Community Members,

We are seeing an increase in vehicle theft and vehicle's being stripped (catalytic converters & tire rims). Invest in a vehicle alarm system or use a "club" or similar mechanical locking device. Have your local car mechanic weld on your converter or engrave your driver's license number on it. We are continuing our efforts by having officers conduct high visibility patrols in the area and special plain clothes operations to combat these crimes.

In this issue, you will find information on events that are happening in our district and around the city. This issue also contains the current crime statistics for robbery, burglary and auto burglary.

If you are reporting a crime in progress, dial 9-1-1. Also, call 9-1-1 to report fires, medical emergencies and any emergencies related to public safety.

Protect Your Vehicle Against Catalytic Converter Theft



Thieves are looking for fuel-powered vehicles manufactured after 1974 that have catalytic converters. Thieves often target taller vehicles (such as pickup trucks or SUVs) because they can easily fit under the vehicle to access the catalytic converter. The location of your car may also be a factor like regularly parking in one area for a long period of time. When possible, park in well-lit areas and close to building entrances. If you have a garage at your house, park your vehicle inside and keep the garage door close.

Have the catalytic converter welded to your car's frame, which may make it harder to steal.

Consider engraving your vehicle identification number (VIN) on the catalytic converter — this may help alert a scrap dealer that it was stolen and make it easier to identify the owner.

Calibrate your car's alarm to set off when it detects vibration.

Protect Your Vehicle from Car Theft

- Never leave your car running or the keys in the ignition when you're away from it, even for "just a minute."
- Always roll up the windows and lock the car, even if it's in front of your home.
- Never leave valuables in plain view, even if your car is locked. Put them in the trunk or at least out of sight.
- Remove portable electronic devices such as smart phones and GPS navigation systems, including suction cup or bean bag type mounts. (Even the visible appearance of a suction cup ring on the glass windshield can be an enticement to a thief to break in and look for the GPS system.)
- Park in busy, well-lighted area.
- Carry the registration and insurance card with you. Don't leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your vehicle.
- When you pay to park in a lot or garage, leave just the ignition or valet key with the attendant. Make sure no personal information is attached. Do the same when you take your car for repairs.
- Install a mechanical locking device — commonly called clubs, collars, or j-bars — that lock to the steering wheel, column, or brake to prevent the wheel from being turned more than a few degrees. Use it!
- Investigate in security systems. You may get a discount on your auto insurance.

Burglary Awareness & Prevention Tips for Construction Sites



Securing & Preventing

1. Secure all equipment and vehicles at all times.
2. Take effort to reduce the visibility of tools and equipment secured in vehicles or on job sites.
3. Make use of adequate lighting in conjunction with open chain-link fencing on the perimeter to allow for high visibility to the job site.
4. Strongly consider the use of security systems such as alarms and video surveillance. Ensure signage for such is clearly visible.

Precautionary Measures

1. Photograph all tools. Ensure photographs clearly show the associated serial number and/or distinctive markings.
2. Ensure job site keys are marked "Do Not Duplicate" and are controlled at all times.
3. Attempt to park employee vehicles within visual range of the job site.

Should a Burglary Occur

Immediately contact 911. Be prepared to provide the following information:

- a) Time of incident.
- b) Video (if available).
- c) Items taken (include make, model, description, location taken from, value, photos and serial numbers).
- d) Insurance information.
- e) Owner's information.

