Dog Bite

A dog, walking with its owner, was suddenly attacked by another dog that ran out of a garage trailing its leash. The victim dog was bitten several times in the chest and the two combatants were separated by the two owners and witnesses. Ingleside Officers Elliston and Taft, walking a beat nearby, responded to the scene and interviewed witnesses and the two dog owners. Malicious Mischief Vandalism

Ingleside Officer Hopkins was on routine patrol when he heard several people screaming in the vicinity of a stopped Muni bus. He then noticed a woman running up Persia Street towards London, The woman yelled at Officer Hopkins, pointing up the Persia Street, that two men running ahead of her, had stolen her phone. Officer Hopkins radioed for assistance and, along with Officers Hopkins, Lee, and Barajas stopped both suspected thieves a short distance away. The stolen phone was also located nearby. A man walked into Ingleside Station to report a robbery. Possession of a Firearm

A call of “a subject casing vehicles” prompted dispatch to send Ingleside Officers Parker, Bobila, Anderson, and Billings to investigate. The officers arrived and found a bicycle in the front yard of a home. They also found a suspect near the side gate of the same home. They quickly placed him in custody and searched his clothing revealing a hidden and loaded revolver. The suspect said he was there to visit his girlfriend and her baby and was not a burglar. A resident of the home confirmed his story and said the pair had argued before that evening and the suspect had left the premises. The officers arrested him for illegal possession of a loaded firearm and transported him to the County Jail for booking. Report number: 190256337

Carjacking

A parking control officer had his city owned Toyota Prius DPT vehicle stolen while on duty. The victim told Ingleside Officers Gonzalez, Kerlegan, Brown, Church, and Jensen that he was writing citations for cars parked on the sidewalk when an unknown suspect got into the City owned Prius. The parking control officer unsuccessfully struggled with the suspect, suffering a minor injury, before suspect drove away southbound on Mission Street. A GPS device in the Prius alerted police to its location on the 900 Block of Huron Avenue. The Prius was unoccupied and had collided with a parked car. A witness said the suspect ran away after the collision. Officer Gonzalez was able to download security camera footage from inside the Prius showing the suspect. The officers also requested footage from nearby homeowners with security cameras. The DPT officer refused medical attention. Report number: 190256456

Attempted Robbery

A Muni passenger was attacked by two unknown suspects who tried to steal his cellphone and earbuds. The victim told Ingleside Officers Lozano and McCall that he exited the #14 bus through the front door at Excelsior and Mission and was attacked by fellow passengers who exited one of the rear doors. The suspects punched the victim in the face several times before grabbing the earbuds, but not the phone, and sprinting away. The victim was able to retrieve the earbuds a short distance away just before police arrived. The officers summoned an ambulance and medical personnel treated the victim at the scene. Possession of a Firearm

A car with paper plates and with illegally tinted windows caught the attention of Ingleside Officers Lustenberger, Naser, and Sgt. Innocencio. The officers stopped to question the driver and discovered the paper plates were covering the vehicle's legal license plates for possibly nefarious reasons. The driver turned out was on probation for a burglary conviction. Inside the car was a mask and a loaded firearm with an illegal extended magazine. The car and the gun were placed into evidence and the suspect was arrested for being a felon in possession of an illegal firearm. Report number: #190255345

Burglary

A group of burglars thought they had an ingenious method to steal an ATM machine. They took a Ram Truck, stolen from an Oakland address, and backed it through the front door of the CVS pharmacy. Then the trio took a cable attached to the rear bumper and tied it around an ATM located inside the store. They put the truck in drive and towed the ATM out of the store dragging it down the street. Unfortunately, they only had the upper half of the ATM and the money half, the lower part, remained in the store. Ingleside Officers Cephus, Flkores, Wong, Lake, and Ferronato found the truck, the cable, and the top half of the ATM nearby. The suspects had already escaped. Robbery

A call about a street fight turned out to be less of a fight and more of robbery. The three victims told Ingleside Officers Paredes, Quinlan, Siracusa, Powers, Andrade, and other units that two men, one with a handgun, approached them and took cellphones, money, and other property. The victims were standing outside and talking when the robberies occurred. A nearby resident gave the officers surveillance video showing the two suspects running down the street. Robbery

A citizen called police after being stopped by a woman who said she had been robbed. Ingleside Officers Quinlan and Paredes arrived and immediately summoned medical assistance. The victim said she was waiting to meet a male friend of hers when a car pulled up with her friend driving and another woman in the passenger seat. The woman exited the car and began to punch and kick the victim several times before grabbing her cellphone and escaping. The suspect then re-entered the car, which sped away. Robbery

