Hello all,

Today I am going to talk to you about the posting of No Trespassing signs on the outside of your property. You may notice as you walk down Haight Street green and yellow "No Trespassing" signs posted in various store fronts and also in many neighborhood residents doorways. These signs which are signed by the property owner and posted in a conspicuous place outside their building request enforcement of Municipal Police Code section 25(a) MPC which is a violation of the sign.

When the owner of a property posts the "No trespassing" sign it serves as a notice to all that nobody is allowed to remain on the property. It allows law enforcement to advise or cite any individual for trespassing who is seen to be in violation of the sign. It does not require the owner to call the police to enforce the sign as their signature on the conspicuously posted sign is sufficient to enforce the ordinance. The sign can be enforced 24hrs 7 days /week if so noted on the sign or the owner can decide that the sign only be enforced at particular times of the day as many business owners do.

The first violation of the Section 25(a) MPC is an infraction. A second violation within 24hrs is a misdemeanor 26MPC. i.e. an individual who was cited once is again at the same location within 24 hours in violation of the posted sign.

Please review a copy of the sign on the next page. The signs are effective for 6 months at a time the green sign is for July 1 to December 31st. There is a yellow sign that is effective for Jan 1st to June 30th.

These signs are available at all Police Stations. You can print the sign in this newsletter and post it.

CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE CONTINUED

NO TRESPASSING

REQUEST FOR ENFORCEMENT OF MUNICIPAL POLICE CODE SECTION 25

San Francisco Municipal Police Code Section 25 provides that no person shall willfully remain upon any private property or business premises after being notified to leave by the owner, lessee, or other person in charge. Notice may be oral or in the form of a written notice posted in a conspicuous place.

A violation of Section 25 is an infraction. A second violation within 24 hours (Section 26) is a misdemeanor.

To the San Francisco Police Department:

I hereby request that the San Francisco Police Department enforce the above Municipal Police Code Sections on my behalf and in my absence. I have given no person(s) permission to sleep, lie, or in any way remain within my doorway located at _____ (private property) while my business is closed, during the days and hours listed below (including holidays).

I further state that I will notify the San Francisco Police Department in writing within 24 hours if I do give a person(s) permission to sleep, lie, or in any way remain within said doorway, providing the Police Department with the person(s) name.

I agree to post a copy of this notice in a location where it will be visible to all persons within the said area. I understand that this letter of request expires six months after the below – signed date.

