Ingleside Captain's Message

While April 18th is a day where we pause and remember the 1906 earthquake and fire, there is no day like the present to action plan on earthquake and disaster preparedness for yourself, your family, your block, and your neighborhood. In the spirit of constantly challenging ourselves to be better and more prepared to adapt and overcome stress and adversity, Sup. Safai's Office and Ingleside Police Station partnered with the Neighborhood Empowerment Network to run a "Shake Tank" earthquake simulation. The April 24th event, graciously hosted by Pastor Barbara Cornejo at the Daring Faith Celebration Centre, lived up to its tagline: "Experience your tomorrow, today," when resident leaders from the Cayuga neighborhood engaged in the earthquake simulation with representatives from BART, Riordan High School, Recreation and Parks, the Mission Childcare Consortium, School Resource Officers, the Department of Emergency Management, CalOES, FEMA, SFFD, City College of SF, and many others. There were many positive takeaways from this event, with the biggest takeaway being the fierce urgency of getting ourselves as ready as we can be, so that we have the capacity to help others. Featured Ingleside Officer of the Month **Ofc Maria Peregrina**



Ofc. Maria Peregrina #2266 is a 10-year veteran of the San Francisco Police Department, serving the last 5 years at Ingleside Station and for the last 4 years as a Field Training Officer for new Police Academy graduates. Ofc. Peregrina works day-watch patrol and her work product exemplifies her strong dedication to public safety, her conscientious determination to prevent, investigate, and document violent and property crimes, and her generosity of spirit which empowers victims and witnesses of crime. On 04/30/2019, her quick thinking and decisive intervention at the scene of an “in-progress suicide with a knife call” clearly, to all of us at the scene and to the medical staff at San Francisco General Hospital, led to a human life being saved. For this, she and her teammates at that incident, are being nominated for both a Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) award and the Department’s “Life Saving Award.” For her work on this day and every day, she is our featured officer of the month.

Featured Community Member of the Month

John Stachnick is a fifth generation San Franciscan who serves our community as President of the Cayuga Improvement Association (CIA) and as the Secretary of the District 11 Council. According to his biography on the CIA website (<https://cayugaimprovementassociation.org>), John is described as being passionate about revitalizing the neighborhood to be safe, diverse, family and pedestrian friendly. This passion has certainly been evident as he took action to make these goals as a reality. Having seen crime reports in the neighborhood and being relied upon by Ingleside Station for his security camera footage of criminal incidents (which led to the arrests of a car thief, a car burglar, an arsonist, and several hit-and-run drivers), he put a plan in place to community organize and respond. He conducted comprehensive neighborhood canvassing to reach out to neighbors interested in purchasing cameras, he spoke to several camera sales companies and representatives, and ultimately obtained over 150 signups for residential safety cameras. Stolen Vehicle

Officers Lewis, Ramirez, Chang, and Ocreto responded to the report of people sleeping in a vehicle. Turns out that the vehicle was also reported stolen out of Hayward, California. Officers arrived on scene and found a male asleep in the driver seat, and a female asleep in the passenger seat. The keys to the vehicle were in the ignition, but the vehicle was not running. The officers located a lease agreement between the male suspect and the owner of the vehicle. Shots Fired

Officers Fogarty and Zhao responded to the above area on a shots fired call. The officers arrived on scene and located ten .40 caliber spent casings on the street, one fired bullet, and two bullet fragments. Officers also observed damage to a vehicle and contacted the owner who could not provide any information. Officers later viewed security footage from the area and observed a dark colored SUV pull up in front of an address on the 1700 block of Sunnydale Avenue, and someone inside the vehicle fired multiple rounds from the driver seat. Hot Prowl Burglary

Ingleside Officer Naser responded to a hot prowler burglary that just occurred. Victim #1 observed a silver Dodge SUV parked directly in front of her house. The victim saw two suspects exit the SUV and walked towards the front of her residence. The victim's mother came running upstairs and stated that suspects were trying to break in through the front door. The family ran downstairs and held the door closed to prevent the four suspects from entering. The family dog was barking and the victim thinks this may have scared off the suspects. The suspects then fled in the SUV. Officers discovered that two security cameras attached to the home were disabled, most likely by the suspects prior to the burglary. Case # 190291747

Possession of Firearm

Ingleside Officers Downs, Burke, and Barajas spotted two subjects smoking marijuana from inside of a parked vehicle. The subject sitting in the driver's seat was on felony probation and had a current search and seizure out of San Francisco. These officers recognized the subject from his Instagram account where he frequently posted images of himself with a large amount of marijuana, cash and firearms. The officers went to this subjects home and conducted a probation search of the subject's residence and seized two .45 pistols, LSD, a scale, and packaging materials. The subject was taken into custody without incident and booked accordingly. Case # 190289827

