500 block of Ellis Street. The arrest was in regards to a series of commercial burglaries of which Flanagan had been identified as the suspect.

The burglaries primarily targeted tech startup companies throughout the Central and Southern Police Districts over a six week period between March 12, 2018 and April 24th, 2018. Losses in the burglaries included nearly \$75,000 worth of electronics.

An investigation led to the identification of Flanagan who already had a felony warrant for his arrest. Flanagan was arrested and charged with twelve counts of burglary and nine counts of grand theft. Flanagan has an extensive history of burglary arrests and was on felony probation during these crimes.

Types of Crime Reports That Can Be Filed Online:

- **Harassing Phone Calls:** When you are experiencing annoying calls - with no known suspects; for example, hang-ups or heavy breathing.
- **Lost Property:** When property has disappeared and not stolen. If you think it could have been taken but you have no idea by who, you may enter the report online.
- **Theft:** When property is stolen but there has been no illegal entry or contact by the thief.
- **Vandalism/Graffiti:** The act of changing, modifying or defacing public or private property, including graffiti.
- **Vehicle Burglary:** When property was stolen from a vehicle.
- **Vehicle Tampering:** Tampering with a motor vehicle, including vandalism/graffiti of the vehicle.

Calling the Police:

Dispatchers ask questions in a particular order for a reason. It is best to stay calm and answer all questions to the best of your ability.

Complaint: **Location, Hazards (ie. weapons at scene), Victim info (sex, age, condition)**

Suspect Description: **Gender, Race, Age, Clothing, distinguishing features**

Vehicle Description: **Color, Make, Model, License Plate, distinguishing features**
