Featured member of the Month **Officer Albert Tien**



Ofc. Albert Tien was born and raised in Methuen, Massachusetts. He traveled extensively as an Infantry Service member of the United States Marine Corps., from Camp Pendleton to Indonesia, Sana'a, Yemen, Bucharest, and Romania. After his service, he moved to San Francisco and entered the Police Academy in 2017. He trained at Mission Station, completed his probationary year at Richmond Station, and now is at his permanent home: Ingleside. He is married and a father of one son (a second child is on the way!).

Currently, Ofc. Tien is assigned to the day shift where he is proactively addressing all of the traffic “hot spot” locations in the District. He can be seen conducting high visibility enforcement and traffic calming on the Mission, Alemany, Cortland, Geneva, Dolores, San Jose, Diamond Heights, Silver, Bayshore, and other high volume corridors, but also on the small streets that are overcrowded and dangerous. SF Native Rose Ann Harris was born at San Francisco General Hospital and raised in the Mission District. Rose attended St. Anthony's, Le Conte, the Lytton School, and Mission High School. After living in Visitacion Valley, she moved to the Excelsior in 1989 where she now resides.

Rose is an exemplary community member and volunteer. Rose volunteers for dozens of groups that support neighborhood connection and wellness, including the Excelsior District Improvement Association, the Outer Mission Merchants and Residents Association, McLaren Park Collaborative, the Excelsior Action Group, the Wildlife Conservation Network, Neighborhood Emergency Response Team, the District 11 Council, and others. A victim walked into Ingleside Station to report that he was robbed. Ingleside Officers McCall and Lozano responded to the call of a possible strong arm robbery. Multiple officers responded to assist, and ended up detaining a suspect who tried to use Muni as an escape method. The elderly victim told officers that he was walking on Mission Street when the suspect approached from behind, and stole the victim's wallet from his back pocket. Attempted Robbery

Ingleside Officers Quinlan and Siracusa responded to the report of a battery, but quickly determined it to be an attempted robbery. The victim was washing his car in front of his house when three suspects in a passing vehicle stopped, and exited. The three suspects surrounded the victim, and without being provoked, began to punch him repeatedly. The suspects attempted to grab the victim's wallet, but were unsuccessful in their attempt. As quick as the assault began, it ended, with all three suspects retreating to the getaway vehicle, and fleeing the scene. The victim was treated at the scene by paramedics for a cut lip. Robbery

Mission officers were flagged down at 24th and Mission Streets by the victim of a robbery that occurred in the Ingleside near Glen Park Bart. The victim advised officers that he was waiting for an Uber when he was approached by three suspects. The suspects told the victim to give up his property. The victim decided to make a stand and a fight broke out between him and the suspects. During the fight the victim lost his cellphone, which one of the suspects took. As the victim broke free and started to run away, one of the suspects produced a firearm and shot off a round. Possession of Paraphernalia

Officers Peralta and Aguirre were leaving the police station heading out to patrol the area when several feet away they were flagged down at Balboa Park by a concerned parent that there was a suspicious person possibly doing drugs inside the public restroom. The officers went into the restroom to investigate and found a homeless female washing her hair in the sink. Next to her the officers noticed a glass pipe used to ingest methamphetamines. As the officers escorted her out of the bathroom, she began running away in an effort to get away. She didn't get far as Officers Peralta and Aguirre were right behind her and were able to detain her. The female subject was ultimately cited for loitering near a public restroom and for possession of paraphernalia. Report Number #190799804.