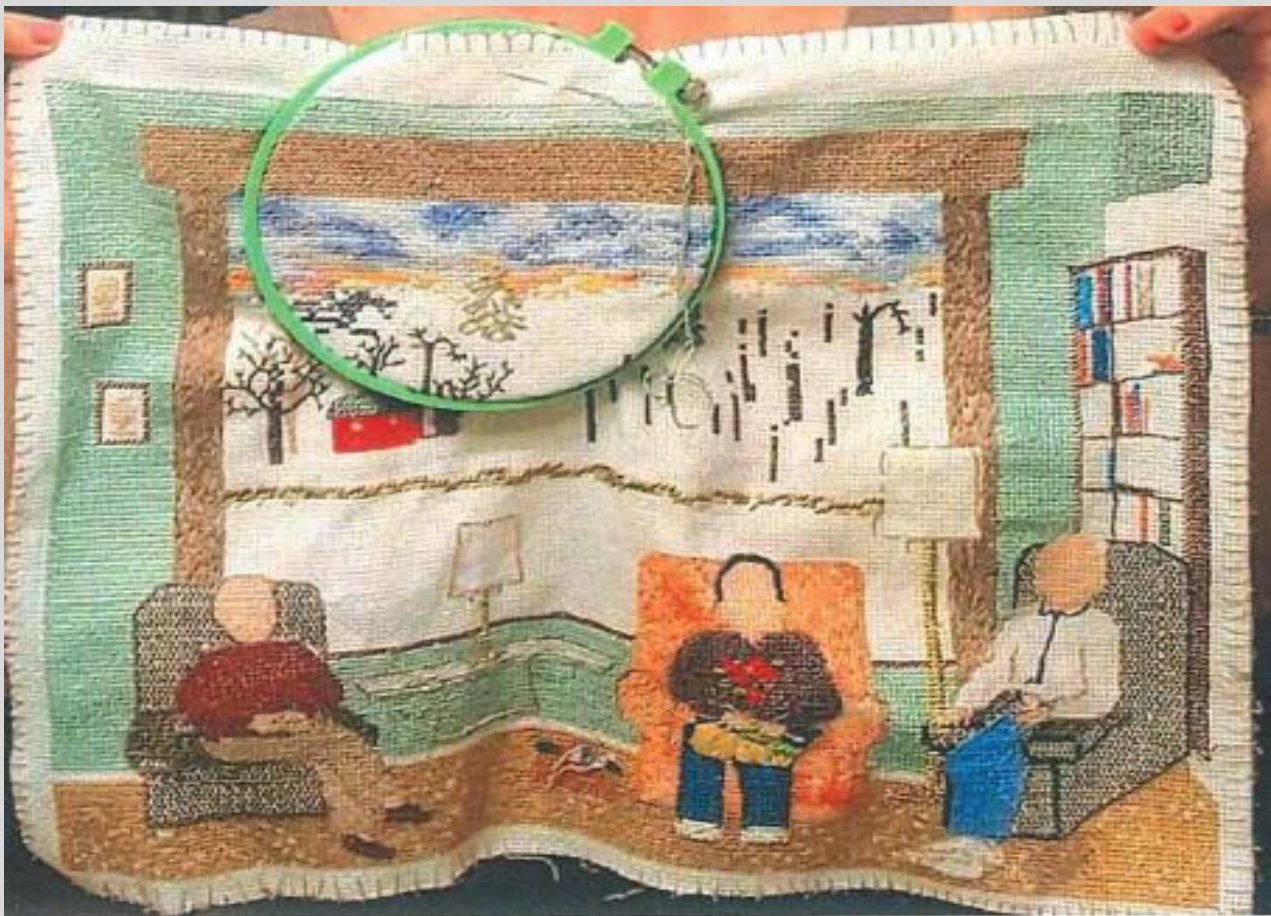

SOME OF PARK STATION'S ARRESTS FOR THE WEEK**Warrant Arrest, Local SF Warrant/Area of Fell St. - 10/11/18 04:00**

Officers were on patrol in the area when they recognized an individual with an outstanding warrant for his arrest. Officers arrested the individual and transported him to Park Station where he was booked for his warrant.

Warrant Arrest, Local SF Warrant/ Area Buena Vista Ave. - 10/12/18 11:05

Officers dispatched to the area regarding an illegally parked vehicle. A computer query on the vehicle license plate returned a match for a missing person's vehicle. The vehicle was unoccupied, a man approached the officers and claimed the vehicle belonged to him. Officers asked for his identification and conducted computer query of the individual, which revealed an outstanding felony warrant for his arrest. Subject was placed under arrest, transported to County Jail #1 and booked for his outstanding warrant.

Civil Sidewalks, Citation/ Area of Ashbury. – 10/12/18 7:40

Officers observed a known subject sitting on the sidewalk violating the city's sit lie violation. Subject was cited.

Battery/ Area of Graystone Ter. -10/13/18 22:00

Officers responded to the area regarding a battery. Two subjects were involved in an altercation. Both suffered from small abrasions. Both subjects signed a Citizen's Arrest against one another. Officers conducted a records query check of both individuals, which revealed neither had any outstanding warrants.

Driving, No License Issued, Vehicle Registration, False Evidence of Traffic Violation Arrest/ Area of Page St. -10/14/18 16:05

Officers observed a vehicle with expired vehicle registration. Officers conducted a traffic stop and made contact with the driver was unlicensed. A records check revealed that the subject was in violation of operating a motor vehicle, while never having a driver's license issued to him prior. The driver was issued a citation with a court date Officers seized the license plates and later booked them as evidence at Park Station.

Narcotics Arrest / Area of 14th St. – 10/15/18 19:47

Officers responded to the area regarding a report of a vandalism. An unknown subject later identified was throwing a scooter at a vehicle and store window. Background check on the subject revealed that he is currently on county probation. Officers conducted a probation search of his back pack and found a plastic baggie containing narcotics. Subject was put under arrest for possession of narcotics.

