Captain's Message

Hello Park District Residents,

On Thursday January 25th, we had Park Station's Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB) and Station Community Meeting. Even though it was the night before the Memphis videos were released, I had a pretty good idea of what the fact pattern was and what the videos were likely to show. The question on everyone's mind was: "could this happen here at SFPD?" I gave a clear answer: while we are all human beings and everything that is human—good, bad, and evil—rests within us and could theoretically be exposed under the right circumstances, for about 100 reasons including who SFPD is, our culture, our experience, our expertise, our growth over the past 10 years of policy and procedural changes, how we empower leadership from the bottom-up on the organizational chart, and our excellent Critical Mindset Coordinated Response (CMCR) and Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, what happened in Memphis is really, really not going to happen here.

I showed two SFPD Training videos to attendees on pre-incident planning and foot pursuits that SFPD members all learned in CMCR, team CIT, and other classes/trainings. While in Memphis there was no leadership, no teamwork, no plan, no restraint, no emotional intelligence, and no heart, SFPD at its best—and consistently over time—does things better, differently, and courageously. Frame by frame I was able to prove to our community members that SFPD not only acts with integrity and character as a whole, but that we strive to maximize discretionary time, that we meet people with a calm resolve (not the unjustified screaming of expletives), that we have plans to deal with the many phases of foot pursuits, that we have the courage to intervene, and that we immediately render aid. Even without these training videos, we intuitively know that we are better than we were 5 to 10 years ago.

CAPTAIN'S MESSAGE (CONTINUED)

Just having someone on an "A" priority run of an armed person in crisis, elicits a frontline leader to say on the radio: "time, distance, formulate a plan." This is an adrenaline pattern-interrupt and an external reminder that we are better and more effective when we manage our emotions, engage the thinking part of our brain while quieting the fight-or-flight amygdala response, and jointly manage our work roles and flow toward the ultimate goal of "Safety with Respect." Patrol Officers across the Department can easily relay individual stories of how they have seen our teamwork improve since they came in the Department, the clear policies, procedures, and culture that dictate clearly how to interact with those in highly volatile situations, and how Memphis is just not who we are.

Please join us at our next virtual community meeting to view these videos, to discuss SFPD's policies, procedures, and culture, and to have your questions answered on crime trends, public safety issues, crime prevention, community building, and neighborhood resilience.

City Attorney statement on seeking Court clarification in homeless encampments lawsuit to resolve untenable conflict between federal court orders

*City Attorney David Chiu filed a motion today in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California seeking clarification on Judge Donna Ryu's order in *Coalition on Homelessness v. City and County of San Francisco**

SAN FRANCISCO (January 3, 2023) — City Attorney David Chiu filed a motion today in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California seeking clarification on Judge Donna Ryu's order in *Coalition on Homelessness v. City and County of San Francisco*. The December 23 order prohibits San Francisco from threatening to enforce certain sitting, lying, and sleeping laws against "involuntarily homeless individuals" as long as the number of people experiencing homelessness exceeds the number of available shelter beds. However, whether the Court meant "involuntarily homeless individuals" to include all people in San Francisco who are experiencing homelessness is in contention and is what the City is seeking clarification on.

In addition to the practical implications, Judge Ryu's order potentially conflicts with another federal court order that the City is subject to in *Hastings College of the Law v. City and County of San Francisco*. In that stipulated injunction, the Court mandated San Francisco conduct enhanced enforcement in the Tenderloin against individuals who have refused shelter offers in order to prevent re-encampment.

City Attorney Chiu released the following statement on the motion for clarification:

COMMUNITY MEETING

"Without clarification, the Court's order puts San Francisco in an impossible situation, practically and legally. I am concerned that this order, if interpreted broadly, will lead to more people suffering on our City streets.

It defies logic to require that San Francisco have shelter for all persons experiencing homelessness before San Francisco may enforce these laws against any one person, even after that individual has refused adequate shelter. It would take years and an additional \$1.45 billion to build the required shelter beds and provide homeless services, and many beds would go unused as people refused shelter.

The City must be allowed to balance both addressing homelessness with services and shelter with maintaining healthy and safe streets. We sincerely hope the Court will recognize the need for this balance as this case moves forward.

San Francisco must also be able to balance our legal obligations. As of now, one federal court order limits the City's enforcement and another federal court order mandates enhanced enforcement. These two orders cannot exist harmoniously without further clarification, and we urge the Court to interpret the meaning of "involuntarily homeless" consistent with the Ninth Circuit's decisions in *Johnson v. Grants Pass* and *Martin v. Boise*.

