S.F. police honor Ingleside Station officer shot and killed 48 years ago

Ellen "Nina" Lipney was only 32 years old when she first stepped into Ingleside Station. Nina had worked for several years at Taraval, Central, Northern Stations and spent a year working at communications (Dispatch Center) as a 1426 Senior Clerk Typist for the City and County of San Francisco.

Nina had only worked for 6 weeks at Ingleside before that fateful day of August 29th, 1971. Nina, Sgt. John V. Young, and Officer Jim Nance were working as a secretary, Station Keeper and Station Duty. Nina was in the North East corner of the business office, typing with her back facing the front lobby window when suspects entered the lobby. Nina heard 5 to 6 gunshots and immediately took cover behind a filing cabinet. Nina realized she had been hit by buckshot from a shotgun in her left elbow.

Nina waited for the gunfire to subside, emerged from behind a filing cabinet, and heroically broadcast an emergency request for assistance on the Station radio.

Nina never returned to Ingleside Station and later went to work for the board of education as a clerk.

We are grateful that she came to Ingleside Station for the remembrance ceremony, where she inspired all who attended with her storytelling, humor, and wisdom.

9:09am 100 Blk. Holladay Attempted Burglary Two alert neighbors called police after observing a man attempting to break into a vacant home. Ingleside Officers Lewis and Young arrived and found the suspect in the backyard of the residence. He was quickly placed in custody. The neighbors provided video of the suspect using an object, possibly a screwdriver, to pry open a window screen. The video then showed the suspect going to a side door and probing the frame with the same object. A search of the suspect's clothing revealed two glass pipes used for smoking narcotics. A call came in about a suspicious man peering into windows, trying doors, and reaching into the window of one parked car and removing property. Ingleside Officers Chang and Prieto were dispatched and found the suspect walking nearby. He was quickly placed in custody. Neighbors and the victim of a vehicle break-in confirmed the identity of the suspect and also provided excellent surveillance video showing the suspect walking by the victim's car before traveling to the side of the parked vehicle and reaching through the window and taking property. Ingleside Officers Burke and Downs were on routine patrol when they spotted a vehicle, with two occupants, parked illegally in a bus stop at Geneva and Mission. The officers stopped behind the vehicle and approached the occupants who had a significant amount of marijuana in plain view. The officers ordered both occupants out of the car and searched them finding the driver hiding a knife in his pants pocket. The passenger had a loaded pistol in his possession. Both the passenger and the driver were placed in custody. The passenger told the officers there were additional firearms and ammunition inside a black bag inside the car. Ingleside Officers Casey, Garza, and Sgt. Lopez arrived to assist with a search of the vehicle. Inside they found several loose firearm magazines along with another fully automatic weapon. 

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

- 1. Graduate the SFFD NERT course (http://sffire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-teamnert), or,
- 2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (https://sanfranciscopolice.org/communitypolice-academy)
- 3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
- 4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.

Sewer Replacement & Pavement Renovation

Job Order 2925j

Project Description

S.F. Public Works has partnered with the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission to complete infrastructure improvements along Alemany Blvd. between Seneca Avenue and Congdon Street. Public Works will manage the project and

we've hired D'Arcy & Harty Construction, Inc. to complete the work.

Construction is scheduled to begin in late June 2019 with completion expected in December 2020.

This project will include sewer main replacement, street base repairs, curb ramp and bulb-out installation, minor traffic signal work at the Santa Rosa Ave, and Silver Ave, intersections and repaying between Congdon Street and Seneca Avenue. Please note, not all blocks will include sewer main replacement work. Please visit our project webpage for additional information on which blocks will include sewer work.

Sewer service will not be interrupted during construction. Please continue to use your household plumbing per the usual.

Once the sewer work is complete, crews will begin preparations to repave the street. Preparations will include installation of curb ramps and bulb-outs followed by street base repairs. Street base repairs will require the contractor saw-cut sections of the roadway, remove the broken concrete and pour back fresh concrete. Replacing the street base now will improve the longevity of the new asphalt road.

Since there are several blocks included in this project, it may be weeks or months before we reach your block. We are sending you this notice in advance of any work on the project.

Neighborhood Tip:

Please call 3-1-1 to report any issues in the neighborhood such as potholes, burnt-out traffic signals or streetlights, leaky fire hydrants, broken curbs or sidewalks, illegal dumping, etc. 311 is the primary customer service center for the City of San Francisco. They'll route your concern to the appropriate agency for follow-up.

Impacts and Restrictions

Street parking may not be possible on the block during construction work hours. In some cases, parking may not be possible on part of the adjacent block as we taper the traffic lanes to accommodate the work zone. Please see posted barricade signs for exact work hours, days, and locations, because they may vary depending on the construction task. The "no parking" signs will be posted at least 72 hours in advance to alert motorists of parking restrictions.

Vehicles parked in the construction zone during the posted work hours will be towed at the vehicle owner's expense. Please allow extra travel time during construction work hours.

Street cleaning restrictions will still be in effect.

We apologize for the inconvenience and thank you for your patience as we work to improve San Francisco.

Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.

Cell Phone Law



Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.



To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seveninch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.



When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.



A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.



You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.