A woman at home heard noises outside her residence. She looked outside through the front window and saw a man rummaging through items in the bed of her pickup truck. She told Ingleside Officers Lustenberger, Mora, and Sgt. Inocencio that the suspect had taken a trampoline from the back of the truck and she ran outside to confront him. The victim and suspect then got into a tug-of-war with the trampoline before the suspect finally gained control of the item. The suspect then took the trampoline and hit the victim several times in the face and stomach before running away. Graffiti Vandalism

Ingleside Sgt. Browne was on routine patrol when he spotted a man “tagging” a Muni electrical box. Sgt. Browne, who was working alone, asked for backup and continued to follow the suspect as he walked nearby and took out an etching tool marking a bus shelter. Ingleside Officers Lewis, Little, and Morrow arrived and helped with the arrest of the suspect. He was cited and released and the scene and his tools were confiscated for evidence. Theft & Resisting Arrest

A shoplifting incident prompted dispatch to send Ingleside Officers Powers and Zandanel to investigate. The store manager gave a description of the suspects and showed security video of the theft. The officers broadcast a description of the suspects to surrounding units. Approximately an hour later, Ingleside Officers Powers and Zandanel were called back to the same area to investigate an aggravated assault (see item below report #190252761). The assault involved the same suspects. Again they broadcast a description and this time a witness called police saying the suspects were at Crocker-Amazon Park. Ingleside Officers Wise, Price, along with Powers and Zandanel responded and found the suspects. They attempted to arrest them but they fled prompting a brief foot chase. All the suspects were finally apprehended on the 100 block of Brookdale Avenue. Stolen items including a backpack, makeup, laundry detergent, and condoms were found strewn along the path between the park and the Sunnydale area. One 20 year old suspect was booked for theft and other crimes and taken to the County Jail. The other suspects were cited and released to their parents or guardians. Report number: 190252799

Robbery

A woman went outside to smoke a cigarette and noticed a strange man rummaging through the contents of her parked car. She yelled, "Get out of my car" and the suspect quickly exited the vehicle. The victim's son, inside the home, heard his mother scream at the suspect and quickly got up and chased the suspect down Sawyer Street. He quickly caught up with him and a fight ensued with the suspect surrendering the backpack with several stolen items. The suspect also lost his cellphone and other items during the tussle. The suspect got up and ran to a nearby residence where he was again confronted by the victim's son. This time the suspect took out a knife and cut the hand of the victim's son before running away again. The victim's son stopped the pursuit and returned home with the backpack and the suspect's property. Ingleside Officers Parker and Bobila responded to the scene and broadcast a description of the suspect to the surrounding units. They also retrieved surveillance video of the suspect from residents nearby. Report number: 190253327

Aggravated Assault


A man assaulted on [a Muni bus prompted dispatch to send Ingleside](#) Officers Powers, Zandanel, Hoge and Labson to investigate. When they arrived on scene they found the victim suffering from wounds on his face. He told the officers while en-route to the hospital that he was punched in the face by another passenger as he attempted to board a Muni bus. The suspect asked for money and the victim refused to give him any funds. The suspect, along with several accomplices, then escaped off the bus before police arrived. They were later detained with one being arrested and others being cited for crimes unrelated to this incident (See report # 190252799 above). Report number: 190252761

Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

1. Graduate the SFFD NERT course (<http://sf-fire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-team-nert>), or,
2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (<https://sanfranciscopolice.org/community-police-academy>)
3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.

SFPD Makes Arrest in Explosion of Homemade Rocket

On April 8th, 2019 San Francisco police officers from the Tenderloin District Station responded to the 500 block of Leavenworth Street on the report of an explosion. Upon arrival, officers observed debris consistent with a homemade rocket.

A witness reported seeing an unknown, approximately 5'10", 30-35 year old white male place the device on the ground and walk away. The device exploded moments after the suspect fled westbound on Geary Street on a bicycle.

The SFPD Bomb Squad responded to the scene and conducted an investigation. No other devices were located. Surveillance video showed the suspect placing and lighting what appears to be a homemade rocket, which then exploded.

SFPD released a crime bulletin regarding the incident. Over the course of the investigation, SFPD's Arson Task Force developed a possible location of the suspect.

On April 10th at approximately 8:11 AM, a male matching the description of the suspect was seen in the area of the 1800 block of Post Street. The suspect was wearing what appeared to be the same or similar clothing as the suspect in the crime alert bulletin.