San Francisco has invested more in permanent supportive housing and homelessness than any other city in the Western United States. The City engages, shelters, and houses tens of thousands of people each year. City employees work diligently to provide services and shelter to people experiencing homeless to help alleviate what has become a nationwide, intractable problem. The City will continue to offer services and shelter and is committed to addressing our homelessness crisis for the good of all San Franciscans."

VANDALISM GRANT



SF.GOV

Get a grant for vandalism-related costs for your small business storefront.

This grant provides up to \$2,000 for vandalism-related costs. Examples of damages include broken windows, broken doors, broken locks, etching on windows, graffiti, and more.

What to do

1. Check if your business is eligible

Your business must:

- Have a storefront
- Have less than \$8M in gross revenue in 2021
- No formula retail except franchises with less than \$8M in gross revenue
- Have been damaged on or after January 1st, 2022
- Provide proof of damage

2. Gather information about your business

You must complete the application in its entirety, there is no option to save your application.

We will ask you for information on the following (**no documentation required**):

- Your Business Account Number (BAN). If you don't know it, [you can look it up](#).
- Your 2021 gross revenue
- Number of full and part-time employees
- Primary business owner's household income

3. Complete and sign a W9

We need a completed and signed W9 to process your grant application.

[Download a blank W9 form](#) (PDF).

You will be required to upload a W9 when you apply.

4. Gather proof of damage

The form will ask you to upload documents showing proof of damage (some documentation required):

Acceptable proof of damage for the **\$1,000** grant:

Submit **any two** of the following:

- Receipts for repairs of damage of **any amount**
- Police Report Number or 311 Service Request Number
- Photo of damaged storefront

Acceptable proof of damage for the **\$2,000** grant:

Submit the following:

- Receipts for repairs of damage of **\$2,000 or more AND**

At least **1** of the following:

- Police Report Number or 311 Service Request Number
- Photo of damaged storefront

If you do not have a police report number, [file a police report now](#) (for any type of property damage **except** graffiti). The report number will be **9** digits and must come from the San Francisco Police Department.

You can [file a 311 Service request for damage](#) (for graffiti damage only). The service request number will be **8** digits. For other property damage, you should file a police report.

5. Apply

We will ask you questions about the business owner and the business.

You will upload your proof of damage and W9 and agree to our legal terms.

The entire application will take about 15 minutes if you have all the required information.

