Hello Richmond District Residents and Merchants,

Pedestrians can help avoid being the victim of a distracted driver by practicing these safety tips:

- Make eye contact with drivers before walking into the street in front of their vehicles,
- Keep your eyes up and your phone down,
- Cross in a crosswalk whenever possible.

PICKPOCKETS

Remember the three "C's": CROWD, COVER, and CONTACT. Pickpockets occur under crowded conditions. The thief will use the cover of a pressing crowd to get next to the victim and make the physical contact necessary for the theft. A pickpocket always does two things: They look down because they are looking for a "pocket" (purse) to pick. They use an object (jacket, newspaper, garment bag) to conceal the pocket or purse and then remove the wallet.

GENERAL TIPS

- When boarding public transportation, be aware of pushing and jostling.
- If you see a pick pocketing incident, report it to the bus driver.
- Watch out for strangers who strike up a conversation. This may be a trick to distract you.
- When shopping, don't leave wallets or purses in dressing rooms, or on top of counters.
- Never carry more money or credit cards than you will need that day.
- Be careful about displaying large sums of money in public.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR WALLET

- Carry your wallet in your inside jacket pocket, not in your back pocket.
- If you are not wearing a jacket, place your wallet in a pocket which can be buttoned.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR PURSE

- If you carry a shoulder bag, place your arm around the outside of the bag. Make sure the bag is in front of you, not behind your back.
- When carrying an armload of packages, keep your purse between your body and the packages.
- If you put your wallet in a jacket pocket, make sure it is zipped up or if a loose pocket, use a safety pin on the inside of the garment to secure it.
- Keep purse and keys separated.
- Place your purse on your lap when seated in public places (buses, BART, theaters, etc.). Do not put your purse under the chair.
- When you are in restaurants, never hang your purse on the back of a chair.

HOW TO PROTECT YOUR BACKPACK

- When riding public transportation, wear your backpack in front of you. This prevents the thief
 from getting into your backpack. Also, you are not pushed by passengers trying to get to the
 back of the bus because your backpack is in the way.
- Do not store valuables such as wallets and cell phones in the front pockets of your backpack.

IF YOU ARE VICTIM

- Make a police report.
- Notify the police and your credit card companies.
- Don't be fooled by a call saying that your credit cards have been found and are being mailed back to you. Often this is done by the thief to prevent you from reporting the loss and allows the thief more time to use your credit cards.
- Only by reporting the theft can the police help.

RICHMOND STATION VISION AND VALUES

Richmond Station supports the Department's Community Policing Vision and Values and is committed to creating a safe, healthy, and vibrant community. Our spirit is guided by a guardian mindset, and we recognize that our role as protectors is rooted in empathy, understanding, and mutual respect.

Community policing, or community-oriented policing, is a strategy of policing that focuses on police building ties and working closely with members of the communities. Richmond Station uses the following methods to engage with the community:

- Homeless Outreach: Officers coordinate with multiple city agencies to provide assistance and offer city services. Officers address quality of life issues and find programs for willing individuals.
- Foot Patrol: Richmond Station has dedicated foot patrols on Clement Street, Geary Blvd, and Laurel Village/Sacramento Street corridors.
- Community Meetings: Community Meetings are held once a month for the public and residents of the Richmond District to attend. People can voice their questions or concerns about issues in the Richmond District.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW THIS MONTH

I think I have been a victim of a scam! What do I do?

Financial crimes include phone scams, counterfeit money, identity theft, and embezzlement. Scammers often target the elderly, low-income people, and business owners. In some cases, scammers have posed as IRS, courts, or utility representatives to cheat victims out of their money. In all of these cases, your first step is making a police report in person at your local district station or online here. Next, preserve what evidence you may have. Evidence includes eyewitness accounts and/or documents. Useful documents include account statements, receipts and canceled checks. Finally, contact all your banking services and credit bureaus to notify them of the incident, as you may need to close your account or put ahold on your credit. 





Botanical Gardens in Golden Gate Park

Victims were in Golden Gate Park at the Botanical Gardens. They were sitting on a bench when they heard glass breaking then noticed fresh broken glass next to their rental vehicle. The victims approached the drivers side of their rental vehicle where they met the suspect who was reaching into the broken window and grabbing their bags. As the victims approached, the suspect pulled his jacket to the side and exposed a silver handgun in his waistband. First victim backed away to sidewalk in fear. Second victim approached the suspect and tried to grab their bags back. The suspect then told the victim "I have a gun" and the victim backed away in fear. The suspect got back in getaway vehicle and drove away. Case assigned to SFPD Robbery Unit who is conducting the follow up investigation.