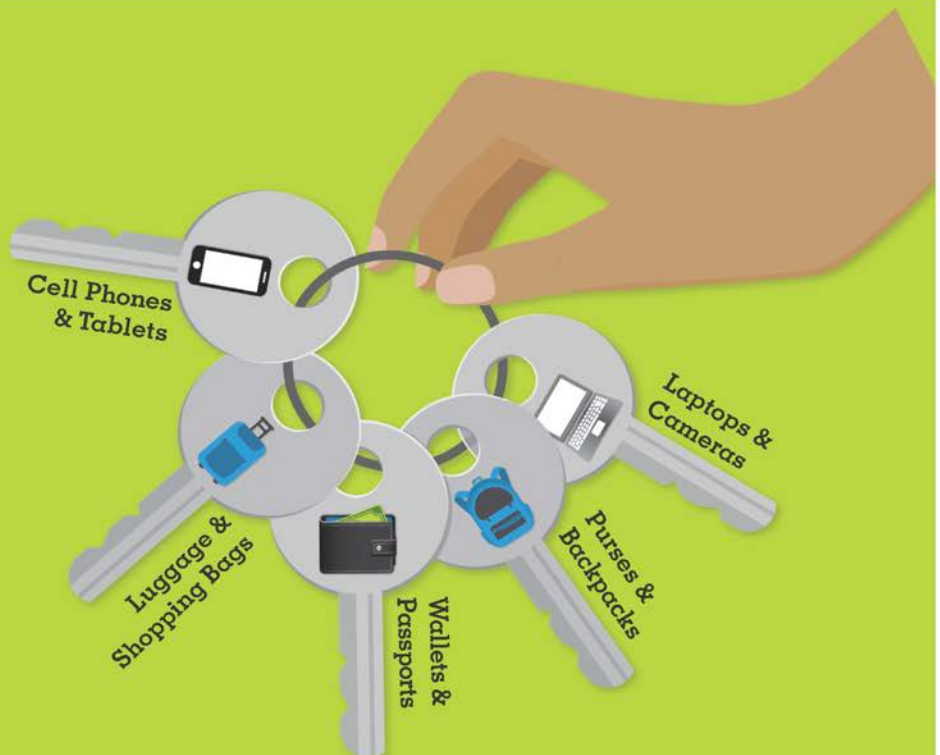

Shoplifting – Conspiracy- Arrested

2:36 pm

700 Taraval St

Officers, in plain clothes, were on patrol in the area when they observed a vehicle without a license plate back into a store's parking spot. Two suspects then exited the vehicle and entered the store with an empty bag. Shortly afterwards, the two suspects ran out of the store with their bag filled with multiple items. The officers detained the suspects and after further investigation, it was revealed that the suspects had stolen approximately \$600.00 in items from the store. **The suspects were arrested.**

Shoplifting – Possession of Stolen Property – Cited

Officers responded to the report of a shoplifter. The witness stated that the suspect, who had a previous history of shoplifting at the store, was told to leave but the suspect refused. The suspect proceeded to walk down one aisle of the store and placed multiple items into a bag before leaving and not paying for any of the items. The officers successfully located and detained the suspect. A search also located the items that the suspect had stolen. **The suspect was cited.**

Officers responded to a report of a trespasser. The officers made contact with the suspect, who was inside the victim's vehicle. The suspect stated that he had found the doors unlocked and went inside the vehicle to sleep. **The suspect was cited.**

Stolen Vehicle

Officers responded to a report of an argument between a tow truck driver and the driver of a vehicle. Responding officers arrived at the location and made contact with both parties. The witness, the tow truck driver, stated that he had been called out because the suspect's vehicle had been parked illegally. While the witness was in the process of attaching the vehicle to the tow truck, the suspect approached him. The witness agreed to not tow the suspect's vehicle but stated that the suspect needed to pay the fee for the tow truck's arrival. The suspect responded angrily and a call was made to the police. A computer search of the vehicle revealed that the vehicle was a rental and that it had been stolen from San Mateo County. The suspect stated that the vehicle was not stolen and that it was a probably a billing error. After further investigation, **the suspect was arrested.**

The victim, a delivery person, reported that he had been walking on Irving Street when he felt something hit him three times. The victim stated that someone had thrown an object at him, which he thinks was a hard boiled egg.

Driving While Under the Influence – Vehicle Violation – Arrested

Officers responded to a report of a vehicle which had stopped in the middle of the street with the engine still running and a driver that had passed out. Responding officers located the vehicle and attempted to make contact with the driver by knocking on the vehicle's window. The driver woke up but started the vehicle slowly despite the officers yelling at the driver to stop. When the driver eventually stopped the vehicle, the officers observed that he was intoxicated. After failing several tests, **the driver was arrested.**

Officers responded to a report of an assault. The victim, a store employee, reported that three suspects had entered the store and one of them attempted to make a purchase. However, the suspect presented a credit card and ID that did not match the suspect and the transaction was refused. The victim then asked the suspects to leave the store and the victim blocked the doorway when the suspects attempted to re enter the store. One suspect responded angrily and punched the victim in the face while a second suspect hit the victim with his skateboard. The victim was then pepper sprayed by the suspects before they walked away from the store.