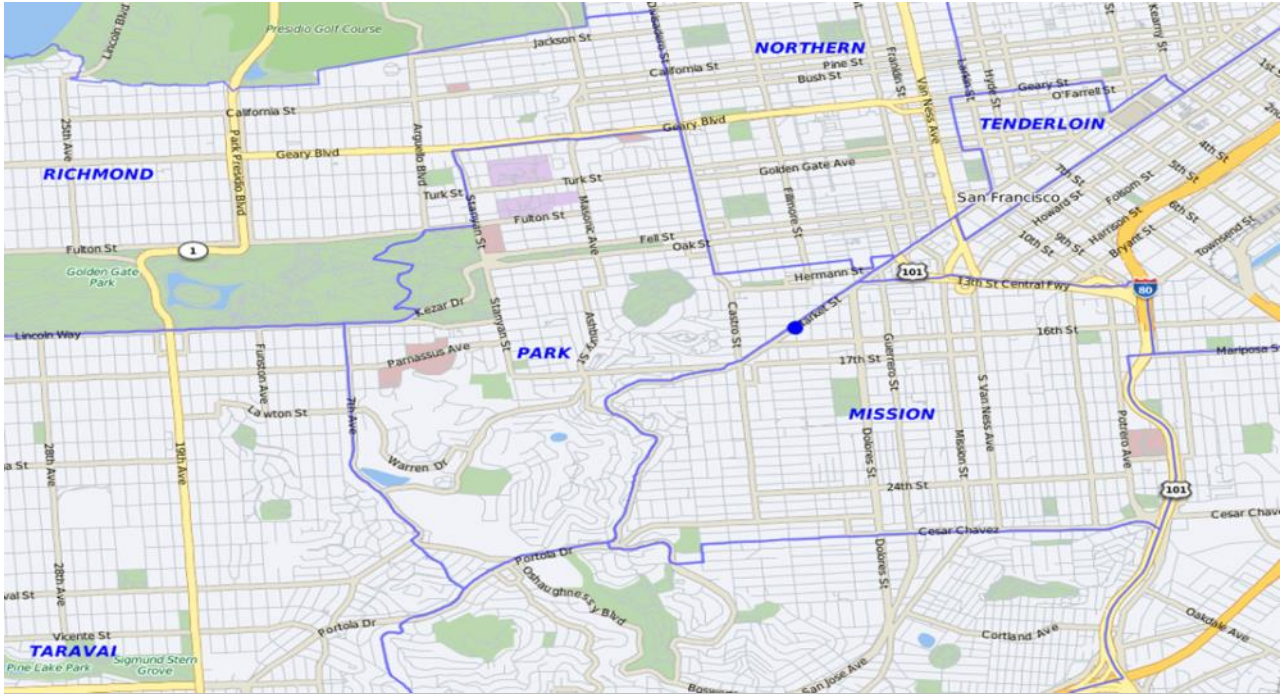

(from Monday, 04/10/23, to Sunday, 04/16/23)



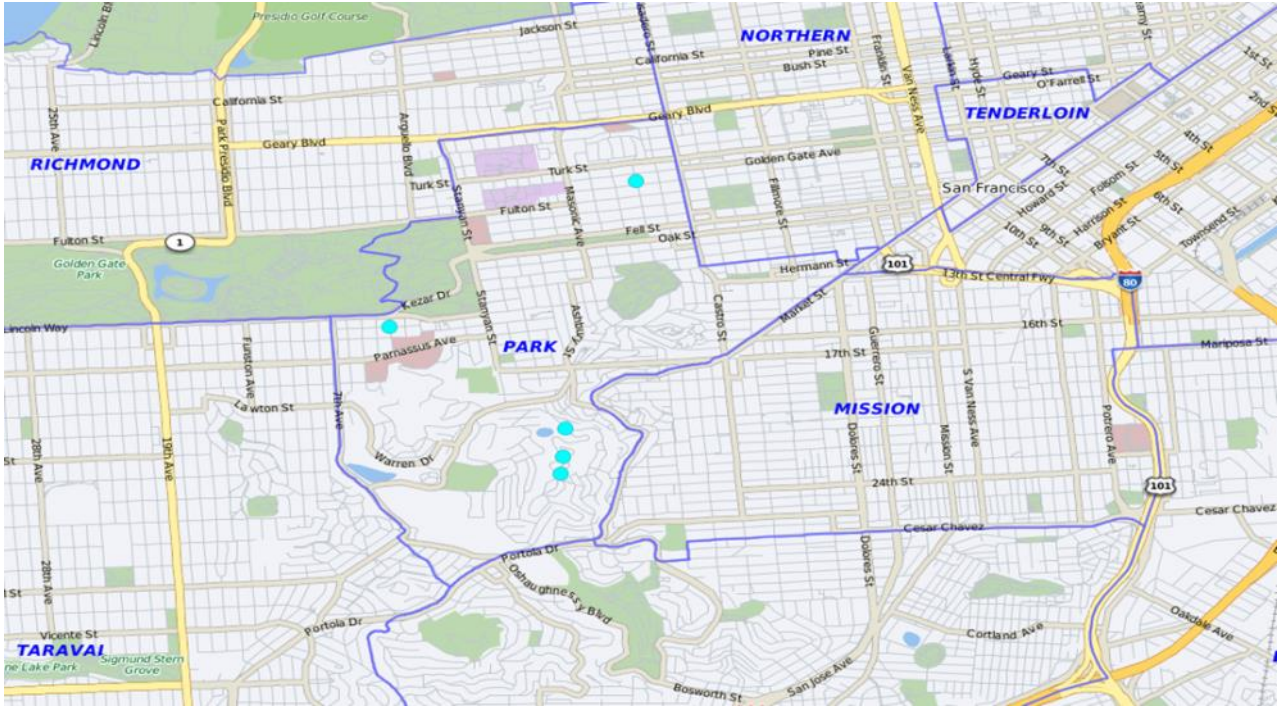
Aggravated Assaults Past Five-(5) Months