ROBBERY WITH GUN, CHILD — INFLICTING PHYSICAL PAIN or MENTAL SUFFERING,

2400 block Lake

A mother, parked her car in her driveway and then was taking her child, 6-year-old, out of the car seat. The suspect approached her while pointing a firearm in her face and said, "Give me your wallet right now. You want me to do this in front of your kids. I will shoot you." Fearing for their life and safety, the mother told the suspect she did not have a wallet on her. The suspect then grabbed and stole the mother's backpack type diaper bag that contained her iPhone and other valuables. The suspect got into a waiting getaway car being driven by a second suspect and they fled. Richmond Officers helped the mother quickly track her iPhone and provided vital details and immediate live tracking updates to dispatch, who then broadcast those details City-Wide.

Northern & Tenderloin Officers spotted the suspect vehicle and attempted a traffic stop. Both suspects choose to disregard the officers orders and jumped out of the getaway vehicle and run away. A foot pursuit initiated and the robber who threatened the mother and child was caught and detained while the unknown driver got away. Evidence connecting the detained suspect to the crime along with a firearm were recovered from scenes. An investigation was begun and the suspect was arrested and his was vehicle towed. The suspect was using two different names. One name revealed no record but his real name revealed he was on active parole for a violent offense. California Department of Corrections confirmed the suspects identification. SF DA Jenkins is moving forward with prosecution on these violent crimes.

The San Francisco Police Department would like to remind the public to stay safe and help protect yourself from vehicle and home burglaries. Below are some simple steps you can take to help prevent your home or vehicle from being burglarized.

- Do not leave valuables in your vehicle
- Removie garage door opener from your vehicle if parked outside your garage
- Lock the door from your garage leading inside your home
- "Block the cord" garage door openers have an emergency release cord that, when pulled, disconnects the door from the mechanism thereby making it easy for burglars to enter your garage

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING...

Suspicious activity is any observed AND articulable behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or is about to be committed. Articulable means you are capable of expressing, explaining, or justifying to our dispatchers and/or officers that you believe a person violated a law or regulation. Race, gender, religion, socio-economic status, style of dress, choice of hairstyle, etc. should NEVER be a factor in classifying someone as suspicious. Some examples of suspicious activity:

- Individual(s) peering into vehicles to try and locate any valuables left unattended.
- Individual(s) trying door handles to vehicles and/or residences to gain access.
- Individual(s) following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.

While this isn't an exhaustive list, nor absolute confirmation of a crime, we hope these examples will assist you should you ever need to call the police.

What is the SFPAL? What is the Law Enforcement Cadet Program?

Fifty-five years ago, two policemen decided they wanted to do something about "the growing juvenile delinquency problem" in San Francisco. They courageously took out personal loans and started what has grown into the San Francisco Police Activities League. From this meager beginning and a handful of kids, SFPAL has grown to serve thousands of San Francisco youth – reaching every San Francisco neighborhood and block over the past half-century. Today, almost 1,200 kids participate in PAL healthy activities with the help of over 100 civilian and police volunteers every year.

The SFPAL Law Enforcement Cadet Program is a collaborative effort of SFPAL and the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD). The PAL Cadet Program has provided opportunities for growth, leadership, and career experiences for thousands of San Francisco youth — including many who have chosen to pursue law enforcement or public service careers. SFPAL Cadets receive training modeled after the basic training academy for new police recruits and are taught by SFPD Police Academy training staff. The program is designed to provide hands-on job skills training and leadership development through proper preparation and training.



CRIME DEFINITIONS

- HOMICIDE: Murder and non-negligent manslaughter is the willful killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths are excluded. Manslaughter by negligence is the killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities are not included in the category of manslaughter my negligence.
- RAPE: Penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body party or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. Attempts or assaults to commit rape are also included; however, statutory rape and incense are excluded.
- ROBBERY: The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
- AGGRAVATED ASSAULT: An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.
- BURGLARY: The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempted forcibly entry is included.
- LARCENY (aka THEFT): The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, shoplifting, pickpocketing, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.
- MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT: The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on land surface and not on rails. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.
- ARSON: Any willful or malicious burning or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.



PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS







ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER

If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.





FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

HOW DO I ADD INFORMATION TO A COMPLETED POLICE REPORT?

There are two ways to add information to a completed SFPD Police Incident Report:

- 1. In Person— You may go to any police station in San Francisco and request to complete a Supplemental Report. Please be prepared to provide your original case number.
- 2. Online Using our online portal is the most convenient way to document additional property loss to the initial report, additional details that may assist the investigation, and/or additional details to describe stolen property, such as a serial number. You can access the online portal here: SFPD Online Reporting System.

HOW DO I REQUEST A COPY OF MY POLICE INCIDENT REPORT?

There are three ways to obtain a copy of your SFPD Police Incident Report:

- 1. In Person You may request a copy in person ONLY at SFPD Police Headquarters Crime Information Services Unit at 1245 Third Street during normal business hours (Monday Friday, 8 am-5 pm, and Closed on Holidays). Reports are NOT available through the district stations.
- 2. In the Mail Download the Request for Incident Report Form and mail it to the address listed on the form.
- 3. Online Using our new online portal is the most secure and convenient way to request and receive incident reports from the San Francisco Police Department. Visit the portal here: Request a Police Incident Report Copy