Officers were on patrol when they observed a vehicle, without a front license plate and a shattered back door, that was parallel parked next to a building. A computer check on the vehicle revealed that it had been stolen. While waiting for additional units, the suspect ran out of the building and attempted to hide under nearby bushes. The officers detained him and a search revealed methamphetamine in the suspect's pocket. A search of the vehicle revealed multiple burglary tools. After further investigation, **the suspect was arrested.**

Driving while under the Influence – Traffic Violation – Arrested

Officers responded to a report of a driver who had stopped his vehicle in the middle of traffic. SFFD medics arrived and removed the driver, who was passed out, from his vehicle. Responding officers made contact with the driver, who appeared to be intoxicated, and a search revealed a can of beer on the back floor board of the vehicle. After failing multiple tests, **the driver was arrested.**

Assault

2200 Taraval St

Officers responded to a report of a person that had been stabbed. The witness reported that the victim had walked into the pet hospital and claimed that he had been stabbed. The victim, who appeared to be slightly intoxicated, stated that he had been drinking all night and had fallen asleep while on the bus from the Castro area. The victim awoke when he felt a pain on his shoulder and discovered that there was blood on his shirt. The victim then entered the pet hospital in an attempt to get help.

Officers responded to a report of a battery. The victim, a bus driver, reported that he was loading passengers when the bus became too full. The victim attempted to close the door but the suspect forced open the door and got on to the bus. The suspect then spat at the victim before exiting the bus.

Officers responded to a report of three vehicles on fire, which was later extinguished by SFFD. Responding officers made contact with each of the victims but they did not know why their vehicles caught on fire. The incident is currently being investigated by the SFFD arson task force.

Officers responded to a report of a battery. The victim reported that she was cooking when the suspect walked up to her and attempted to talk to her but the victim told the suspect not to talk to her. The victim stated that the suspect then pushed her and the victim wanted the suspect arrested. The suspect responded that he had wanted to light some incense and went to the kitchen but there wasn't anybody in there. Shortly afterwards, the victim showed up and started yelling at him. After further investigation, **the suspect was cited.**

Officers responded to a report of gun shots heard in the area. A witness reported that two victims were crossing the street when the suspect started shooting at their direction. The suspect then ran into a vehicle which immediately drove away. The witness did not have further information regarding the incident. Responding officers searched the area and located the fired casings. The victims did not call for assistance and there were no gunshot injuries reported.

Officers were on patrol in the area when they observed a vehicle with expired registration. The officers made contact with the occupants of the vehicle and were told that one of the occupants was on probation. A computer check revealed an arrest warrant on another of the vehicle's occupants. **She was arrested.**