Robbery, Burglary, Store, Unlawful Entry/ Area of Cole St. - 10/16/18 9:30

Officers responded to the area regarding a possible theft incident. The caller provided a description of the suspect. Responding officers conducted a search of the area and located a subject matching the description of the suspect. The subject was detained and identified. An employee of the store positively identified the subject and confirmed he was the suspect of the robbery. He arrested and transported to Park Police Station where he was booked.

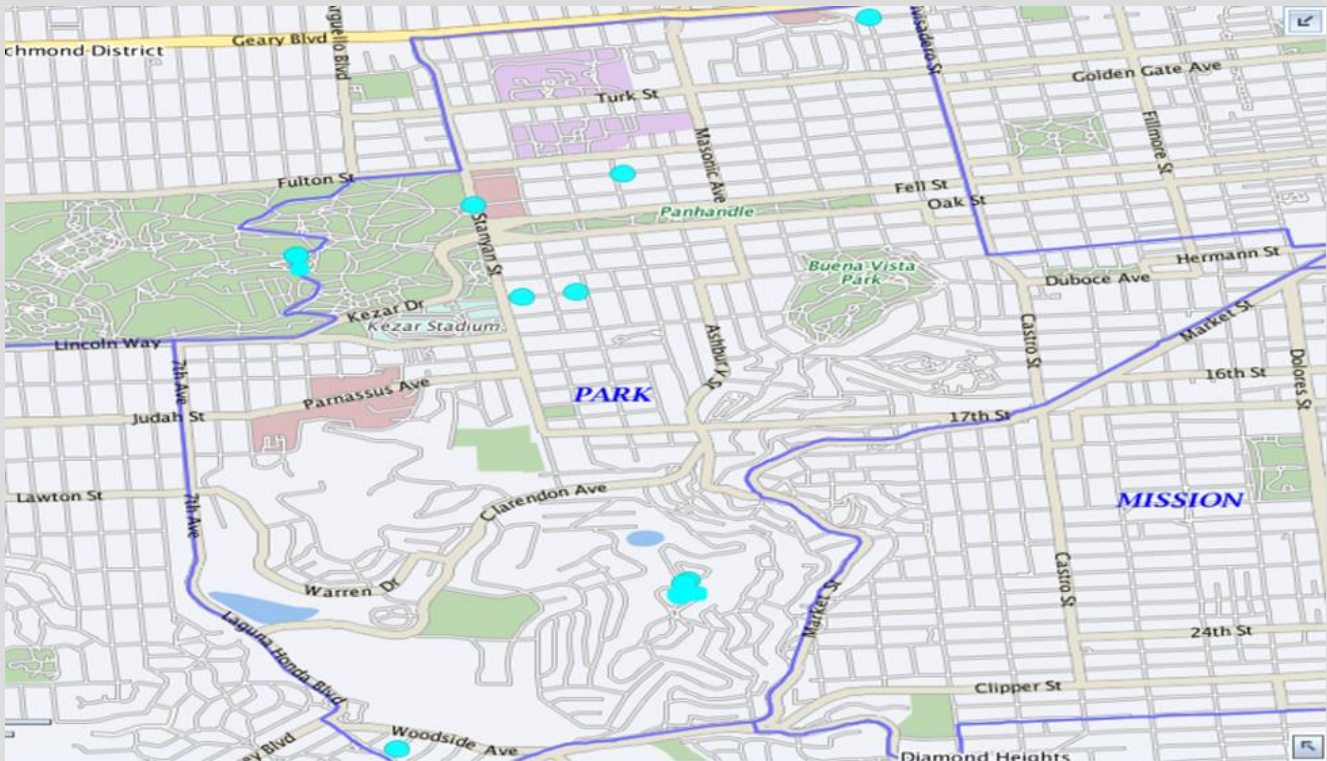
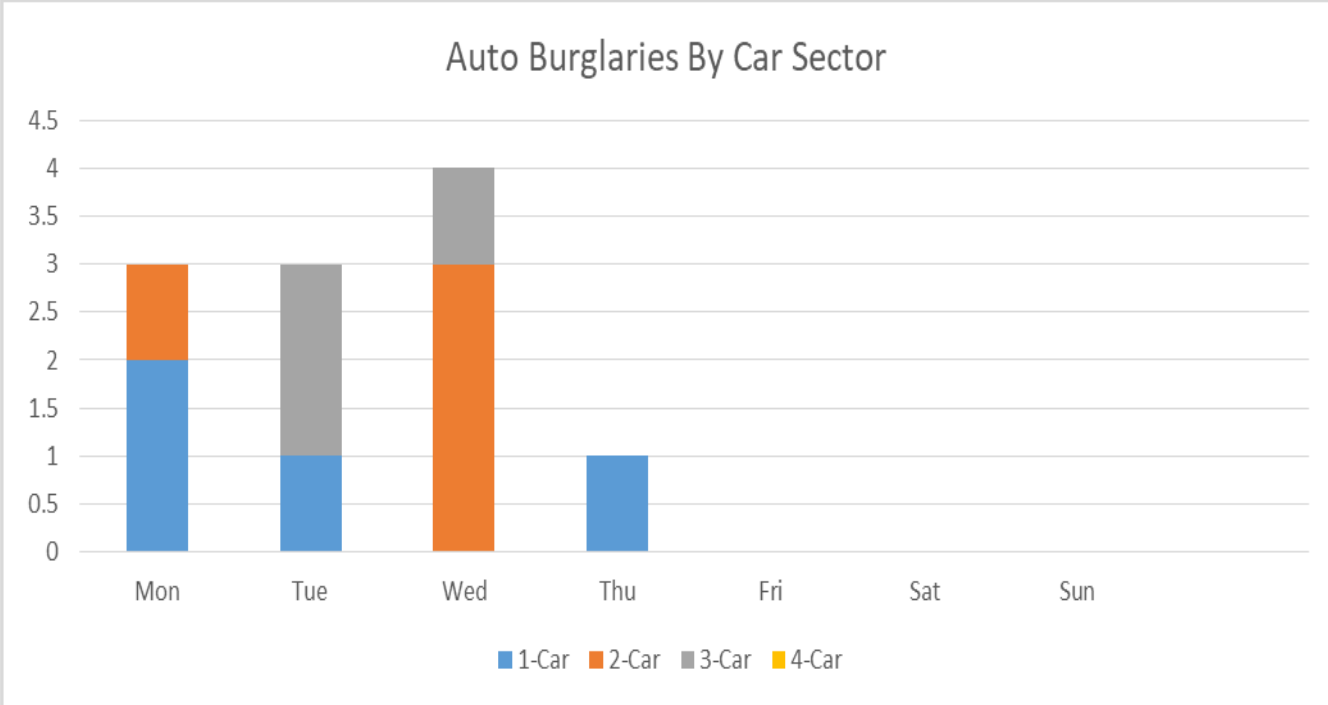