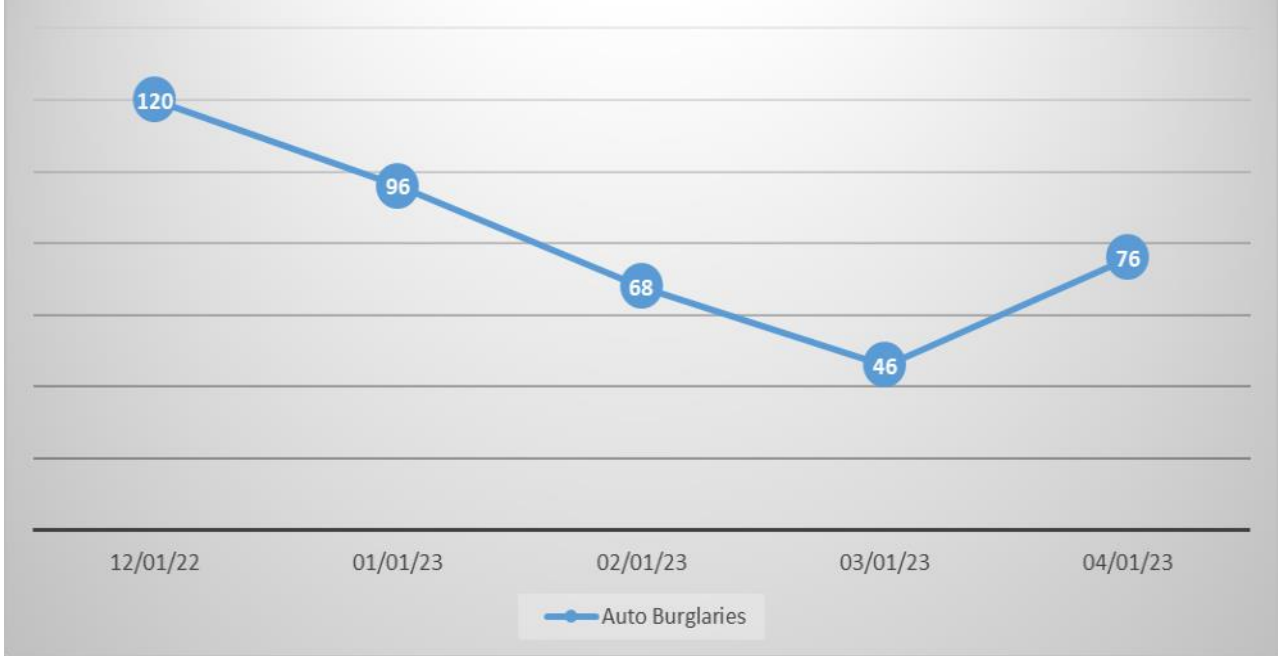

Auto Burglaries Past Five-(5) Months



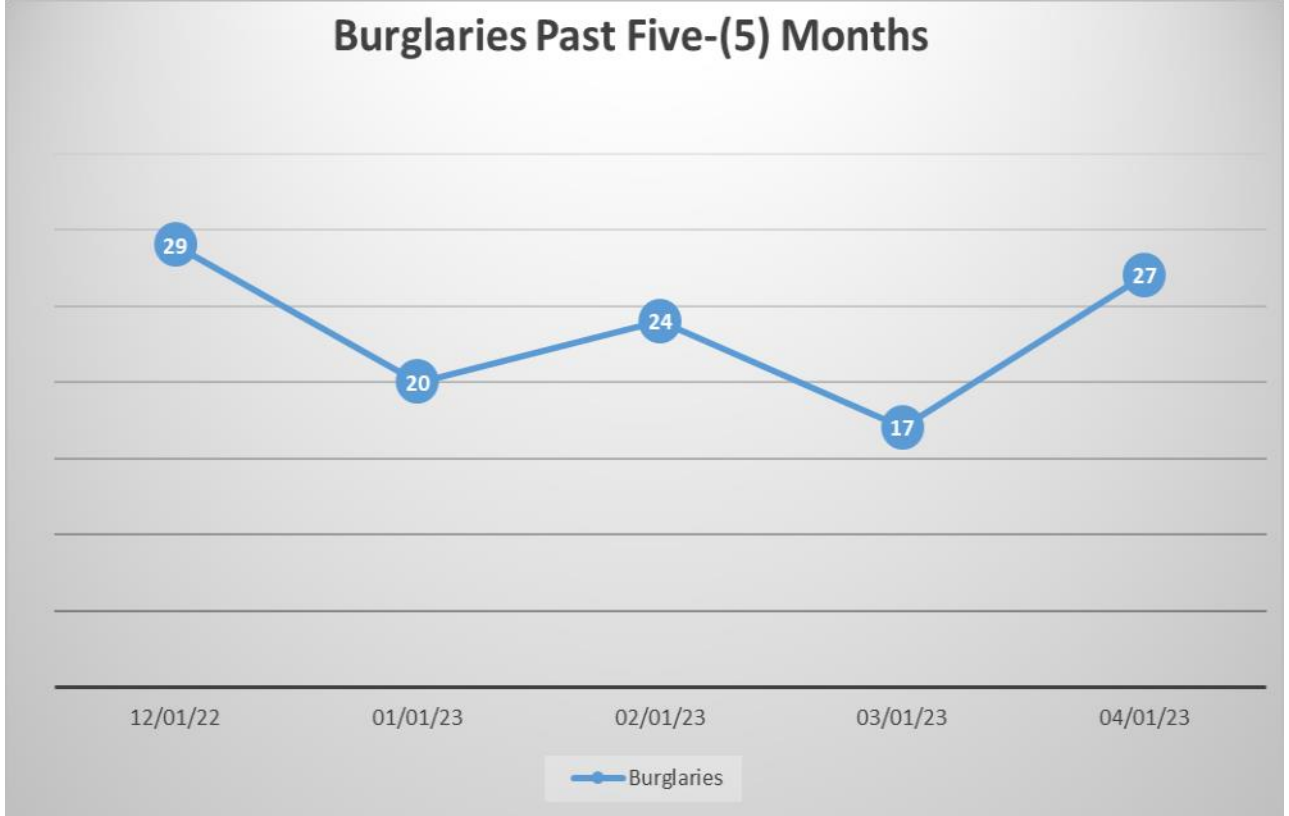

Officers responded to 57 Douglass Street regarding a robbery. Upon contacting the victim, officers learned the victim was walking on Sanchez Street between Market and 14th Streets at approximately 0215 hours when two subjects approached from behind, demanded his property, struck him the face, and stole his cellular phone. The victim sustained bruising and swelling to the face but refused medical.

5. On 08/21/2020 the SFPD re-affirmed its commitment to serve the community of San Francisco without bias by updating [DGO 5.17 Bias-Free Policing Policy](#). The SFPD is dedicated to guaranteeing that every person is afforded equal protection under the law. The SFPD's policy is one of the first to incorporate training on "bias by proxy," and explains the best practices to ensure that bias does not affect how its members interact with the community.

9. Officer-involved shootings (OIS) are complex incidents that are investigated by several different agencies. Prior to May 4, 2019, officer-involved shootings were investigated by the SFPD Homicide Detail, the San Francisco District Attorney’s Office, and the SFPD Internal Affairs Division. After that date, the San Francisco District Attorney’s Office – Independent Investigations Bureau (IIB) replaced the SFPD Homicide Detail as the lead in OIS investigations while the SFPD Investigative Services Detail (ISD) is responsible for examining any ancillary crimes associated with the OIS and assisting the IIB as necessary.
 - a. The SFPD is committed to transparency in the wake of an OIS, which is why the Media Relations Unit has an established a [protocol for response after an OIS](#). Media Relations also publishes links on SFPD social media accounts to [quarterly updates](#) on OIS investigations.

