Featured Ingleside Community Member of the Month  
**Ellen "Nina" Lipney**



Ellen "Nina" Lipney was only 32 years old when she first stepped into Ingleside Station. Nina had worked for several years at Taraval, Central, Northern Stations and spent a year working at communications (Dispatch Center) as a 1426 Senior Clerk Typist for the City and County of San Francisco.

Nina had only worked for 6 weeks at Ingleside before that fateful day of August 29th, 1971. Nina, Sgt. John V. Young, and Officer Jim Nance were working as a secretary, Station Keeper and Station Duty. Nina was in the North East corner of the business office, typing with her back facing the front lobby window when suspects entered the lobby. Nina heard 5 to 6 gunshots and immediately took cover behind a filing cabinet. Nina realized she had been hit by buckshot from a shotgun in her left elbow.

Nina waited for the gunfire to subside, emerged from behind a filing cabinet, and heroically broadcast an emergency request for assistance on the Station radio.

Nina never returned to Ingleside Station and later went to work for the board of education as a clerk.

We are grateful that she came to Ingleside Station for the remembrance ceremony, where she inspired all who attended with her storytelling, humor, and wisdom.

Ingleside Officers Powers and Plummer responded to McLaren Park on the call of a three year old being bit by a dog. The adult victim (dad) reported he was in the dog park holding his three year old child when a grey Pitbull approached the pair while off leash. The Pitbull jumped and bit the adult on the back of his right tricep. This caused the victim and his child to fall to the ground, where the Pitbull bit the child on the inner right thigh. Animal Care and Control did not respond to the scene, and the owner of the Pitbull was ultimately cited for the appropriate violations. Ingleside Officers Brown, and Church responded to the Balboa Park Bart station on the call of a robbery. The officers arrived and met with the victim who spoke limited English. Officers utilized the SFPD Language Line for translation, and were told the following: The victim was waiting at the Muni platform when he was approached by three suspects. Two of the three suspects grabbed the victim by his arms, while the other suspect reached into the victim's pocket and stole his cell phone. The victim attempted to regain his cell phone, but one of the suspects reached in his waistband and simulated having a firearm. The suspects then ran away from the scene. The suspect then made his way to the front of the victim's property where he fled on foot towards Plymouth Avenue. The officers scoured the area and located the suspect who matched the description. The suspect advised the officers that he was going through some family issues and was blowing off steam and admitted to jumping the fence. A search of the suspect resulted in a glass pipe usually used to ingest methamphetamines. The homeowner could not positively identify the suspect, therefore he was cited for the glass pipe offense and released at the scene. Report Number: 190635349

Officer Tien was sent to a call of an assault at the intersection of Mission and Persia Street. The victim told Officer Tien that he was stopped at the Red light when suddenly a man approached his car and knocked on his driver window. Not knowing what the man wanted, the victim rolled down his window to find out what he wanted. The man wanted the victim to pull his vehicle forward. The victim informed the man that he couldn't pull forward until the light turned Green. This agitated the man and without cause punched the victim several times through the open driver window. The victim crawled out of his vehicle where he was then chased around a parked car. After the ordeal, the victim was able to take a few photos of the suspect and the suspect's vehicle as he fled the area. Officer Tien used the photographs and ran a computer inquiry on the license plate and identified the suspect in the photograph. The case was referred to the Ingleside's investigative team. Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



## What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

### Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

1. Graduate the SFPD NERT course (<http://sf-fire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-team-nert>), or,
2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (<https://sanfranciscopolice.org/community-police-academy>)
3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.

### Project Description

S.F. Public Works has partnered with the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission to complete infrastructure improvements along Alemany Blvd. between Seneca Avenue and Congdon Street. Public Works will manage the project and we've hired D'Arcy & Harty Construction, Inc. to complete the work.

Construction is scheduled to begin in late June 2019 with completion expected in December 2020.

This project will include sewer main replacement, street base repairs, curb ramp and bulb-out installation, minor traffic signal work at the Santa Rosa Ave. and Silver Ave. intersections and repaving between Congdon Street and Seneca Avenue. Please note, not all blocks will include sewer main replacement work. Please visit our project webpage for additional information on which blocks will include sewer work.

Sewer service will not be interrupted during construction. Please continue to use your household plumbing per the usual.

Once the sewer work is complete, crews will begin preparations to repave the street. Preparations will include installation of curb ramps and bulb-outs followed by street base repairs. Street base repairs will require the contractor saw-cut sections of the roadway, remove the broken concrete and pour back fresh concrete. Replacing the street base now will improve the longevity of the new asphalt road.

Since there are several blocks included in this project, it may be weeks or months before we reach your block. We are sending you this notice in advance of any work on the project.

### Neighborhood Tip:

Please call 3-1-1 to report any issues in the neighborhood such as potholes, burnt-out traffic signals or streetlights, leaky fire hydrants, broken curbs or sidewalks, illegal dumping, etc. 311 is the primary customer service center for the City of San Francisco. They'll route your concern to the appropriate agency for follow-up.

### Impacts and Restrictions

Street parking may not be possible on the block during construction work hours. In some cases, parking may not be possible on part of the adjacent block as we taper the traffic lanes to accommodate the work zone. Please see posted barricade signs for exact work hours, days, and locations, because they may vary depending on the construction task. The "no parking" signs will be posted at least 72 hours in advance to alert motorists of parking restrictions.

Vehicles parked in the construction zone during the posted work hours will be towed at the vehicle owner's expense. Please allow extra travel time during construction work hours.

Street cleaning restrictions will still be in effect.

We apologize for the inconvenience and thank you for your patience as we work to improve San Francisco.

## Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.





### Distracted Driving Prevention


- ✓ Never Text and Drive
- ✓ Silence your phone before you drive
- ✓ Pull over to safe parking spot to make a call
- ✓ Don't text or call someone you know is driving





## Cell Phone Law

 Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.

 To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seven-inch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.

 When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.

 A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.

 You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.