The suspect was detained and taken into custody at the corner of Webster Street and Bush Street. He was identified as 51 year-old Scott Campbell of San Francisco. A search warrant was issued for Campbell's home. The search revealed homemade rocket building supplies and other hazardous materials.

Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct a Traffic Safety Enforcement Operation on April 10th, 17th and 24th with a focus on distracted driving, especially through the use of handheld cell phones and texting. Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road, or your hands off the steering wheel. These are some of the most dangerous things we do behind the wheel that many people do not think about because these actions are so common.

It is important to recognize the dangers of distracted driving. In California, cell phone laws were enacted to help prevent distracted driving and make roads safer. The law prohibits driving while holding a cell phone in your hand. If the cell phone is used in a hands-free manner, such as voice command or the use of a mounting device, it is completely legal. While driving, you can single swipe or tap the screen to activate or deactivate a feature or function, but you cannot text, scroll or tap multiple times. The law allows using your cell phone for emergency purposes, including, but not limited to, an emergency call to a law enforcement agency, health care provider, fire department, or other emergency services agency or entity.

Any driver under the age of 18 cannot use a cell phone or any other electronic wireless device at all (not hand-held, hands-free, Bluetooth, speaker phone, or any other means) except for the above emergency purposes.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.




Distracted Driving Prevention

- ✓ Never Text and Drive
- ✓ Silence your phone before you drive
- ✓ Pull over to safe parking spot to make a call
- ✓ Don't text or call someone you know is driving



Cell Phone Law

-  Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.
-  To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seven-inch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.
-  When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.
-  A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.
-  You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.

Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Enforcement Operations Plan for San Francisco with OTS Grant

The San Francisco Police Department will conduct Traffic Safety Enforcement Operations on April 9th, 18th, 22nd and 26th with a focus on bicycle and pedestrian safety. Over the past three years, the department has identified areas where significant numbers of pedestrian and bicycle-related collisions have occurred and responded by deploying additional officers to those areas in an effort to prevent deaths and injuries. Special attention will be given to Focus on the Five violations: speeding, making illegal turns, failing to stop for stop signs and red lights, failing to yield to pedestrians in cross walks, as well as any other dangerous violation.

San Francisco is committed to eliminating traffic deaths on our streets as part of Vision Zero SF. Vision Zero SF is our city's commitment to prioritize safe streets for everyone.

Bicycle and pedestrian fatalities are rising in California as more people use these non-motorized means of transportation. In 2016, California witnessed 867 pedestrians and 147 bicyclists killed, accounting for more than 28 percent of all traffic fatalities.

All riders are reminded to always wear a helmet – those under 18 years of age must wear helmets by law. Pedestrians should cross the street only in marked or unmarked crosswalks at corners. All motorists are reminded to be mindful of others who share the road.

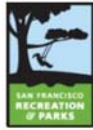

HOW TO REPORT GRAFFITI VANDALISM



The SFPD has learned that there are 5 major categories of graffiti which include:

- Communicative graffiti; Written to convey one's point of view. Often political.
- Hate crime graffiti. Written to instill fear with in real or perceived protected classes of people.
- Artistic graffiti. A character or nonverbal symbol often written repeatedly by an individual.
- Tagger graffiti. A written name or moniker repeatedly written by the same person or tagger. These pieces of graffiti are referred to as tags or graffiti tags.
- Gang graffiti. Written to mark gang territory. Written to create fear and intimidation toward rival gang members. Written to promote a gang or set of a gang.

Of these five different types of graffiti we know that the main source of graffiti vandalism in San Francisco is tagger graffiti. Exposing a graffiti taggers graffiti tag or moniker is a key to stopping them from committing more graffiti crimes.

The following steps should be taken when reporting graffiti crimes in progress:

- Call 911
- Pay particular attention to the Suspect's description and where they wrote their graffiti
- Follow up with the Officers and be ready to provide a statement and identify any detained person(s)
- If applicable provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cold graffiti cases with supporting evidence:

- Call (415)553-0123
- Provide full Suspect description or any other key details
- If applicable provide surveillance video
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

The following steps should be made when reporting cases with less supporting evidence:

- Report online at <http://sanfranciscopolice.org/reportS>
- Include photos of the graffiti which can be uploaded through the report writing system
- Provide a cost estimate for the damaged property

To report graffiti on public property us the SF311 app.

The following Steps should be made to deter graffiti vandalism:

- Paint over graffiti quickly. If taggers know that their work won't last they are more likely to move to another location
- Use ample lighting. Taggers often use the cover of darkness to keep from being detected
- Set up surveillance cameras. Their presence act as a deterrent and they are useful in helping to identify taggers with prior arrests