Weapon Arrest

Ingleside Officers Paredes, Labson, and Ducharme responded to the above location on a call of a subject with a gun. The officers observed a suspect matching the description running from the scene. Officers ordered the subject to stop, but he did not comply. After a short foot chase the suspect stopped, reached under his sweatshirt and pulled out what eventually turned out to be a BB gun modeled after a Glock 19. Luckily the subject immediately placed the replica firearm on the ground and was taken into custody without incident. Burglary/Robbery

Officers Chang and Ocreto responded to a hot prowler burglary that had just occurred. The victim reported that she heard noises outside of her bedroom door. When she opened the door she saw a suspect who advanced on her, knocking her to the ground. The male suspect grabbed a paring knife with an approximate 3 inch long blade that was lying on the coffee table top. The suspect held the blade in the victim's direction as she lay on the floor beneath him. The suspect then kept saying, "Give me the money!" Leaving the victim lying on the ground, the suspect went into the victim's bedroom and began looking for money. At that time, the victim got up and left out the front door. The suspect pursued after the victim, grabbed her by the arm, and pulled her back inside of the unit. Once both were back inside of the doorway, the suspect closed and locked the front door behind him. The suspect again brandished the knife at the victim, and threatened, "Give me the money or I'll kill you!" The victim walked ahead of the suspect, and before the suspect could immediately follow, the victim grabbed a larger knife that was lying on the kitchen counter. The victim turned and brandished the knife at the suspect. The suspect then quickly unlocked the front door and fled out into the backyard. The victim was not seriously injured during the incident. Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team
(ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Pathways to ALERT membership:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses, please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert. Once NERT Certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program at sfpdalert@sfgov.org. After clearing our background check, you are eligible for ALERT training.
2. If you are an SFPD Community Police Academy graduate, you are eligible for ALERT training after clearing our background check.



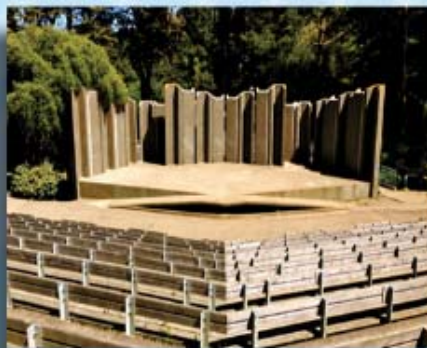

Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.





Distracted Driving Prevention


- ✓ Never Text and Drive
- ✓ Silence your phone before you drive
- ✓ Pull over to safe parking spot to make a call
- ✓ Don't text or call someone you know is driving




Cell Phone Law

 Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.

 To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seven-inch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.

 When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.

 A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.

 You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.

Ability to Pay in San Francisco Traffic Court

If you cannot afford to pay your ticket, you have a right to ask the traffic clerk or judge to consider your financial circumstances.

The court will look at your financial information, and then will decide whether to:

1. **Reduce** Your Fine, and/or
2. Offer you **Community Service**, and/or
3. Offer you an Affordable **Payment Plan**

I can't afford to pay for my traffic ticket.



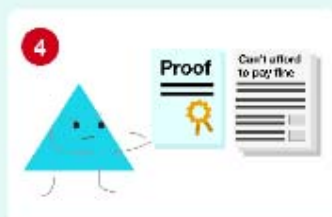
Any time after you have been found guilty of a ticket, you can request the court to reduce your fine because you can't afford it.



The court will give you a form called **Can't Afford to Pay Fine (TR320/CR-320)** so you can explain why you can't afford to pay.



Provide as much detail as you can on the form about your income, expenses, why you can't afford to pay, and what you would like the court to do.



Attach documents showing your income and expenses, or explain on the form why these documents aren't available. Submit your form to the court.



The court will read it and let you know the decision by mail. Check with the court if you haven't heard back after 30 days.



If you've had a change of circumstances or need to provide more info about your situation, you may submit another request.

If you are on **public benefits** or have **income less than 250%** of the Federal Poverty Level, you can have your fines and fees reduced by 60% or more.

You may pay the rest on a payment plan or with community service.

La corte lo leerá y le informará la decisión por correo. Consulte al tribunal si no ha recibido una respuesta después de 30 días.



Puede presentar otra solicitud si ha cambiado de circunstancias o necesita proporcionar más información sobre su situación.
