Captain Joe Engler's Message

Residents, Merchants, and Visitors,

Racism. Intolerance. Bigotry. The men and women of Northern Police Station know that the profession of police officer has no room for such negative and destructive behaviors within the ranks.

Under the leadership of Police Chief Bill Scott, the San Francisco Police Department is on the forefront of police training in the 21st century and has invested heavily in training topics which nurture and develop our department's value system. The SFPD Training Division continually reevaluates standards and best practices for your police force which has benefited from courses on Implicit Bias, De-escalation Techniques, Crisis Intervention Tactics and Community Engagement.

Community Police Advisory Boards (CPABs) have been established in every police district and are comprised of civilian volunteers who advise the district station Captain about public safety, crime and quality of life issues that affect their community. CPAB members play a vital role in communication and problem-solving efforts undertaken here in the Northern District. Because our officers know that we are one Northern Station community that can accomplish great things together, we are addressing challenges with everyone's help.

As your Captain, I want you to know that I am very concerned about the challenges and attendant frustration caused by our district's homelessness problem. These challenges have been met with the steady resolve of your local beat cops, sector cars and dedicated homeless outreach officers who show up when called, even when the odds of a satisfactory outcome are low. By treating everyone they contact with dignity, empathy and fairness, your district police officers protect themselves from negative and destructive behaviors which tend to dehumanize the addicted, afflicted and disadvantaged.

Today, the job of a police officer is difficult. There are many strategies, tactics and programs that are now in place where our officers seek to address complex societal issues through positive interaction and care. Through open dialogue and partnerships created through the Healthy Streets Operation Center, police officers are paired with DPW street cleaners, DPH substance abuse counselors, housing experts and job placement referrals.

As a community, we are very fortunate in many ways. We have a city filled with parks, merchant corridors and attractions of unparalleled beauty. The economy has been strong and many have benefited from the opportunities that have accompanied it. With all that is good, it is difficult for all of us to see people struggling upon our streets.

As your Captain, I pledge to continue to pursue objectives and partnerships that will lead to real solutions while always having our officers mindful of preserving the dignity of the less fortunate.

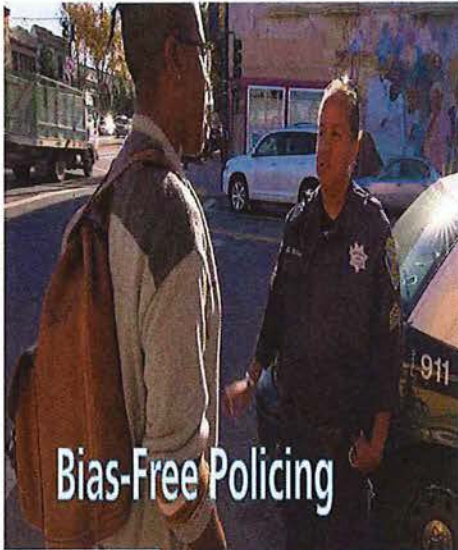

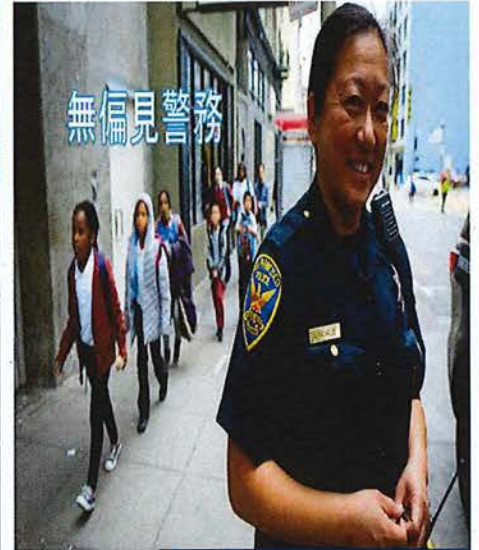

Safety with Respect

INCIDENT RECAPS

On 5/19/19 at 11:36 hours, an auto boost occurred where the victim's firearm was stolen from the area of the 1700 block of Eddy Street. An unknown witness called dispatch regarding an auto boost in progress and provided suspect description and suspect vehicle description. The victim later called the police to provide the property that was stolen from his vehicle. The firearm that was stolen was a Glock 19, 9 mm, black handgun, unknown serial number.

On 7/9/19 at 1621 hours, a sergeant from SFPD's GTF unit contacted Northern Housing officers regarding probable cause to arrest the subject for this auto burglary. The sergeant also stated that three other auto boosts are connected to the subject (190-422-174, 190-422,083, 190-422-152). While on patrol, officers witnessed the subject driving a silver Mercedes and recognized the vehicle as belonging to the subject based on prior police contacts. Officers effected a traffic stop and ordered the subject out of the vehicle and placed him in handcuffs without incident. GTF sergeants and the Northern Housing unit responded to the subject's home to execute the search warrant. Various property was seized during the incident, however, the firearm was not located.

On 7/12/19 at approximately 0245 hours, officers observed a subject appear to act suspiciously in the area of the 1700 block of Pine Street. The officers recognized the subject from numerous police contacts. The officers, who were working in a plain clothes capacity, watched the subject as he cased various vehicles in the area. Officers then saw the subject quickly flee the area of a vehicle that had been broken into. Officers followed, and then approached, the subject and placed him into handcuffs. As the officers searched the subject, he spontaneously stated that he did not break into vehicle but that he did in fact steal property out of the vehicle. Officers were able to locate the victim, who confirmed that the property in the subject's possession did belong to her and was taken from her vehicle. The subject was successfully booked without incident.