RESIDENTIAL SAFETY TIPS



Whether you live in a single family home, condo, or a large apartment complex in San Francisco, there are a number of ways you can keep your residence safe and secure. Working together as a community with your neighbors and building management can significantly improve your residential safety.

Door and Window Safety

Doors:

- Should be made of solid wood or metal
- Have a single cylinder deadbolt lock and a 1-inch bolt
- Have a front door viewer or peep hole with a 180-degree range
- Clearly display unit number

Windows:

- Replace if glass is cracked and replace all damaged or missing locks
- Ground level windows should be burglary resistant: consider purchasing windows with reinforcement wire, laminate, or tempered glass
- Polycarbonate plastic or metal grates can be installed over existing ground level windows
- Windows above ground level are not considered secure: if used for ventilation, lock in position and keep open no more than 3 inches

7 Residential Safety Tips



- Garage:** When entering or leaving the garage, watch to ensure door shuts completely. Lock stored bikes to a sturdy rack.
- Car:** Always lock your vehicle when parked in your garage and remove all valuables. Never leave garage door opener in your vehicle when parked outside your home.
- Spare Key:** Never hide spare keys. If you need to have a spare key available, leave it with a trusted neighbor.
- Door Buzzer:** When a visitor rings your bell, confirm who it is by intercom before you grant them access. Similarly, never let strangers follow you through the front door.
- Security Cameras & Alarm Systems:** Cost effective tools for preventing crime and identifying criminals.
- Light Timers:** Installing timers on the exterior of your residence is an effective and energy efficient way to deter criminal activity.
- Doors/Windows:** Always keep doors and windows locked.