Stolen Vehicle

Officers Anderson and Billings were patrolling the area of Moscow and Persia when they spotted a vehicle cross their path headed in the opposite direction. The officers conducted a computer inquiry on the rear license plate which showed the vehicle had been reported stolen from San Francisco days prior. The officers immediately followed the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop. Fortunately, the two occupants inside the stolen vehicle pulled over. 2:02pm 300 Blk Justin / Unit Blk Genebern Trespassing
 Officer Watts and Aguirre responded to the 300 block of Justin Drive regarding a trespassing call. The homeowner was home with her newborn when she received an alert notification on her NEST camera informing her that there was someone in the backyard. The homeowner showed the video to the officers and saw that the suspect had entered her backyard and left soon after. Moments later, a second call came in regarding a trespasser on the unit block of Genebern Way. Several officers including Officers Lee, Burke, Downs, Barajas, Foxworth and Espinoza responded and caught the suspect as he was walking out of a backyard on the unit block of Geneburn Way. This second homeowner said she heard a noise and when she to check she came face to face with the suspect who was standing on her back porch holding a brick. She immediately went to call the police. Officer Watts and Aguirre determined that this same suspect was the same suspect that was caught on camera prowling around on Justin Drive.  A victim walking home from the Balboa Park BART Station fell victim to a robbery. She informed Officers Billings and Wong that when she stopped to wait for the traffic light to turn green, a suspect approached her from behind and put her in a bear hug and tried to take her Apple 11 cell phone. The victim struggled but the suspect overpowered her and ultimately took her phone and ran. The victim chased the suspect but he ran to a waiting vehicle which fled. (ALERT)



Are you someone who is interested in disaster preparedness and wants to help out your community while working hand in hand with Law Enforcement? If so, then the ALERT program is for you!



What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The ALERT program trains members of the public to assist Law Enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster, and in other identified non-disaster activities. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrols of business and residential areas, reporting criminal activity etc. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and must live, work, or attend school in San Francisco.

The ALERT program is modeled after, and works in partnership with, the San Francisco Fire Department Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT) program.

Ways To Become An ALERT volunteer:

1. Graduate the SFPD NERT course (<http://sf-fire.org/neighborhood-emergency-response-team-nert>), or,
2. Graduate the SFPD Community Police Academy course (<https://sanfranciscopolice.org/community-police-academy>)
3. Pass a basic DOJ/FBI Background check.
4. Sign up for the next 8 hour ALERT new volunteer training class.

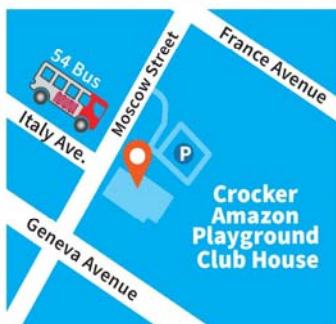

Distracted Driving

Distracted driving is anything that takes your eyes or mind off the road. In the smartphone age, distracted driving is the most dangerous when drivers are using their cell phone behind the wheel.

Whether it is talking, emailing, texting, plugging in directions, using an app or scrolling through social media feeds, using a cell phone is not only dangerous, but also illegal.

In 2017, 3,166 people were killed in distracted driving related crashes across the country, or nearly 10 percent of all traffic deaths.

Using a phone to dial, talk or text triples the risk of a driver getting into a crash. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for an average of 5 seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of a football field with your eyes closed.

Other serious driver distractions such as eating, grooming, reaching for objects on the floor, changing clothes or talking with passengers are just as dangerous. The safest thing drivers can do is put down the phone, focus on the road and just drive.





Distracted Driving Prevention


- ✓ Never Text and Drive
- ✓ Silence your phone before you drive
- ✓ Pull over to safe parking spot to make a call
- ✓ Don't text or call someone you know is driving




Cell Phone Law

 Holding a phone while driving is illegal. Any electronic device must be used in a hands-free manner, such as speaker or voice commands. The law applies when at a stop sign or signal.

 To use a phone while driving, it must be mounted on the dashboard, windshield (seven-inch square in lower right corner or five-inch square in lower left corner), or center console.

 When the phone is mounted, drivers can swipe or tap the screen once to activate or deactivate a feature. It is illegal to swipe multiple times, enter information or text.

 A first offense ticket is \$162, with additional offenses costing even more.

 You may use your phone while holding it for true emergencies, like calling 911.