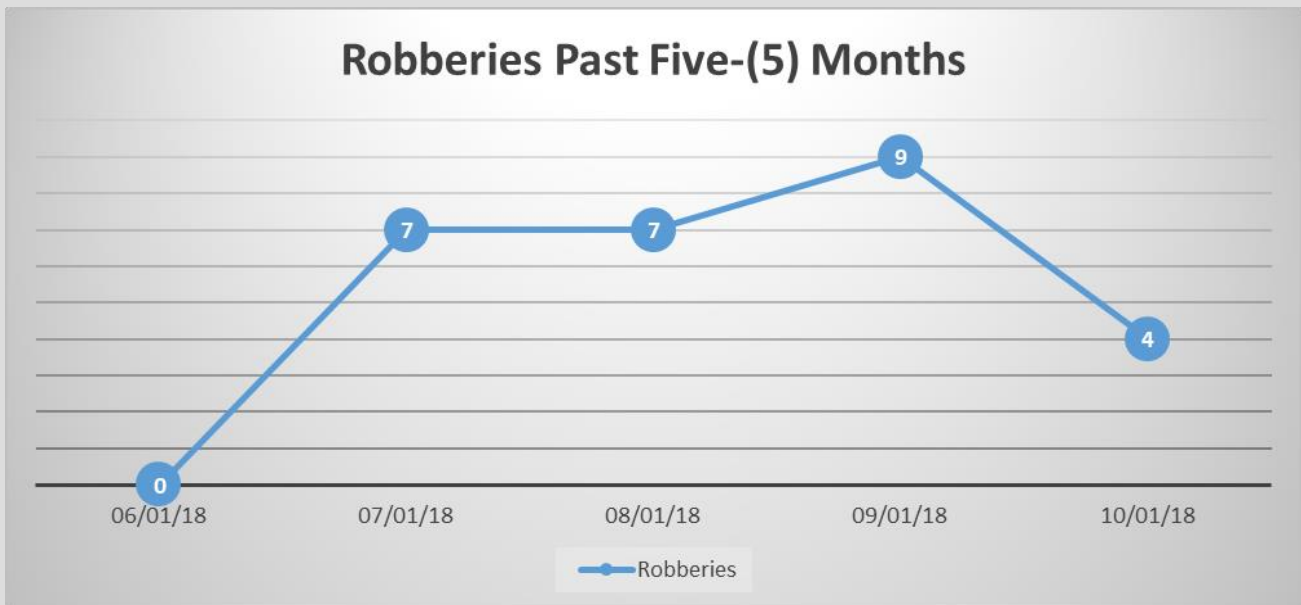

HIGH RESOLUTION

If you connect your camera to a DVR or other device, it will also need to be HD Compatible.



INFRARED (IR)

Built-in IR cut-switch that automatically enables/disables the infrared depending on the light conditions.







IN THE KNOW

The camera's viewing angle determines how much space the camera will cover. Wider angled lenses help cut down the # of cameras required for overall coverage. Video Surveillance should be utilized at your property with at least one camera facing towards the address street and camera should be registered with the District Attorney's office

Overview

Note: The following information is specific to commercial and retail establishments; however, can be applied to any location utilizing video surveillance.

Basic set up and maintenance problems can reduce the effectiveness of many systems.

- Resolution – is it good enough for facial recognition.
- Camera position – are they positioned for clear view of suspect.
- Lighting – is it adequate to capture clear images both day and night.
- Image detail – is the recorder set up for best image detail.
- Maintenance – are you maintaining your system properly so it can do its job when needed?

Set Up and Maintenance

- **Backlighting** – when sun is bright at doorway, images in front appear darker or even black. Use another light source inside to counteract back light.
- **Low Frame Rate** – saves on drive space and gives better image quality, but you may not get an image at all (now you see him; now you don't).
- **Obstructions** – displays and other objects blocking view **should be eliminated.**
- **Focus Problems** – must check system regularly to prevent.

Minimum camera resolution should be **480 horizontal lines.**

Good cameras have **faster lenses** (allows more lighting), larger maximum **aperture** opening (lets more light into the focal point of the camera) and controls image brightness (allows brighter images in dim lighting) – the more lighting, the more depth of field (greater depth of field; the more of the scene is in focus).

Focal Length – some cameras zoom in and out while others have a fixed focal length. The type of cameras used depends on what your needs are.

Transaction Areas – anything at a transaction point (cash register, toll booth, etc.), the subject's head should fill at least 15% of the total image in the frame, giving the detail you need.

Lines of Sight – lines of sight are always critical, make sure there are no obstructions.

Site Plan – the right site plan is crucial (retail store blueprint or **diagram**). Key camera spots are at transaction points (cash registers and entry/exit points) – the more cameras, the better.

You want good camera **overlap** (you want multiple chances to capture good images). Extra coverage is also needed for aisles, restrooms and other key points.

Camera Height – placement is very important, make sure it is as close to eye-level as possible. Otherwise, you might lose out to a baseball cap.

With a good site plan you can make sure you don't have any blind spots (you can toy around with camera positions, and do a test recording to see that you are getting what you want).

Interior Lighting – interior lighting can balance bright light from one direction (back lighting) by adding another light source from a different location (add a bank of lights).

Example: Artificial lighting (**inside store**) for cameras may be good in the morning, but by noon, the sun (through a doorway or window) can blow the entire frame out (add lighting to fill in for afternoon sunlight). Adding more light from a different direction balances lighting, giving better camera clarity (if sunlight is shining through large windows you can tent windows or add screens.

Exterior Lighting – if lights are on timers, you must adjust appropriate to seasonal changes (Fall/Winter: gets dark earlier. Spring/Summer: gets dark later).