Keep property in good repair. Maintain visibility to your neighbors for increased safety.

PACKAGE THEFT PREVENTION



PACKAGE THEFT PREVENTION GUIDE

One rarely falls in love without being as much attracted to what is interestingly wrong with someone as what is objectively healthy

❑ WON'T BE HOME?

Use the "Hold Package" option at USPS.com to have packages held at location post office for pick up. You can also arrange for neighborhoods to pick up any packages that might be delivered.

❑ CUSTOMIZE DELIVERIES

Customize deliveries by adding specific delivery instructions using USPS.com and your tracking number. You can also schedule packages to arrive when you are home or reroute packages.

❑ USE SPECIAL SERVICES

Use USPS special services like *Signature Confirmation* or *Registered Mail* to add a layer of security.

❑ DELIVER TO SECURE LOCATIONS

Send packages to secure locations such as Amazon Lockers, FedEx and UPS locations, P.O. Boxes, and local post office.

❑ REQUEST NONDESCRIPT PACKAGING

When completing your online order, opt for packaging that conceals the item or select the 'gift' option to ensure package arrives in a plain box especially when ordering from a high-end store.

❑ USE MODERN ALTERNATIVES

Take advantage of contemporary options like smart lockers, lockboxes, cameras, motion detection lighting, alarms like Package Guard, and services like Doorman.

❑ NETWORK WITH NEIGHBORS

Neighborhood groups on social media or community apps can provide a system for reporting suspicious activity. This is also a good way to keep your deliveries and neighborhood secure.

❑ PORCH AREA VISIBILITY

Keep the porch area clear and visible. The more likely a would-be thief is to be seen, the more likely they are to choose another target.



GARAGE DOOR BREAK-IN PREVENTION



PREVENT GARAGE DOOR BREAK-INS

Garages can sometimes be the most vulnerable area of the home and they are often the entry point most targeted by thieves because of the easy access to the home. Here are some tips to help secure your garage and protect it from theft.



ALWAYS CLOSE YOUR GARAGE DOOR

This may seem obvious, but just drive through any residential neighborhood and you'll likely see a few wide-open garage doors. This is an invitation to burglars and at the very least, you're allowing passersby to easily view the contents of your garage.



INSTALL MOTION-SENSITIVE LIGHTS

Homes and garages with poor exterior lighting become more appealing targets for burglars. Ensure all entry points are well-lit. Constant lighting supplemented by motion sensitive lighting is best.



REINFORCE THE GLASS ON THE GARAGE DOOR

Add vinyl adhesive to reinforce garage windows. You can also opt for a frosted or translucent glass design to allow sunlight in while obscuring contents inside.



DON'T LEAVE GARAGE DOOR REMOTE IN YOUR CAR

A garage door remote is basically another key into your home and thieves won't hesitate to use it if they find it. Opt to use a remote on a keychain.



INSTALL AN INTERIOR MANUAL GARAGE DOOR LOCK

When leaving on a vacation or for extended periods of time, disconnect automatic door motor and install a manual lock.



TIE EMERGENCY RELEASE CORD

Tying your emergency release cord into a small ball will make it more difficult to reach by thieves who manage to break the garage windows.



INSTALL SURVEILLANCE CAMERAS

There should be at least 1 exterior mounted camera facing the street and registered with the D.A.'s office.



SECURE ANY VALUABLES

Keep all tools in cabinet systems with locks and be sure to hang and lock any bicycles. As much as possible, try to avoid keeping valuable items in the garage or inside vehicles.



HAVE A QUALITY, FUNCTIONING GARAGE DOOR

Garage doors should be as secure, sturdy, and well-built as your front door and should remain in good condition and tight fitting. Deadbolts should also be added to the garage-to-house door.



