## Definition of Suspicious Activity

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- ◆ An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- ◆ An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- ◆ An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities.

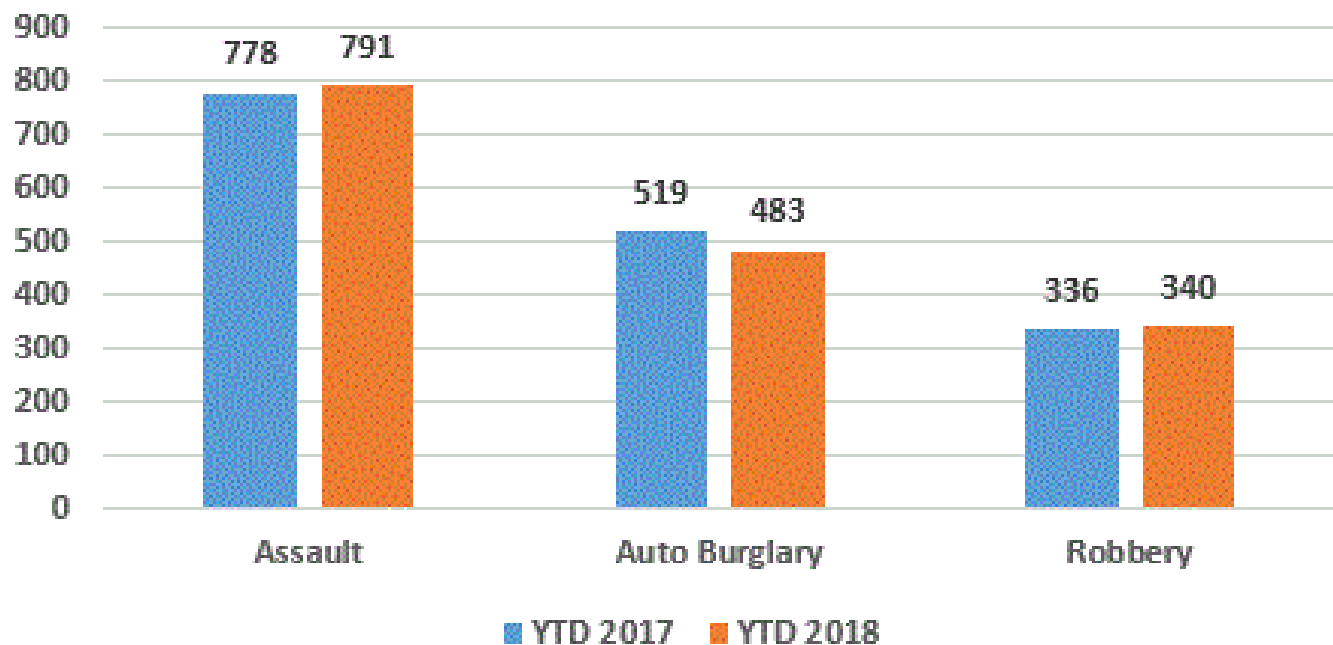


## Top Arrests

<p><b>08/10/2018</b> <b>709 Larkin St</b></p>	<p><b>Auto Boost Arrest</b></p> <p>Booked: N/W 459 PC –2nd Degree, N/W 182 PC(a)(1) PC, 3056 PC, 148(a)(1) PC</p> <p>Tenderloin patrol units were in the area of Larkin Street when they on-viewed an auto boost in progress. The officers saw the suspect smash the window of a parked vehicle and remove items from inside.</p> <p>As they approached to detain the suspect, he ran to a waiting vehicle. The suspects vehicle took off at a high rate of speed and the officers did not initiate a pursuit.</p> <p>Passersby pointed in the direction of the suspect vehicle and the units continued to investigate. The officers found the suspect vehicle several blocks away with the engine still running.</p> <p>They also observed the suspect attempting to discard his clothing under another parked vehicle. The suspect was placed under arrest.</p>

<p><b>08/17/2018</b> <b>8th St / Market St</b></p>	<p><b>Robbery, w Force Arrest</b></p> <p>Booked: N/W 211 PC</p> <p>The victim was standing on the corner of 8th St and Market Street when she felt a tug on her backpack. Shen noticed the suspect pulling on her bag, which forced her to ground. As the suspect continued to take the bag, the victim held on and screamed for help.</p> <p>The suspect was able to pull the bag from the victim and run downstairs in the BART station. Tenderloin Foot Beat officers were in the area and heard the victim screaming for help. They saw the victim lying on the ground and pointing toward the BART stairwell.</p> <p>The officers gave chase and detained the suspect. The victim recovered her stolen bag and positively identified the suspect. The suspect was placed under arrest.</p>

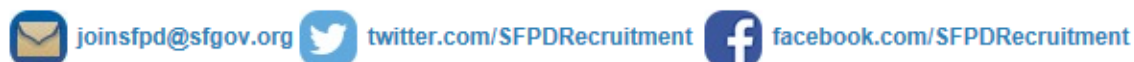