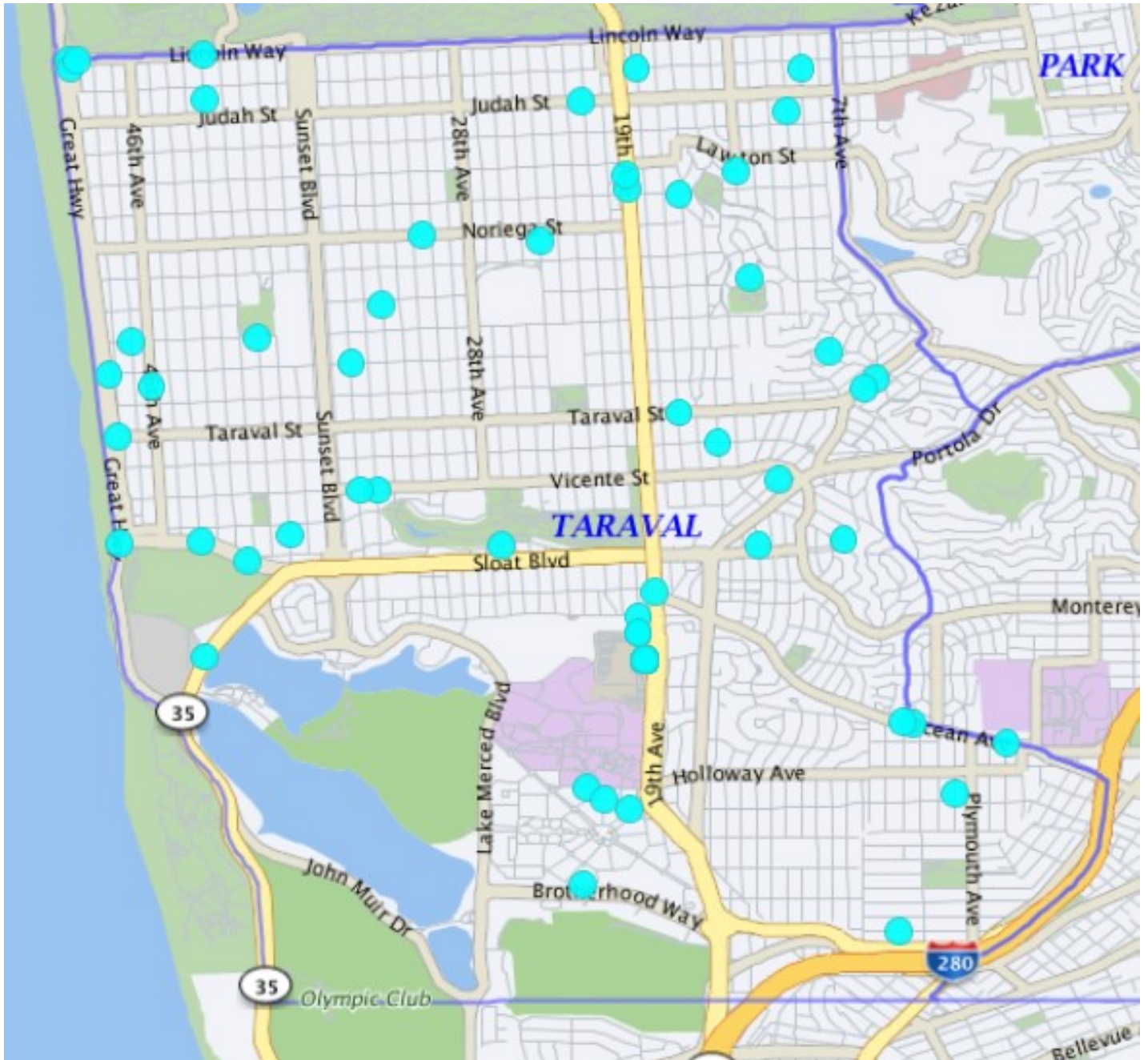

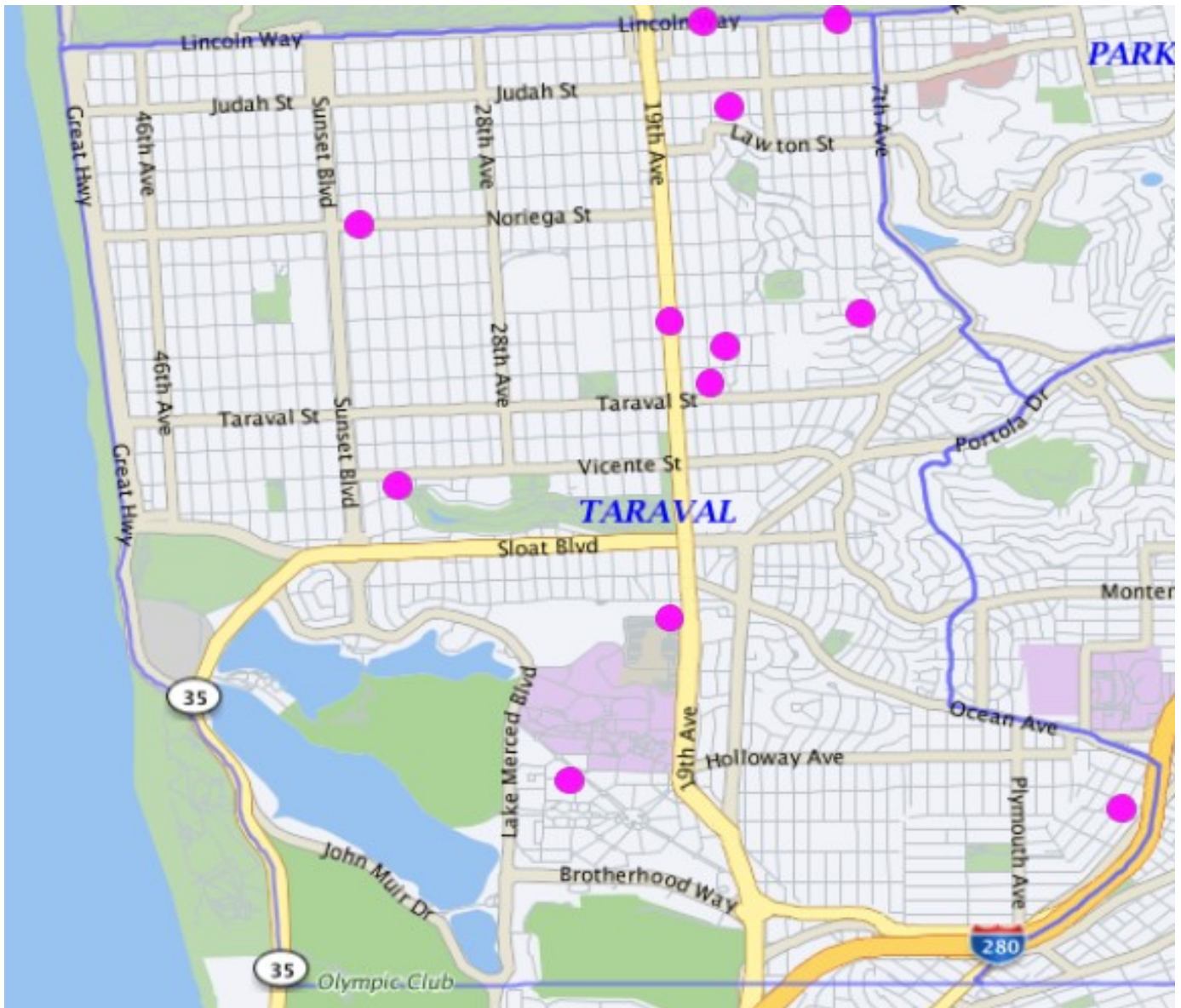

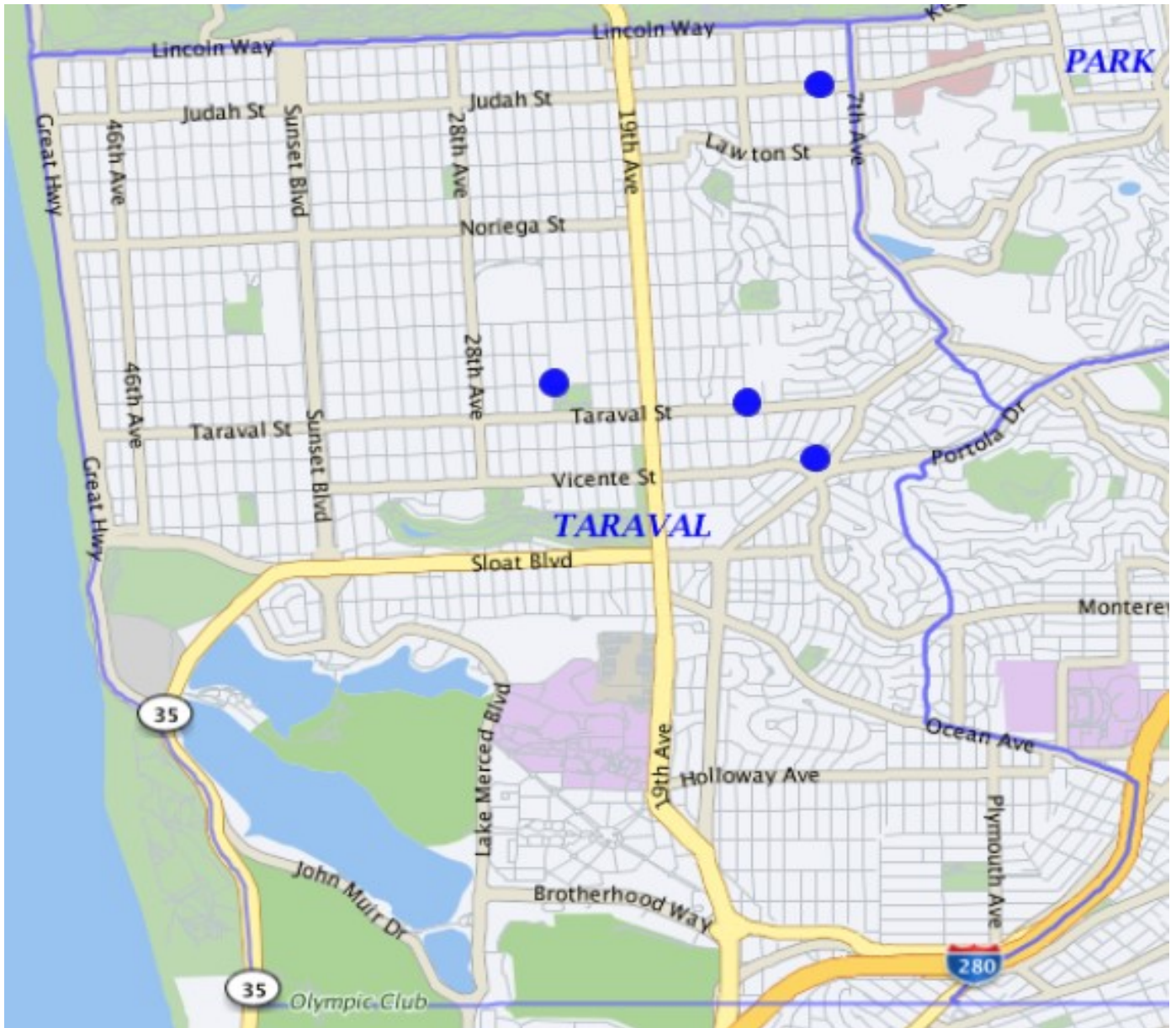

Beware of Scams

Fake Check Scams

Consumers paid with phony checks for work or for items they're trying to sell, instructed to wire money back to buyer

Prizes/Sweepstakes/Free Gifts

Requests for payment to claim fictitious prizes, lottery winnings, or gifts

Recovery/Refund Companies

Scammers contact victims and claim the consumer owes money on a fictitious debt or to help recover money lost in a previous scam

Advance Fee Loans, Credit Arrangers

False promises of business or personal loans, even if credit is bad, for a fee upfront

Phishing/Spoofing

Emails pretending to be from a well-known source ask consumers to enter or confirm personal information

Computers: Equipment and Software

Scammers claim to offer "technical support" for computer problems and charge a fee to fix a nonexistent problem