INSTALL INTERIOR MAIL SLOT HOOD COVER

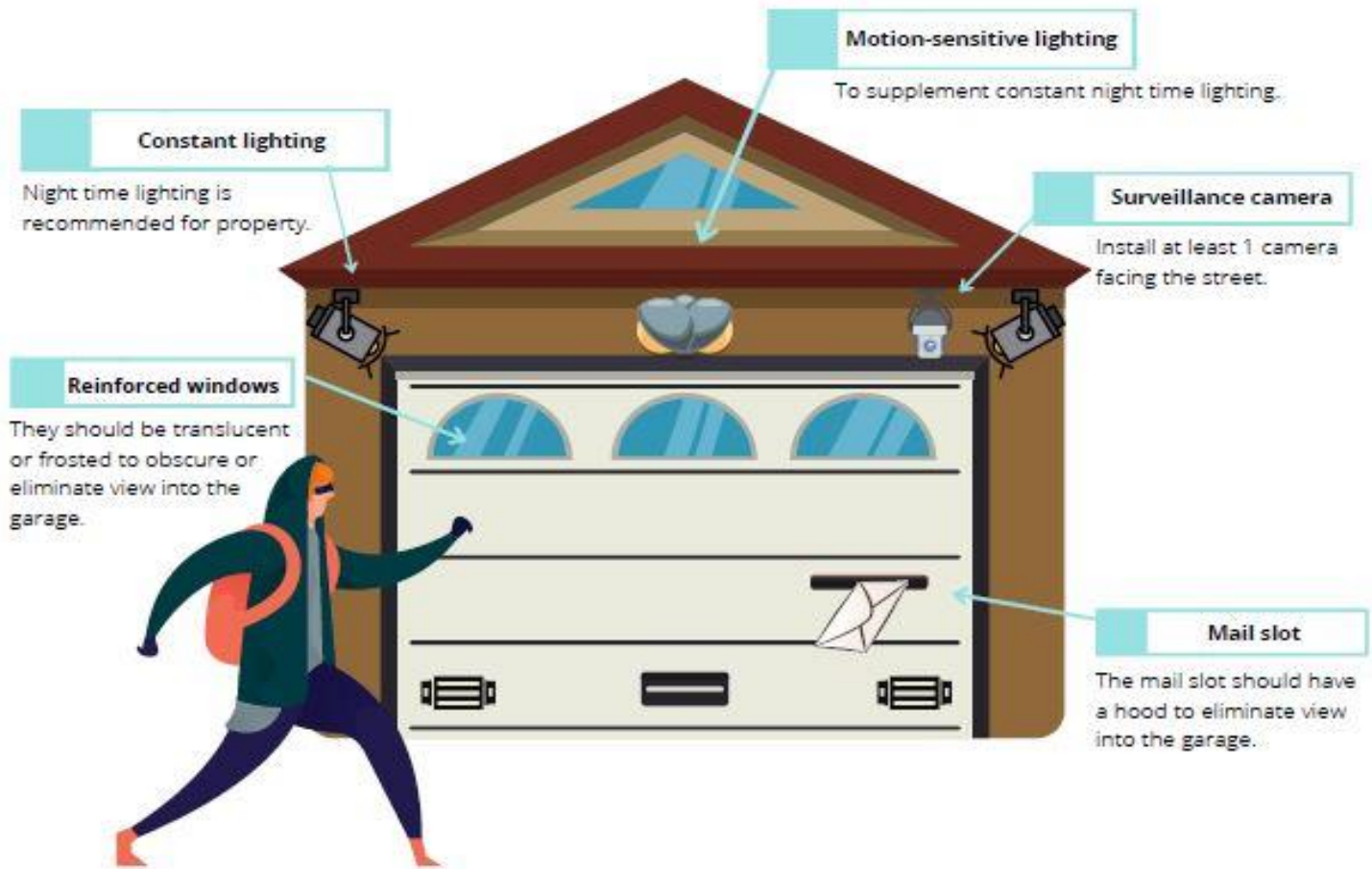
If the garage door is equipped with a mail slot, a hood cover will prevent any view into the garage and its contents, eliminating enticement to enter.

Your garage is an important part of your home and securing your garage is one of the most essential steps to securing your entire home. It is always recommended to regularly check and update your home's security system and safety measures.

BIKE INFORMATION



YOUR BIKE HAS BEEN STOLEN. NOW WHAT?

Here's what you should do next to increase your chances of recovering your bike:

➦ File a Police Report

- You can do this in one of three ways:
- Online at sanfranciscopolice.org/reports
 - Via phone by calling (415) 553-0123
 - In person by going directly to your district police station

➦ Call or Email SF SAFE

Give us a call so we can list your bike as stolen on our database. You can reach us at (415) 553-1984 or info@sfsafe.org.