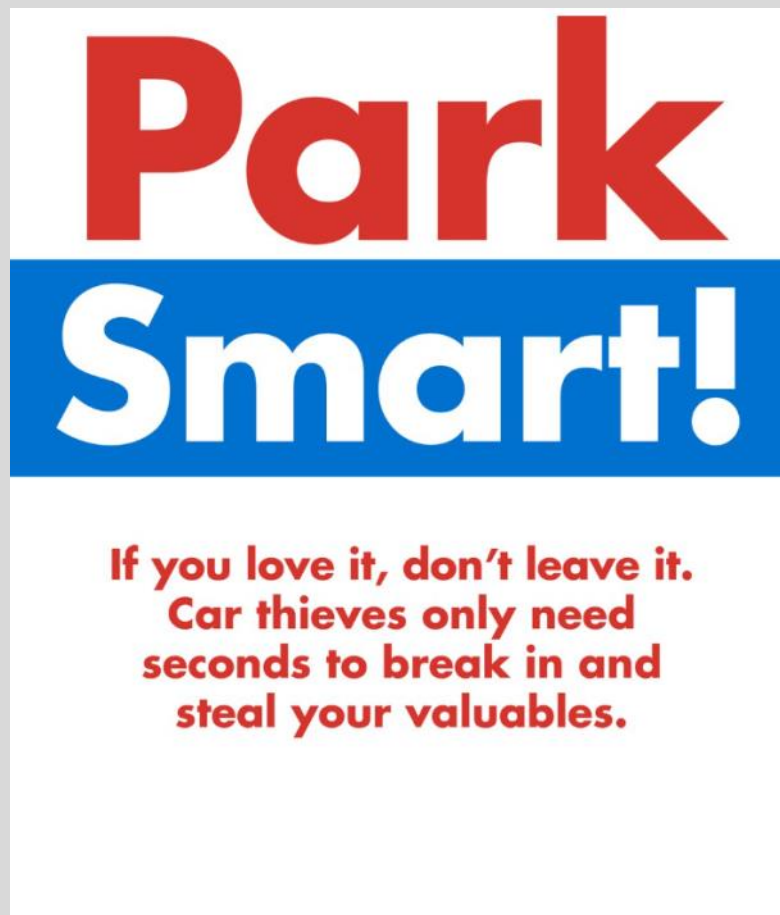

THE IMPORTANCE OF REPORTING CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

Reporting crimes is crucial in a number of ways:

- #1 It is important that incidents are documented at the time of the incident. This ensures that the victim's memory of the incident is fresh and thereby increases the chances of a more accurate and detailed report. (There are some exceptions to this i.e. when a person is a victim of a serious traumatizing experience their memory may be better later.)
- #2 It allows immediate follow up by the officers and immediate seizure of evidence that could be lost if there is a delay in reporting.
- #3 It allows immediate further follow up by our investigative team on any potential leads.
- #4 It formally records the event and even though there may not be any leads to follow at the time the incident was reported, it allows all officers in law enforcement access to the report which may be related to other incidents that have been reported or will be reported later. This is especially true of sexual assaults where there are times it involves a repeat offender. If the victims do not report the crime, law enforcement members do not know the crime happened, nor can we follow up on the case nor can we determine if it is related to other cases. It allows the suspect to continue committing crimes, victimizing others because victims have chosen not to report the crime to police.
- #5 Many times when cases are related and a suspect is taken into custody the District Attorney can add additional charges for the related cases. Of course this is contingent on additional evidence but a victim's ability to identify a suspect in a case can be enough to charge the case when there are additional cases.
- #6 In addition there are cases where an individual is tormenting a neighborhood with a variety of crimes but if community members are not willing to make a report when they see a crime committed and sign a citizen's arrest, these incidents go unreported and the criminal behavior continues. A citizen's arrest form needs to be signed when a victim or witness sees a misdemeanor crime being committed and the crime has not been committed in the officer's presence. If the victim/witness does not sign the citizen's arrest then the officer cannot arrest the individual for the crime committed.
- #7 A citizen signature is not necessary if the crime committed is a felony. The officer can immediately take the suspect into custody. This can happen at the scene when the victim calls 911 and officers respond.
- #8 Most importantly if you do not report and document the crime it is as though the crime never happened. Whatever chance we, the SFPD have of solving a crime that has been reported, we have zero chance of solving a crime that has not been reported.
- #9 Always call 911 when you see a crime in progress or anytime your or anyone's life is at risk or threatened.