Scholarships/Grants

For a fee, a "search company" offers to conduct customized search for scholarships or grants for students. Scammers take money and run or provide a worthless list

Friendship & Sweetheart Swindles

Con artist nurtures an online relationship, builds trust, and convinces victim to send money

Charitable Solicitations

Scammers contact victims claiming to represent non-existent charities (or real charities they don't actually work for) and ask for donations.



Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.
- Please dial 911 to report crimes in progress, suspicious activity or for life threatening emergencies. If it is not an emergency, dial (415) 553-0123.

Definition of Community Policing

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

Homeless Outreach and Outreach to Drug Users:

Taraval Station has two officers that coordinate with city agencies to provide outreach and assistance to rehabilitate those who are dependent on illegal drugs and outreach to homeless individuals to connect them with resources and support.

Foot Patrols:

Taraval Station has 3 foot beat locations. These officers are assigned to Irving St, West Portal Ave and Ocean Ave.

Monthly Police Community Relations Meetings:

Community Meetings are going to be held continuously. Officers and sergeants also attend meetings with merchants groups, business groups, development authorities and others. Concerns are voiced and addressed through problem solving. These meeting will be on the third Tuesday of each month.

Email Updates:

Taraval Station will send out newsletter updates to residents in the District that alerts residents of crime trends, upcoming community events, crime prevention tips, and information on how to contact officers at the District Station.

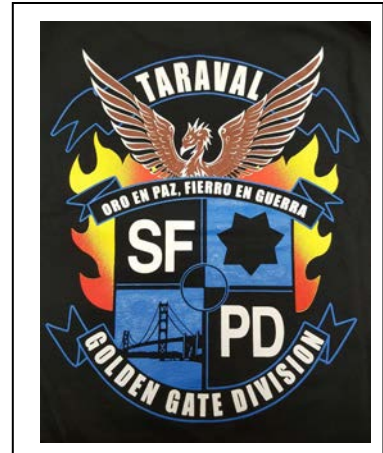