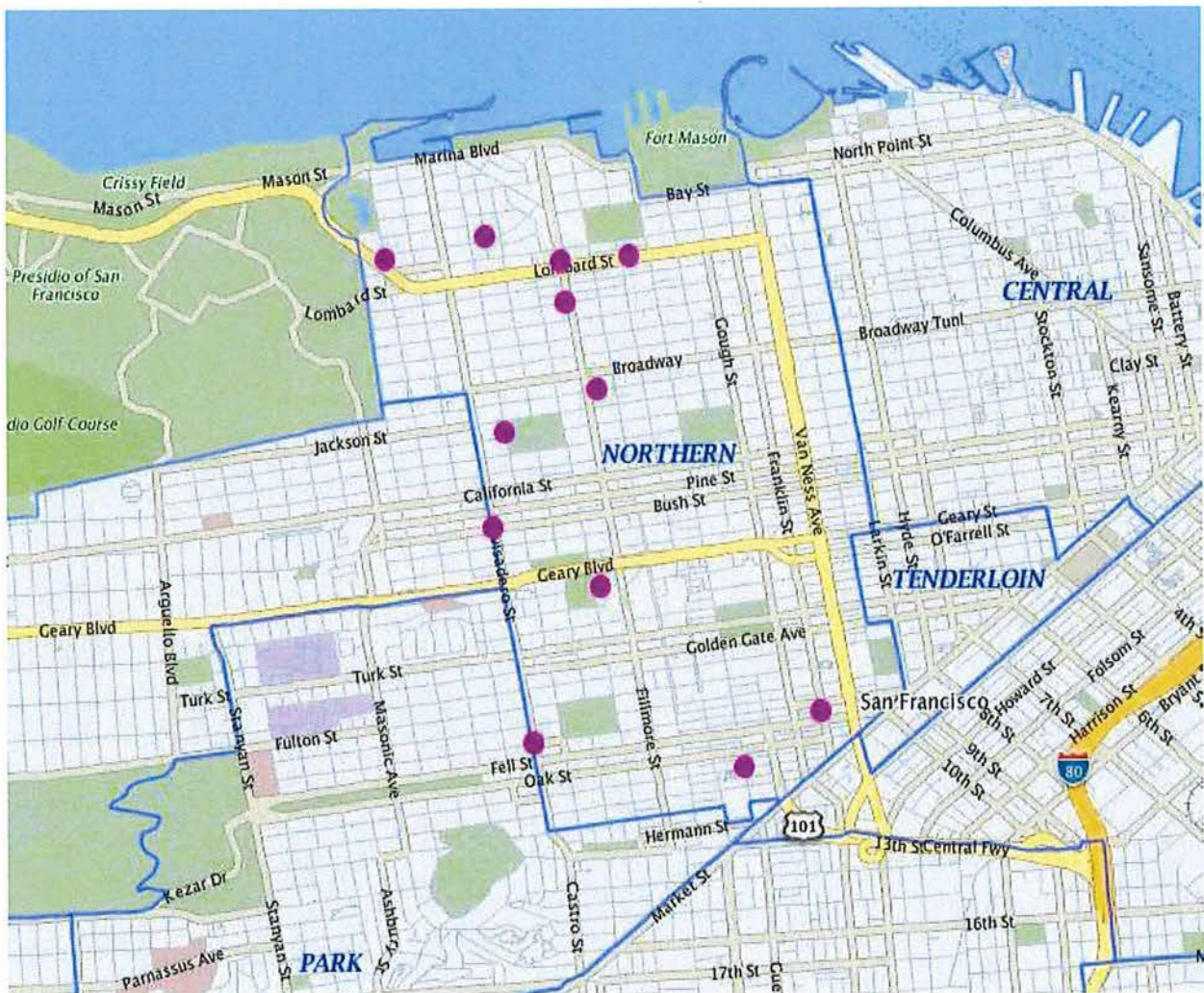

Safety-San Francisco

To most effectively reduce crime, neighbors must work together to make their neighborhood safe. The SAFE agency manages the Neighborhood Watch Program for the City & County of San Francisco.



SAFE, with support from SFPD and DPW, will get Neighborhood Watch signs installed on individual blocks. Groups are able to apply for Neighborhood Watch signs after forming active groups. Signs are a way to publicize the efforts of your group, letting others know that yours is a SAFE neighborhood and one in which crime will not be tolerated.



In order to address the issues cyclists are faced with, SAFE has partnered with the San Francisco Police Department and dedicated community members to create SAFE Bikes. SAFE Bikes maintains a registry to help get your bike back to you in case it's stolen, and an information page to keep you and your bike out of harm's way.

We are accepting Entry Level (Q-2) Police Officer applications. To apply please follow the 2-step process:

1. Apply with the City and County of San Francisco at www.jobaps.com/sf (Entry Level (Q-2) Police Officer)
2. Go to www.nationaltestingnetwork.com, choose law enforcement and register to take the San Francisco Police Department's Written Examination*.

*As part of this process, you will need to establish an account with NTN. A fee is required to take the written examination. Candidates with demonstrated financial hardship may submit a request to have the fee waived prior to test registration.