➦ Register

If you haven't done so already, register your bike at nonprofit bike registry, bikeindex.org. If you are already registered, take action to flag your bike as stolen.



➦ Read Up

SF SAFE recommends reading "What to Do After Your Bike Has Been Stolen" on Medium. The article has a multitude of gems about where and how to post about your bike on social media to increase chances of recovering it.

➦ Create a Google Alert

By creating a Google alert for bikes being sold that match the make and model of your bike, you increase your chance of finding it.

➦ Don't Recover Your Bike Yourself

If you see your bike for sale on Craigslist or OfferUpNow.com, don't try to recover it yourself. Contact SFPD directly.

➦ Keep in Touch

If the police contact you to return your bike or if you recover it, please let us know! That way, SF SAFE can keep our files updated.

SHARING THE ROAD WITH CYCLISTS

When it comes to safely sharing the road with cyclists, it's paramount for drivers to learn how to coexist.

➦ Share the Road

When out and about, drivers need to be ever-mindful of sharing the road with cyclists.

➦ Stay Off the Horn

Sudden honking might startle a cyclist and can cause them to swerve into traffic or off the road.

➦ Follow the 3 Foot Rule

Maintain a distance of 36 inches from cyclists whenever passing them. If possible, keep an even wider berth if there's bad weather or if in a higher speed limit zone.

➦ Mind Your Blind Spots

Drivers should double-check their mirrors when changing lanes, making turns, and especially before opening their car door after parking.

➦ Be Cautious with Kids

Kids can be unpredictable since their motor skills and decision-making faculties aren't fully developed. Be on alert when driving near schools and residential areas.

➦ Be Patient

Don't tailgate a cyclist. When you need to pass one, patiently wait until it's safe to do so.

The San Francisco Police Department values diversity in its workforce, and is committed to fair and equal treatment of all applicants for employment. Discrimination on the basis of sex, race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, disability, medical condition, marital status, sexual orientation, or other protected categories is prohibited and unlawful.

DEFINITION OF SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

Suspicious activity is any observed behavior that could indicate a crime-related incident has been committed, or about to be committed. Unusual items or situations: A vehicle is parked in an odd location, a package/luggage is unattended, a window/door is open that is usually closed, or other out-of-the-ordinary situations occur.

Examples of Suspicious Activity:

- An individual peering into vehicles, to try, and locate any valuables left unattended.
- An individual trying door handles to vehicles, and/or residences to gain access to the vehicle and/ or residence.
- An individual checking front doors of residences to locate any unattended packages, or individuals following delivery trucks to see where the truck is dropping off packages.



CRIME DEFINITIONS*Definitions*

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(**Felony battery**) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

WHO AND WHEN TO CALL?

3-1-1: Please contact 3-1-1 when the issue is a not an emergency, yet requires City services or, if you simply have questions regarding City services. Non-emergency situations include the following examples: damage to public property, public trees that requires pruning, defective streets or sidewalks, homeless-related issues. 3-1-1 was developed to help the community inform the appropriate City agency regarding a service request.

SF 3-1-1 APP is available to use on your mobile device. Download the APP and its easy to use for many Non-emergency.



Non- Emergency San Francisco Dispatch Line: Please call the non- emergency dispatch line (**415-553-0123**) when the scenario does not need immediate response from the San Francisco Police Department. For example, if there is a loud party, a group of loud juveniles loitering in front of your residence, noise complaints, doubled parked vehicles, suspicious activities, or a homeless/nuisance related issue. **The non-emergency line is for situations that require the police, but do not require an immediate police response.**

9-1-1, please call 9-1-1 immediately if there is a police, fire, medical, or any other emergency. The purpose of San Francisco's 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System is to provide the community an immediate response of police, fire, or medical personnel for emergency occurrences. To accomplish this, it is imperative that the calls received on the 9-1-1 line be restricted to those situations that require immediate dispatching of police, paramedic, or fire department personnel. For example, crimes or fires that are in-progress, or medical emergencies.

The San Francisco Police Department district station telephone numbers and emails are not monitored. Questions will be answered in the order we receive them. Station emails are not for making police reports nor for reporting a crime. If you need to make a police report, you can call 415-553-0123 or go to your district police station. **If you have an emergency, please call 9-1-1.**