Please remember we can only succeed by working together and you the members of the community are the people who most help us succeed. Thank you for all your help and I look forward to our continued collaboration.

On another but related note I want to remind all of you to activate your "Find My iPhone" app as this enables us to track phones that have been stolen. We recently have seen an uptick in cell phones being taken from individuals and on two occasions were able to take suspects into custody by tracking the phones via "Find My iPhone". Remember to have your username and password on hand to allow us to track the phone. More importantly be careful when you are in public at night using your phone especially by yourself. Never put up a fight if you are being robbed of your possessions, hand over your possessions and try to memorize what the suspect looks like, the type of vehicle involved and the direction of travel. Never risk your safety to get this information. Possessions can always be replaced you cannot.

Also I cannot over-emphasize the benefits of community members installing surveillance cameras. The footage has been used to identify many suspects in many cases. Please take the time to review the flyer that Safety Awareness for Everyone Agency (SAFE) so kindly put together for your information.

CAPTAIN BAILEY'S TOP TIPS TO PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIME

Remember crime prevention begins with you:

TIP #1 to PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIMES

I want to review with everyone how you can best avoid being a victim of a burglary. Please ensure that you are taking basic security measures i.e. locking and securing all doors and windows. Be mindful of this security even when at home do not leave a window or door open that is easily accessible from the ground floor. Always remember to keep your garage doors closed and secured. Do not leave a hide-a key. Suspects are very in tune with where people leave spare keys. Do not leave your garage door opener in your car or at least keep it out of view. Please think about installing a security camera and motion activated lights. Of course a big deterrent of burglaries is having a dog but I know not all of us can be lucky enough to have our furry friends on guard each day and night. Finally please immediately call 911 if you think you see a crime in progress or a suspicious person in your neighborhood. District residents have been doing a great job of calling 911 when they see suspicious activity or what they believe to be a crime in progress. These calls have led to numerous arrests. Our officers responded quickly and are able to take suspects into custody.

Please take the time to review the SF SAFE form on the next page (page 18).

Your safety is paramount to us here at Park Station and with your help we can prevent many crimes and solve more.

TIP #2 to PREVENT OR SOLVE CRIMES

I want to take this time to remind everyone to record the serial numbers of all your valuables i.e. bikes, tools etc. You can do this by simply taking a photo of the item and then zoom in to take a photo of the serial number. Most people have smart phones and you can easily use your phone camera to achieve this. This is

really great information for you to have in the event you are a victim of a theft. We can post the photos on flyers and record the serial numbers of your possessions so that in the event we make an arrest of an individual with stolen items your items will be easily recognizable. Officers can also identify them easily if they are being sold at any location. Bottom line having this information increases your chances of being reunited with your stolen items. It also increases the chances of these thieves being held accountable for their crimes.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
2. Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
3. Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
4. Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

1. Photograph all tools. Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
2. Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
3. Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.

Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

7 Residential Safety Tips



- 1 **Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- 2 **Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- 3 **Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.

- 4 **Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- 5 **Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- 6 **Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- 7 **Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

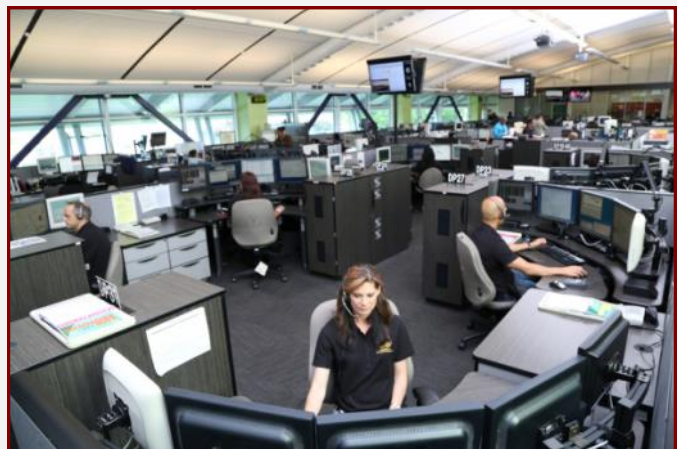
3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line **(415-553-0123)** when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**
